## WE GOT IT RIGHT BUT IT WILL BE HARD FOR SOME TIME

The majority of Queenslanders continue to feel that we are responding appropriately to Covid-19. On the day of the survey 21% felt happy things were returning to normal but 11% still worried about second wave.

When asked in general about the global Covid-19 pandemic, a quarter of those surveyed said that the impact on Australian economy was their biggest worry (28%) and some said the risk to friends and family health (15%) or losing income due to salary reduction or investments (10%).

There was a similar response when asked specifically what worries them most about the economic impacts of Covid-19: a third of Queenslanders (36%) are most worried about the impact on the Australian Economy and 12% are worried about losing income due to salary reduction or investments or loosing their job (10%).

#### QUEENSLANDERS' CONFIDENCE REMAINS THE SAME; AWARENESS LOW FOR INITIATIVES AND STRATEGY

Only a third have heard about the Economic Initiatives, and a quarter aware of the Economic Strategy. Only three in ten feel they have enough information about how Queensland's economy will recover.

### SUPPORT FOR ECONOMIC STRATEGY

## There is a need to increase awareness of the strategy, the level of detail to build trust in the Economic Strategy to built positive support.

Based on their comments some participants are also confused between Australian Government strategies and Queensland Government strategies.

#### Positive

#### 65%

Those who are supportive are positive because it looks after small business and helps affected industries, will help lift the economy and is a well thought out and detailed strategy. Those who are supportive also feel the restrictions have been lifted gradually and handled appropriately in stages. The strategy is favoured because it keeps people in jobs or creates new jobs. There is positive sentiment towards the Queensland Government, and the Premier who have both shown strength and gained trust.

Half the Queenslanders surveyed (52%) believe the Federal Government has the most responsibility for economic recovery.

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## Neutral 26%

Those who are neutral feel unsure of the situation, are negative in general towards the government and still feel they don't know enough. There is a lack of trust that the Queensland Government will keep their word, there are too many mixed messages or not enough real or detailed information.

Those who opposed the economic strategy felt there was not enough real or detailed information leading to a lack of trust. They were frustrated that restrictions were eased too slowly, and that this is all too little too late. They also state that it doesn't address tourism sufficiently and that there are concerns for how the Government will pay for it.

Most Queenslanders surveyed felt that it was important to be patient and understanding with service staff in hospitality and other service jobs who are complying with social distancing rules (82%), to keep good distance on public transport (69%), leave 1.5 metre space when queuing (69%) and physically distancing from others outside their household (65%). Only half (53%) felt the 4 square rule was important indoors or at a venue store or workplace (59%).

Dining out was mentioned the most (9%) followed by visiting family and friends (8%), going out to see entertainment and music or movies (8%), going out with family and friends (8%) and taking a weekend away / mini break or holiday in Queensland (8%).



## **INFORMATION FOR QUEENSLANDERS**

As Queenslanders get information and their sentiment towards QLD government as trustworthy information and management of the Covid-19 pandemic increases. Important opportunity to increase information about the Economic Strategy as the Roadmap has worked well.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

#### Keep communicating about the Economic Strategy to build trust and positive sentiment

Communication of the Roadmap for Easing Restrictions has been received positively and high awareness is also associated with positive sentiment. Queensland Government is seen as a trustworthy information source about Covid-19. Queenslanders continue to be aligned with the way Queensland Government is making decisions about border closure and easing restrictions with health risks as a priority. There is confidence amongst Queenslanders in how the Queensland Government is managing the restrictions easing and that we are responding appropriately. However, don't overlook the need to <u>continue to talk about health risks</u> as there is still some concern with a second wave.

There is less confidence in how Queensland Government is managing the economic recovery because people are unaware of what is being done. Communication about the Economic Recovery needs to increase Queenslanders awareness of what the Queensland Government initiatives and strategy are, and importantly the support for small business, the community and mental health and wellbeing. Queenslanders need more detailed and "real" information about the strategy to mitigate uncertainty and nervousness, and this will help to be transparent and build trust and confidence. Where Queenslanders are aware of the Economic Strategy they agree there is support from Queensland Government and have more positive sentiment for Queensland Government.

