1<sup>st</sup> Story: Queensland Police have confirmed they are investigating a State Government public servant link to a multi-million dollar cannabis bust. Police won't say which department the public servants or public servants work for So far the Police operation has seen 21 people arrested on over 40 charges.

2<sup>nd</sup> Story: Two dangerous prisoners who escaped from jail near Rockhampton have been spotted on security camera at an Emu Park IGA. Two other prisoners are also on the run. Labor MP Bill Byrne says the Government has been prepared to slash jobs in the prison system, despite rising prisoner numbers. A quarter of dog squad positions were cut at the Etna Creek jail last year. A spokesperson for the Attorney-General says until now a prisoner hasn't escaped a low-security prison in 18 months.

- 3<sup>rd</sup> Story: Police have seized items of clothing from Chloe Campbell and her parents as they continue to hunt for her abductors.
- **4<sup>th</sup> Story:** A raid in far north Queensland may have led to a breakthrough in solving a 20 year old armoured van heist. Detectives have seized a number of items from a Mossman property.
- **5<sup>th</sup> Story:** The recovery from Cyclone Ita is expected to take several months, with Ingham locals facing a massive clean-up today. Around 700 insurance claims have already been made. The rail network is cut from Mackay North and the rail line is being assessed. Recovery Minister David Crisafulli says he has confidence in Inspector Kevin Gutteridge, who is leading the recovery effort. Chief Health Officer Dr Jeanette Young has warned against walking through floodwater. Outreach teams have new arrived in areas around Cooktown.
- 6<sup>th</sup> Story: The State Government has reached a deal in-principle with union leaders over the doctor contract dispute. Alex Scott from the Together Union says changes in the last week will mean doctors will now be able to do their jobs, but new Labor candidate Dr Anthony Lyneham, says the entire process has taken too long. Health Minister Lawrence Springborg says contracts will be reissued. Doctors will vote on the contracts at a meeting tomorrow night.

7th Story: There are rumours Australian band AC/DC will retire from recording and touring.

#### Others:

- Federal Cabinet has signed-off on a site for a second Sydney airport at Badgerys Creek.
- The Shuffle nightclub on the Gold Coast has had its liquor licence suspended. The club was at the centre of a drug trafficking arrest earlier this month.
- Fruit and vegetable suppliers do not believe Cyclone Ita will have an immediate impact on the fresh food market. Five per cent of Australia's banana crops have been destroyed. The damage caused by Cyclone Ita might push back planting by more than a month. The Cape Flattery mine, which produces silica for 90 per cent of flat screen televisions, has been badly damaged by the storm.

**1st Story:** Investigators believe a young boy playing with a lighter may have caused a house fire at a housing commission property in Keperra this afternoon, leaving nine people homeless.

- **2<sup>nd</sup> Story:** At least one State Government employee could be charged with helping a drug trafficking ring to courier cannabis through Brisbane Airport. Police allege \$18 million dollars worth of drugs have been smuggled to Brisbane by the group over 18 months. 13 people allegedly involved will face court tomorrow.
- **3<sup>rd</sup> Story:** Police investigating the abduction of Chloe Campbell late last week have identified a number of Persons of Interest. Detectives are reviewing CCTV the morning Chloe vanished.
- 4th Story: State Disaster Recovery Coordinator Kevin Gutteridge says it may take three months to get some services running again following Cyclone Ita. Community Recovery Minister David Crisafulli says he knows businesses affected on Lizard Island will bounce back from the disaster. Island resort staff say it's too early to tell when they will reopen. Around Ingham 95 per cent of the cane harvest has been destroyed.
- **5<sup>th</sup> Story:** South east Queensland beaches have been spared from serious erosion, with massive waves hitting the coast following Cyclone Ita.
- 6<sup>th</sup> Story: The State Government has reached an in-principle deal with doctors over new individual contracts. Opposition leader Annastacia Palaszczuk says the contract issue could have been resolved much earlier. Health Minister Lawrence Springborg says a deal still came quicker than with previous contracts. A meeting of doctors tomorrow night will consider the new deal.

