RE: FLOOD RECOVERY

Compere:

Well in Queensland there is one massive cleanup underway. It's a big job but thousands of volunteers are rising to the occasion. Queensland Premier Anna Bligh is with us now. Good morning to you Premier. Now you've launched a \$15m royal commission style inquiry into the floods. What are you hoping to find out?

Bligh:

Well when you have an event of this magnitude I think it's important you go back and have a look at what did you do well, what can we learn from it, were mistakes made, is there anything we could have done better? Because one thing we know in Queensland is we are likely to see other weather events some time in our future. But I also in this instance very, very conscious that we've had to date 20 people confirmed dead and another 12 feared dead. And I think we owe it to them and we owe it to their families to ask ourselves the hard questions about whether we could have done anything more, whether our waring systems were the best they could be and answer some of their questions, particularly in the Lockyer Valley, about how that every extraordinary event played out last week. So we want to answer those questions and I think that will give many of us some more peace of mind that our systems are the best they can be.

Compere:

Yep, absolutely. Let's talk about the recovery process. David Hamill, the chairman of your relief fund which I think is getting up close to \$100m is it? \$90m to \$100m at the moment? And since...

Bligh:

Getting close ...

Compere:

That's fantastic, more money coming in, more events planned. David though says affected residents may only receive \$1,000 each. We're getting lots of emails from viewers saying does every dollar go to the victims and will there be enough money to go around?

Bligh:

I can absolutely guarantee you every single dollar will directly to individuals and families who have been affected by this. And we will priorities people who are most in need. What David said is that if he gave a thousand dollars to every single person it would take up about \$25m and he was just saying that as a way of explaining to people the size of the task. We would like to see everybody who has been personally affected by water in their homes getting at least some form of assistance out of this fund and then some people over and above that might...what we want is that they who need a lot more than that will get a lot more than that. So David's got a big task in front of him, we certainly hope that he has more than \$100m to assist and anybody who can help I really appeal to you. I know you've dug deep but it really is making a huge difference up here to have people who are prepared to put in even a couple of dollars.

Compere:

Yep, absolutely, right now give us an overview on how the recovery effort is going? Clean up is doing really well thanks to that magical army of volunteers over the weekend that's still going. But the next big step is not the clean up, it's the recovery, it's the rebuild. (inaudible) what you need.

Bligh:

Absolutely – we have a massive task. The city is starting to look pretty normal in a lot of places but I'm very mindful that behind every one of those

normal looking front doors are completely empty insides of houses that will have to be stripped back, walls taken out and replaced, kitchen cabinets replaced, anything that's had water through it will be swollen, it will get mouldy, it will...it needs complete rebuilding...so many homes are going to be, people are going to need to be out of their homes for several months in some cases while all of that work is done. Quite ironically here in Queensland as a result of the global financial downturn the construction industry has done it very hard. There's about to be, I think, more work that our industry can keep up with. We are looking for tradies, we are going to need a massive rebuilding exercise and it's not just here in the capital city, it's in Rockhampton, Emerald, St George, right across the regions of Queensland as well.

Compere:

Okay, so it's brickies, it's carpenters, it's sparkies, it's cabinetmakers, it's all of that and because.

Bligh:

Basically everybody who does stuff on the inside of a house plumbers, sparkies, carpenters, cabinetmakers. Anyone who's working on the inside, we're going to need a lot of them.

Compere:

Yep, this is what we found after Cyclone Larry didn't we—that once the clean-up's done you got to rebuild, there's a shortage of tradies. We're getting so many emails from viewers asking how they can help. Is this the area? Can we...you know, we did an operation for Cyclone Larry to put together teams of tradies to help. Can we do it again for you?

Bligh:

Absolutely. Look, I know there are people from all over Queensland and Australia who want to help and some people can help by you know digging deep and giving \$20 to \$50. Other people, they've got labour and skills. The people who are out on our streets sweeping with brooms...but if people have the time to donate some of those skills that would certainly ease the burden and you know I know there's people from other parts of Queensland who'd love to come down here and be part of the helping hand as well.

Compere:

Okay alright Premier Bligh we'll get onto it and set up a website...

Bligh:

It'd be terrific.

Compere:

Give us, you know, give us half an hour to get it up, our web geeks can start on something and keep refining it and building it throughout the day. But a registration process for tradies to come in, give us your details, when you're available. Maybe we start the first weekend in February, the end of the month, give us a couple of weeks to match the tradies up with your department to make sure that everyone's organised properly and we'll get it working.

Bligh:

I was going to say you really need to work in with our recovery taskforce people because...

Compere:

Absolutely.

Bligh:

...you know there's a very big task here. And if you want people's volunteer labour to be put to the best use it'll need a bit of organisation but you know if people were prepared to do that it would mean an awful lot to people who right now, their homes are clean but they're sitting in them and realising with a terrible reality that they've got nothing there.