Ensure that branding for Queensland Government is strong as some Queenslanders are confused about which initiatives are Federal or State. Help Queenslanders make a connection between the two documents – Roadmap for Easing Restrictions and Economic Strategy. Health and Economy together.

# BACKGROUND



## BACKGROUND AND OBJECTIVES

#### Findings will be used to inform communications for the recovery phase.

This research is to understand Queenslanders' sentiment and views on the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Extending on this, the Department of Premier and Cabinet also want to uncover Queenslanders' expectations and preferences for the journey Queensland should take out of the response phase into recovery – in particular, the staged easing of restrictions. The research will be used to shape the government's approach and communication for the COVID-19 recovery phase.

Research covers:

- The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on Queenslanders lives, their jobs and the economy
- The community's views around the economic impact and economic recovery
- The community's views about easing restrictions

The first wave of the research was conducted between Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> May and Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> May. Wave 1 took on average 21 minutes to complete the online survey. Sample of n=1603 was sourced through commercial research panels. Wave 2 of the research was undertaken between Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> June to Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> of June. Wave 2 took on average 20 minutes to complete the online survey. Sample of n=1018 was sourced through commercial research panels. The composition of survey respondents is displayed in the table on the next page. The responses in this report have been weighted to reflect the Queensland's population using 2016 ABS Census data.

The limitations for this methodology include:

- · Biased towards those with internet and/or computer literacy
- · Timing of the fieldwork in relation to the announcements of restriction easing
- · Limited time in field may bias to those with more availability
- Vulnerable Queenslanders are less likely to be included in the sample frame and therefore participate in this mode of research.
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On Friday 8 May 2020 the Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk released Queensland's Roadmap to Easing COVID-19 restrictions (the Roadmap). The Roadmap outlines a staged approach to giving Queenslanders more freedom to travel, participate in more activities and hold more gatherings. The Roadmap provides sensible and gradual steps to a COVID recovery that will reconnect our communities and keeps our economy moving by supporting business, industry and Queensland jobs.

On Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> May the Premier announced an update to ease restrictions to Stage 2 at 12 noon on 1<sup>st</sup> June 2020, which was 11 days ahead of schedule.

Q9 Has the Coronavirus pandemic affected your work situation?

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Of those Queenslanders surveyed in June more had their employment impacted (61%) than in May (56%) but this was not statistically significant. There were more working less (25% June vs 21% May), or stood down temporarily (10% June vs 7% May). But less were affected in other ways like working from home, salary reductions or forced annual leave (10% June vs 14% May). Temporary or Casual employees more likely to be impacted (81%) as are those working in Food and Accommodation Services (96%).

The impact on self-employed or business owners has not change significantly over all between June (82%) and May (79%). However more businesses have closed temporarily (23% June vs 15% May).

One quarter of Queenslanders surveyed could not raise \$4000 for an emergency, indicating financial hardship has not shifted. Males (33%) were more likely to be able to raise the money than females (29%). Others more likely not to be able to raise the money were 40-64 year old Queenslanders (29%), those whose employment impacted (28%), and unemployed (39%).

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Life may still be changing for Queenslanders, particularly their household spending (72% June vs 66% May), saving (65% June vs 58% May), employment (39% June vs 32% May), household income (58% June vs 53% May) and insurance (24% June vs 17% May) increasing in the June wave of the survey. Banking and finance (59%), superannuation (52%) and volunteering (39%) has changed but no changes in June from May wave of the survey.

A small proportion of Queenslanders are starting to emerge from restrictions and get back to before Covid-19 in the way they work, study or socialise (4%), Household income, savings (3%) and plan for holidays and travel (3%).

Physical health (51% June vs 41% May), mental health (54% June vs 47% May) and relationships with partners or spouses (24% June vs 19% May) has seen an increase in change from May to June.



### MENTAL HEALTH OF QUEENSLANDERS

Mental health indicators continues to show that Queenslanders are feeling restless, that everything is an effort, and nervous.