#### Others:

- The State Government has begun new community forums on State debt. Participants had to preregister and show identification to get into a Mt Gravatt forum today. The Government says it won't sell assets without a mandate.
- A convicted murderer and an armed robber have been spotted at an Emu Park supermarket after they escaped from a prison near Rockhampton yesterday. Police believe the men are travelling in a stolen car.

- Doctors have found the bacteria that causes whooping cough has mutated and thousands of children may need booster vaccinations.
- Suburbs on Brisbane's north side are being inundated by mosquitoes the biggest outbreak in seven years. Brisbane City Council has used helicopters and quad bikes in spraying operations at Boondall wetlands.

Community Recovery Minister David Crisafulli says the industry is back open for business. Clive Palmer's Yabulu nickel refinery near Townsville has been temporarily closed down amid concerns toxic waste may be leaking from its dams. The Hinchinbrook Mayor has spoken about a new bridge for Ingham with the Premier, but funding may be an issue.
- **5<sup>th</sup> Story:** The State Government heard criticism over their 'Strong Choices' options at a meeting at Mt Gravatt today. Opposition leader Annastacia Palaszczuk says she thinks the campaign is "a con". Ms Palaszczuk announced Labor candidates who will contest the next State election today, including criminal lawyer Peter Russo. Treasurer Tim Nicholls says the Strong Choices options are cutting services, increasing taxes, selling assets, or any combination of these.
- **6<sup>th</sup> Story**: Doctors will decide at a rally tomorrow night whether to abort mass resignations after the State Government made a raft of concessions to individual contracts.

# Channel 10 5pm News

1<sup>st</sup> Story: Queensland Police have confirmed they are investigating a State Government public servant link to a multi-million dollar cannabis bust. Police won't say which department the public servants or public servants work for. So far the Police operation has seen 21 people arrested on over 40 charges.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Story:** Two dangerous prisoners who escaped from jail near Rockhampton have been spotted on security camera at an Emu Park IGA. Two other prisoners are also on the run. Labor MP Bill Byrne says the Government has been prepared to slash jobs in the prison system, despite rising prisoner numbers. A quarter of dog squad positions were cut at the Etna Creek jail last year. A spokesperson for the Attorney-General says until now a prisoner hasn't escaped a low-security prison in 18 months.

- 3<sup>rd</sup> Story: Police have seized items of clothing from Chloe Campbell and her parents as they continue to hunt for her abductors.
- **4**<sup>th</sup> **Story:** A raid in far north Queensland may have led to a breakthrough in solving a 20 year old armoured van heist. Detectives have seized a number of items from a Mossman property.
- **5<sup>th</sup> Story:** The recovery from Cyclone Ita is expected to take several months, with Ingham locals facing a massive clean-up today. Around 700 insurance claims have already been made. The rail network is cut from Mackay North and the rail line is being assessed. Recovery Minister David Crisafulli says he has confidence in Inspector Kevin Gutteridge, who is leading the recovery effort. Chief Health Officer Dr Jeanette Young has warned against walking through floodwater. Outreach teams have now arrived in areas around Cooktown.
- 6<sup>th</sup> Story: The State Government has reached a deal in-principle with union leaders over the doctor contract dispute. Alex Scott from the Together Union says changes in the last week will mean doctors will now be able to do their jobs, but new Labor candidate Dr Anthony Lyneham, says the entire process has taken too long. - The Shuffle nightclub on the Gold Coast has had its liquor licence suspended. The club was at the centre of a drug trafficking arrest earlier this month.

Queensland Nickel's current EA requires a specific design storage allowance to be met prior to the 2014/2015 wet season.

The Queensland Government will be closely monitoring its progress to ensure the tailings storage facility meets its requirements.

There are significant penalties for offences under the Environmental Protection Act including penalties for a wilful breach of condition of the EA, which carries a maximum penalty for companies of \$1,100,000 and \$220,000 for individuals or two years imprisonment.

# Pay your carbon tax bill, Palmer: Queensland Mines minister

The Queensland Mines minister says no political party has fought harder against the carbon tax than the LNP - but he still thinks Clive Palmer should pay his bill.

Andrew Cripps said Tuesday regardless of his and his party's view on the tax, it was the "law of the land" and Mr Palmer had no choice but to pay his bill.

"There is an obligation on Mr Palmer to meet the tax burden that is owing," he said.