Compere:

Okay that's our challenge. We will deliver. We'll keep you updated. And absolutely work in concert with your department. Anna Bligh, thanks for joining us.

Bligh:

Thank you.

Compere"

Okay give us half an hour as I say, go to the Sunrise website. Look, if you're anything to do with a house, if you're a roofer, if you're a carpenter, if you're an electrician, if you're a concreter...If you install blinds, (inaudible) alarms, whatever...go to the Sunrise website. We'll call it Operation Bounce Back and register there with all your details, your credentials, what you can bring, because we want Queensland to bounce back as quickly as possible and let's see if we can get something done. So give us thirty minutes or so, go to the website and let's follow this through.

Doyle:

What an unbelievable response. There are now hundreds of tradies, what's our number? 360 registered for operation bounce back but we still need your support to rebuild those flood hit areas.

Koch:

Yeah, not just tradies but also the big end of town as well. More on that in a tick but now we're joined by Queensland Premier Anna Bligh with the location of the first rebuild. Premier Good morning to you. Firstly give us an overall view on how the recovery's going in Queensland.

Bligh:

Well thank you Kochie, I think we have to acknowledge that communities right across the state are doing a sensational job of the cleanup and that has to be the first step. Condamine people went back in yesterday and they'll be right in the middle of their cleanup today and I'll be visiting them out there. Here is the city I was out in suburbs yesterday and we're still cleaning up, you know it's not over yet but it's well and truly down the track. But recovery is about so much more than cleanup; people's homes are stripped, they've got nothing. We have to rebuild their homes and help them rebuild their lives so recovery is still a long way down the track, inch by inch, street by street. But it's just terrific the work... the cleanup seemed insurmountable last Thursday and Friday and a week later it's well and truly, you know getting done. So hats off to every one of the members of the mop army out there.

Doyle:

(laughs) Mop army, I love it. So where have you chosen as the first place for operation bounce back to target?

Bligh:

Well I think it's important to remember that if a community is really going to bounce back homes and businesses obviously have to be a priority. But you're not really a fully, full community until you've got all those things that ah, those places where people gather - the community halls, the parks and gardens and of course the sporting clubs. So the first place that we would love operation bounce back to come to is the Goodna Rugby League Club. Goodna is a suburb very very hard hit and their rugby league club means a lor to them and it's been completely devastated. Ah Hutchinson Builders – a great Queensland building company have agreed to oversee the project. Three of their key people live in that area and they've all been involved in rugby league in the area. So it's very personal for that company and to have those people who have put up their hand to help would be terrific. But yes we'd also love to see some equipment being donated. I throw down the gauntlet Kochie, we need an industrial cold room. If you're going to run a rugby league club you need somewhere to keep the beer cold so that's one of the important things too.

Koch:

(laughs) Yeah look, Premier just explain to viewers who might think, oh, a rugby league club um, ah, wouldn't they be covered anyhow um, you know they've got their poker machines and their bar earning all the money. Just tell us why this is a real heart of that area.

Bligh:

Goodna is a, a very large suburb with many people on low incomes. Ah, its... this is where, you know Aussie battlers live and this club is the absolute heart of that community. It is the one place that they have where they can not

only... their children and their community members play football, it's the sort of place, it's the only place where they can go and have community meetings where they, I think where they have community events – 21st birthdays, those sorts of things. The club has been completely and utterly devastated and of course you know some parts of the club you might say run a business but it is really the community centre of this suburb; and you know I think we really need to understand that for many of these places, they don't necessarily qualify for any of the government support out there; and if we want to see the community totally bounced back this is where those people who don't have houses for the next 12 months, this is where they'll be gathering. This is where they'll come together. This is where they'll start to feel like they can achieve the bounce back that we want to see them have.

Koch:

Yep

Doyle:

Okay well as we said, always going to be completely under your control as to what was done first and what it was done so we'll check in with you and see where the next spot is that you pick but so far I'm heading to Goodna. So all the best. Thanks Premier Anna Bligh.

Bligh:

Thank you to everyone who's ... thanks to everyone who's registered so far,

we can't wait to see you.

Doyle:

Aww, they're wonderful.

Alright, thank you Premier.

NEXT SITE FOR OPERATION BOUNCE BACK

Theodore Tennis, Pony and Rugby League clubs

Minister Schwarten has asked that details of the next Operation Bounce Back project be forwarded to your office for possible announcement by the Premier.

The project will repair buildings belonging to three local clubs at Theodore, Shire of Banana, electorate of Callide. Theodore is 105km south-west of Biloela, 210km south-west of Rockhampton and 525km north-west of Brisbane.

The clubs are the tennis, pony and rugby league clubs which are close to each other on the same parcel of Crown land in the town.

The town was very heavily hit by flooding of the Dawson River.