Overall at least two in three Queenslanders are feeling some symptoms of mental illness (restless or fidgety, everything was an effort, and nervous). Queenslanders in the survey who were in a casual or temporary position prior to Covid-19 are more likely to be feeling restless or fidgety (22%), hopeless (15%) or worthless (15%) most of the time which is higher than other Queenslanders (11%, 6%, 7% respectively).

Those Queenslanders surveyed that have had their employment impacted by Covid-19 restrictions are more likely to be showing signs of probable mental illness (23%) compared to those who have not had impact on their employment (9%). Self-employed or business owners are also more likely to be showing signs of probable mental illness (14%) compared to those who have not had impact on their business than those who are not impacted (8%). Queenslanders more likely to be showing signs of probable serious mental illness are young people 18-34 (22%) and casual or temporary employees (27%). Queenslanders who work in Retail (27%), Accommodation and Food Services (31%) and Information media and telecommunications (47%) are more likely to be showing symptoms of probable serious illness.

One in five Queenslanders were feeling happy that things seem to be returning to normal (21%) however one in ten are worried about a second wave (11%) on the day of the survey.

There are less people in June than May feeling happy about spending time with family (9%), impatient to get back to normal life (7%), curious about the impact on the world (7%), and concerned for the vulnerable and week (7%).

The same proportion of people in May as in June are feeling inspired by how people are adapting (4%), lonely (4%), anxious about my health (4%), bored (3% or angry and frustrated about the restrictions on their freedom (2%).



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## QUEENSLANDERS STILL FEEL WE GOT IT RIGHT

## Majority continue to feel Queenslanders are responding appropriately but some are worried about the economy.

In June eight out of ten (79%) Queenslanders in the survey felt that Queenslanders are responding appropriately to the threat of Coronavirus, which is the same proportion as in May (78%).

When asked in general about the global Covid-19 pandemic, a quarter of those surveyed said that the impact on Australian economy was their biggest worry (28%) and some said the risk to friends and family health (15%) or losing income due to salary reduction or investments (10%). A similar response when asked specifically what worries them most about the economic impacts of the Covid-19 a third of Queenslanders (36%) are most worried about the impact on the Australian Economy and 12% are worried about loosing income due to salary reduction or investments or loosing their job (10%).

### QUEENSLANDERS EXPECTATIONS ABOUT THE ECONOMY

#### Half continue to feel the worst is yet to come.

In June almost half of those surveyed (48%) feel that the worst is yet to come with the economy in Queensland.

The Far North HHS region were more likely to feel the worst is behind us (34%). Adults aged 18-34 years were more likely to feel that things are at their worst now (25%). Adults aged over 65 years were more likely to feel that the worst is yet to come (57%).

#### Half continue to feel full recovery in two years.

As restrictions are relaxed, Queensland's confidence that the economy will have made a full recovery to pre-COVID-19 levels increases in time, however less than half feel that will be in two years time (43%). No regional differences observed.

Those 18-34 year old Queenslanders surveyed are more optimistic (58%).

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## QUEENSLANDERS CONFIDENCE

## Half agree that QLD Government can manage the economic recovery.

In June half of Queenslanders surveyed (51%) felt confident that the Queensland Government can manage the economic recovery.

Adults aged 18-34 years were more likely to feel confident (61%).

## Half agree that QLD Government has handled Covid-19 for economic advantage in the long run.

As restrictions are relaxed, just over half (54%) Queensland's confidence that the Queensland Government has handled Covid-19 will be to the State's economic advantage in the long run. Those 18-39 year old Queenslanders surveyed are more optimistic (62%).

Those aware of the Economic Strategy are more likely to agree QLD Gov are handling for economic advantage in long run. 62% aware Vs 47% unaware

# SUPPORT FOR ECONOMIC INITIATIVES AND RECOVERY STRATEGY

#### Only a third have heard about the Economic Initiatives, and a quarter aware of the Economic Strategy. Of those aware of the strategy two thirds are supportive.