"I acknowledge it is not a good tax and it is a tax the LNP would prefer not to be placed on companies in Australia.

"But while it is the law of the land, it is his obligation to meet that tax payment."

Mr Palmer, in response to media reports, tweeted early Tuesday morning that he had paid the outstanding \$6.8 million carbon tax bill for the Yabulu nickel refinery on Monday.

But the issue is unlikely to disappear, with the Clean Energy Regulator reporting Mr Palmer's Queensland Nickel owes the government \$8.44 million in 2012-13 carbon tax liabilities.

Not only that, the nickel refinery owes a further \$1 million in late penalties accrued by March 27, leaving a total debt of about \$9.5 million so far, the regulator said.

Mr Cripps said he wanted the refinery, which was also dealing with a tailings dam issue, to survive.

"I am an extremely strong supporter of the nickel refinery in Townsville. It is located in my electorate and it provides employment for many hundreds of people in that city," he said.

"It is an important economic asset for the region. The Yubulu nickel refinery has been in operation for decades and it is important for the economy of Townsville that it is responsibly managed.

"... [Mr Palmer] certainly appears to have the money. He has run a lot of colourful ads on television, he has financed national and state election campaigns and Mr Palmer is pursuing colourful business ventures, like building a replica of the Titanic.

"Yet apparently, he doesn't have the financial means to meet his tax obligations to the Commonwealth."

# Minister Powell's Doorstop Executive building, Monday April 14th

Subject: Yabulu Tailings Dam

Journalist: How dangerous is the situation at Yabulu?

**Minister Powell:** Oh it is very concerning. We had capacity there, that capacity is clearly gone. Everyone else prepares for a rainy day, clearly Clive Palmer hasn't.

Journalist: When you say it is gone, do you mean today?

Minister Powell: We were advised yesterday that the tailings dam is at full capacity and with the wind and wave action that's generated there may be potential that it is already over the top. In that instance there are a number of management ponds on site that could have captured it but we will have officers on the ground this morning assessing whether any of that has gone off site.

Journalist: So is he just cavalier about this?

Minister Powell: Look, we've been telling him for more than 12 months that he needs to do work to be prepared for an above average wet season in the Townsville area. You cannot assume that every season is going to be an average season and this year hasn't been, so we've been warning him, encouraging him to make changes. We've given him until the end of this dry season to get that done. Clearly it needs to happen sooner.

**Journalist:** If some of those tailings do escape, what sort of things are we talking about? What are the potential impacts of those?

**Minister Powell**: There's a range of contangments that are formed as part of the Nickel refining process, they are all not really good for natural water systems, particularly not for the Great Barrier Reef. That is why we are calling on him to address his management systems there and make sure he gets his water management under check.

Journalist: Can you shut the plant down?

Minister Powell: Look, they're the kind of things we will be assessing today. We are talking to Queensland Nickel determining what their objectives are, whether they do plan to start operations up again after the week-end. If that is the case, are they going to be putting tailings in the dam, clearly a dam that is already at capacity? So they're the kinds of questions we have to ask.

**Journalist:** Clive Palmer says the government should be more concerned about the cyclone rather than leaking information to the media.

Minister Powell: Ah, look I am not going to comment on Mr Palmer's comments other than to say I take my job extremely seriously as a regulator. We have a responsibility to the Townsville community, to the broader community around the Great Barrier Reef but also to those that are employed at Queensland Nickel, and we will continue to take our job as a regulator seriously.

# Channel 10 5pm News

1<sup>st</sup> Story: Thousands of people are still trapped by floodwaters from Cyclone Ita, with Ingham and other communities isolated and the Bruce Highway south of Cardwell cut off. Premier Campbell Newman says there are impacts on people's farms, businesses and homes and we need to do something to help those people out. The State Government has announced additional emergency support for affected Councils.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Story:** Consumers will soon be paying much high prices for certain fruits and vegetables, with many crops in areas such as Bowen and Ingham decimated by the cyclone. Community Recovery Minister David Crisafulli says the scenes of crop destruction are "gut-wrenching". Tourism Minister Jann Stuckey says Far North Queensland is "open for business".