Repairing the clubs will be a morale boost to Theodore. The clubs are community meeting place. The project will also get sports facilities up and running again, which will be especially important for the town's children.

QBuild will be the project manager and builder. It will use Operation Bounce Back tradies. QBuild will be in the town on Thursday to acceptain specific project needs.

We have been talking to the Theodore Tennis Club which is very keen to be included in Operation Bounce Back. The club is also seeking a ride-one mower and fridges and freezers to replace equipment destroyed in the flood. It also needs eight shower/toilet doors to replace door lost in the flood.

The tennis club will build is own levee to protect the club from any future flooding. .

Background:

The Member for Callide, Geoff Seeney, has not been informed about this project.

This project is important because it is in regional Queensland not in SEQ. It is helping to get a rural centre back on its feet after very heavy flooding. Our first project for Operation Bounce Back is the Goodna Leagues Club.

Theodore Tennis, Pony and Rugby League clubs

Minister Schwarten has asked that details of the next Operation Bounce Back project be forwarded to your office for possible announcement by the Premier.

The project will repair buildings belonging to three local clubs at Theodore, Shire of Banana, electorate of Callide. Theodore is 105km south-west of Biloela, 210km south-west of Rockhampton and 525km north-west of Brisbane.

The clubs are the tennis, pony and rugby league clubs which are close to each other on the same parcel of Crown land in the town.

The town was very heavily hit by flooding of the Dawson River:

Repairing the clubs will be a morale boost to Theodore. The clubs are community meeting place. The project will also get sports facilities up and running again, which will be especially important for the town's children

QBuild will be the project manager and builder. It will use Operation Bounce Back tradies. QBuild will be in the town on Thursday to ascertain specific project needs.

We have been talking to the Theodore Tennis Club which is very keen to be included in Operation Bounce Back. The club is also seeking a ride-one mower and fridges and freezers to replace equipment destroyed in the flood. It also needs eight shower/toilet doors to replace door lost in the flood.

The tennis club will build is own levee to protect the club from any future flooding. .

Background:

The Member for Callide, Geoff Seeney, has not been informed about this project.

This project is important because it is in regional Queensland not in SEQ. It is helping to get a rural centre back on its feet after very heavy flooding. Our first project for Operation Bounce Back is the Goodna Leagues Club.



RE: CYCLONE YASI, OPERATION BOUNCE BACK - THEODORE, FLOOD LEVY

Doyle:

Queensland is now on alert for Cyclone Yasi as some areas clean up from Cyclone Anthony. Now the weather bureau says Yasi could rival the strength of Cyclone Larry and we remember how bad that was. Well Queensland Premier Anna Bligh is with us now. Good morning to you, thank you for your time.

Bligh:

Morning.

Doyle:

We're um, we're looking at a monster storm as its been called. I/know that people in Queensland, north Queensland in particular are used to cyclones but what sort of preparation is going above and beyond the normal for Yasi?

Bligh:

Well you're right, people in north and far north Queensland are used to cyclones but many of them will never have seen anything like what they're seeing on the bureau website at the moment. This is as you say a monster storm. Tomorrow we expect very heavy gale force winds so today is really probably the last chance people have to safely relocate their families if they want to do that. It's the last chance they have to be really out and about getting new batteries, stocking up on food, ensuring they have fuel in their vehicle. This is going to be a very significant event when it crosses the coast and we're also expecting it to be accompanied by a very big storm surge so people in low lying and waterfront areas are being asked to relocate today.

Doyle:

So which particular areas would you tell people to evacuate from? I know that, we know that homes are built sort of stronger now to withstand cyclones and that is a safe place to be. But what areas would you say; you know what, maybe leave.

Bligh:

The only people who we're saying should think about... should relocate are those who are in low lying water front areas where they might be susceptible to the storm surge. So it's not moving because of the cyclonic winds but moving out of the way of what might be a very large storm surge causing very powerful flash flooding. So anybody who's close to the waterfront and every one of the councils are in the area — Cairns to Mackay has very good mapping of these areas and they should be getting that information from their local council. But today, it's the last opportunity people may have to do that safely because tomorrow we would expect to see winds of more than 120 kilometres hitting the coast anytime from about 10am. So this is a very serious event and people need to treat it very seriously.

Doyle:

Absolutely, as you say – do what you're told to do, follow orders at all times because it's for your safety. I just want to talk to you about operation bounce back. Of course we're working with you, with your government, to make sure tradies and supplies get into the flood affected areas. The first job we talked about was the Ipswich suburb of Goodna, building the rugby league club, how's it going? An update on how everyone's managing?

Bligh:

Well from everything I hear it's going extremely well and we thank every one of them. This is a not for profit club that puts everything back into its community. It's the absolute heartbeat of Goodna; Goodna is a suburb where

almost every house has had some affect. So if we can get their club back operating I think they'll start to feel like they can get their lives back together. So it's a terrific place to start and I'm really pleased with the progress that I hear they're making...