- 3<sup>rd</sup> Story: There are strong wind warnings for Moreton Bay down to as far as Byron Bay over the next few days. The Gold Coast Council is confident the area will escape much of the torrential wind and rain from Cyclone Ita, which has tapered down to a tropical low.
- **4<sup>th</sup> Story:** Major manhunts are underway across Queensland for four convicted criminals on the run. The fugitives include a murderer and an armed robber, who escaped from a central Queensland jail by rolling up a fence.
- **5**<sup>th</sup> **Story:** Police still have no evidence for the motive for the abduction of three-year-old Childers girl Chloe Campbell.
- **6<sup>th</sup> Story:** There are two major developments in the search for missing Malaysia Airlines flight MH370, with an oil slick located not far from the search zone. Also, the search for the plane will now commence underwater.
- **7<sup>th</sup> Story:** The Duke and Duchess of Cambridge have visited Canterbury today. The Royal couple will fly to Australia at Easter and will start a public walk from Russell St to the Cultural Forecoun at South Bank on Saturday.

# Channel 10 5pm News

1<sup>st</sup> Story: Queensland Police have confirmed they are investigating a State Government public servant link to a multi-million dollar cannabis bust. Police won't say which department the public servants or public servants work for. So far the Police operation has seen 21 people arrested on over 40 charges.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Story:** Two dangerous prisoners who escaped from jail near Rockhampton have been spotted on security camera at an Emu Park IGA. Two other prisoners are also on the run. Labor MP Bill Byrne says the Government has been prepared to slash jobs in the prison system, despite rising prisoner numbers. A quarter of dog squad positions were cut at the Etna Creek jail last year. A spokesperson for the Attorney-General says until now a prisoner hasn't escaped a low-security prison in 18 months.

- 3<sup>rd</sup> Story: Police have seized items of clothing from Chloe Campbell and her parents as they continue to hunt for her abductors.
- **4<sup>th</sup> Story:** A raid in far north Queensland may have led to a breakthrough in solving a 20 year old armoured van heist. Detectives have seized a number of items from a Mossman property.
- **5<sup>th</sup> Story:** The recovery from Cyclone Ita is expected to take several months, with Ingham locals facing a massive clean-up today. Around 700 insurance claims have already been made. The rail network is cut from Mackay North and the rail line is being assessed. Recovery Minister David Crisafulli says he has confidence in Inspector Kevin Gutteridge, who is leading the recovery effort. Chief Health Officer Dr Jeanette Young has warned against walking through floodwater. Outreach teams have new arrived in areas around Cooktown.
- 6<sup>th</sup> Story: The State Government has reached a deal in-principle with union leaders over the doctor contract dispute. Alex Scott from the Together Union says changes in the last week will mean doctors will now be able to do their jobs, but new Labor candidate Dr Anthony Lyneham, says the entire process has taken too long. Health Minister Lawrence Springborg says contracts will be reissued. Doctors will vote on the contracts at a meeting tomorrow night.

7th Story: There are rumours Australian band AC/DC will retire from recording and touring.

#### Others:

- Federal Cabinet has signed-off on a site for a second Sydney airport at Badgerys Creek.
- The Shuffle nightclub on the Gold Coast has had its liquor licence suspended. The club was at the centre of a drug trafficking arrest earlier this month.
- Fruit and vegetable suppliers do not believe Cyclone ita will have an immediate impact on the fresh
  food market. Five per cent of Australia's banana crops have been destroyed. The damage caused
  by Cyclone Ita might push back planting by more than a month. The Cape Flattery mine, which
  produces silica for 90 per cent of flat screen televisions, has been badly damaged by the storm.

- 5<sup>th</sup> Story: South east Queensland beaches have been spared from serious erosion, with massive waves hitting the coast following Cyclone Ita.
- 6<sup>th</sup> Story: The State Government has reached an in-principle deal with doctors over new individual contracts. Health Minister Lawrence Springborg says contracts will be reissued. Doctors will vote on the contracts at a meeting tomorrow night.

7th Story: There are rumours Australian band AC/DC will retire from recording and touring.

### Others:

- Federal Cabinet has signed-off on a site for a second Sydney airport at Badgerys Creek.
- The Shuffle nightclub on the Gold Coast has had its liquor licence suspended. The club was at the centre of a drug trafficking arrest earlier this month.