Doyle:

Great and you've chosen the next spot?

Bligh:

Absolutely. The next lot are going much further west, we're asking them to go to the town of Theodore which is 300 kilometres, about three hours drive west of Gladstone. It's a little town with just 300 people and it was the town that was the first town ever in our history to be fully evacuated and they were out of their homes for about nine days and just about every town — every home in town had some water damage. So we're asking you to come in to rehabilitate, they've got a little group of clubs on one block of land that has a tennis court, a pony club and a football club. So we're asking them to come into that little town where so many have lost so much and for the children in that town this will make such a big difference.

Doyle:

They need it. Alright well there you go, Theodore is next on the agenda. Just quickly before I let you go Premier. The Prime Minster has been under political pressure over the unpopular flood levy. Now Julia Gillard's chief of staff has quit — do you think this agreement over the levy is taking its toll?

Bligh:

I would hope that people remember that there are literally thousands of Queenslanders and I know many many more in Victoria who have lost everything. Who are sitting today, their houses might be cleaned up but they've got nothing; and their roads are broken, their bridges are broken, their industries are falling apart. We need to help this economy, this state get back on its feet; and I appealed to the generosity of Australians to accept that this levy is an important part of our recovery. I thank them for their donations so far but Australians we still need you.

Doyle:

Yeah and to remind people too that the levy is to cover things like infrastructure, as you said roads and buildings and the Premiers fund and the things that people have been donating their cash to is to help people and individuals and families at home.

Bligh:

That's right

Doyle:

And I think there's been a little bit, we don't want to forget that point. Thanks very much for joining us Premier Anna Bligh, I know big day ahead so as we said make sure everyone listens to instructions and does what they need to.

Below is an outline of what is provided under the Flood Fightback Plan. Sch. 3-2

Sport and Recreation Flood Fightback Plan

Help is available to assist sport and recreation clubs to re-establish facilities and repair or replace equipment which has been damaged in the floods.

The Queensland Government has put together a range of assistance measures accessible by sport and recreation clubs, so they can be back operating as soon as possible.

1. Financial assistance for sport and recreation equipment

The Sport and Recreation Flood Fightback Plan - Equipment Program will provide one-off funding, up to a maximum of \$12,500, for repairing or replacing sport and recreation training and playing equipment.

2. Financial assistance for infrastructure

The Sport and Recreation Flood Fightback Plan - Infrastructure Program will provide one-off funding, up to a maximum of \$60,000, for repairing or replacing infrastructure.

3. Advice/referral service

The Community Recovery Line (1800 173 349) is the primary contact point for affected sport and recreation clubs seeking advice or assistance. They will refer clubs to officers who can assist with complex needs and provide advice on a coordinated package of support to meet individual club needs.

4. Linking with tradespersons

A linking service has been established to match volunteer tradespersons with sport and recreation organisations (working with Operation Bounce Back). Sport and recreation clubs can lodge their requests for assistance online and will be contacted by sport and recreation staff member to discuss their recovery needs.

5. Specialist technical advice

Access to specialist technical advice including engineering, building and insurance, and restoring playing fields.

Been a bit of to-ing and fro-ing about this today, but if you get any enquiries about whether sporting groups are eligible for Cat C NDRRA funding. The advice we have from QRAA is;

QRAA operates on the principle of no 'double dipping', so if sporting clubs have already claimed assistance under the already announced 'Sports Flood Fight Back Plan' (details below) they cannot claim for these same costs under QRRA.

If they have not claimed for these same expenses under our existing package, then they should be eligible for the NDRRA funding, provided they have ATO status as incorporated charity or non-profit.

It would be appreciated though if Department of Communities can liaise with QRAA to get an official ruling about this, so everybody is clear from the outset.

- Sport and recreation flood assistance 'Sports Flood Fight Back Plan'
 - o up to \$60,000 for repairing or replacing infrastructure.
 - o up to \$12,500 for repairing or replacing training and playing equipment. Sch. 3-2

If there are sporting groups who don't fall under either category, however, there is another options for them to explore;

 In-kind assistance – major corporates pairing with sporting groups (announcement to come on a 'Operation Fightback' style feature of the QldReconstruction website which facilitates this) plus the letters that have been sent to all MPs asking them to identify community groups in need of such in-kind assistance so we catch match these with offers of assistance that have come in.

McKinnon speaks to Brisbane Lord Mayor Campbell Newman about the cleanup effort, and his call for a Royal Commission into the flood crisis. Newman claims he warned of the floods back in October and December. Newman says that the Royal Commission needs to examine if experts let Qld down. He says dam management should be examined, as should the actions of all Old local govts and Brisbane City Council in terms of planning.