Those Queenslanders surveyed who were aware of the Roadmap to Easing Restrictions were more aware of initiatives (47%) and the strategy (40%) than if not (22%, 10% respectively). Males (40%) are more aware of major economic initiatives than females (31%). Queenslanders from Central Queensland HHS were more likely to be aware (41%) than those from other regions.

Of the 252 Queenslanders who were aware of the Economic Strategy, two thirds (65%) were supportive. Those who work in Financial and Insurance Services were more likely to oppose the State Government's Economic Recovery Strategy (54%) than Queenslanders surveyed who worked in other industries.

### **REASONS FOR SUPPORT**

"I am confident in the way the QLD government has managed the whole pandemic situation and will also manage the economic recovery. Queenslanders are resilient and are used to rebuilding and recovering after floods, cyclones etc."

*"Balanced approach, focus on unemployment, addressing issues with rental agreements, small business focus. Local tourism key."* 

"Because I think it balances the right amount of easing restrictions and supporting the needs of business without simply pointing the money hose at the problem or over-rushing it."

*"Ensuring people have jobs is extremely important in keeping the economy going, as well as preventing crime and homelessness."* 

"Because it is a clear plan and outlines the recovery strategy in simple terms."

Gradual easing of restrictions will see manageable increase in hospitality and tourism industries without a high risk/ upgrade to infrastructure is a good employment initiative without health risk."

"I believe identifying the industries that are now or will be most hit and putting money into projects or training/upskilling or rebates will help the economy recover. However I am unsure how you will support the individuals running super small business that only supports themselves and their families. The mums and dads doing part time businesses to keep their families afloat, but can't operate anymore. You've supplied money for the un-working poor, and incentives for the companies, but what about those in between who are furiously paddling trying to keep their heads above water, robbing Peter to pay the car payment."

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#### **REASONS TO OPPOSE**

"A lot of measures I have seen announced have already existed long before this. QGrants sports vouchers, storm preparation grants from Bundaberg and north, roads and infrastructure that was previously announced, planned and budgeted for. I think it is dishonest, and out of touch with the majority of people needs."

"Buying a airline like virgin who went broke is a bad idea in this situation, they need to open up the borders to get tourism and the money flowing and invest in new dams and making Qld drought proof."

"The non allowance of interstate travel is what is killing the QLD economy. Until the borders are open and the restrictions on businesses eased the QLD state will suffer dire economic consequences."

"The freezing of public servants wages takes money out of the economy, especially as cost of utilities continues to rise. This will reduce the amount of money being spent on items, further affecting businesses."

"They aren't doing much for small business. Only looking out for them selves. Trying to fool the public to try and get back in at the state election in October. Too little. Too late. Open up Nth Qld to full commerce. Too slow doesn't address core businesses of service and tourism."

"I feel we should open our borders."

"I was a long term Labor voter but now my business is almost gone, The Queensland Government has completely ruined Queensland! NO MORE LABOR!"

#### Some comments show people may have confused Australian Government initiatives:

"An example would be the home improvement grant of \$25,000 after people have committed to and spent \$150,000 on home renovations. Where do you think people are getting the money from for these renovations? How do you think they will afford financing repayments? Why would the government want to encourage further debt? Potentially leaning to people being unable to manage their home repayments and losing their homes, ending up on the street? Unrealistic."

#### NEUTRAL DON'T HAVE ENOUGH INFORMATION OR LACK TRUST

"I don't trust the government enough to assume that the money that they say will be invested will be spent in the right places. Also I couldn't find any source that states a contingency plan for the economy in case another wave hits."

"They are still looking at renewable energy sources with out properly consulting with the locals regarding the impacts to society In that area. They are being sneaky."

*"I am concerned that Queensland was already in trouble financially before Covid-19 and find it hard imagine how the State Government can successfully recover."* 

"The areas identified by the government are cherry picked."

"Not enough real information available. Too many mixed messages."

### INITIATIVES TO SUPPORT JOBS

## A third of Queenslanders (39%) surveyed feel that strengthening Queensland industries and sectors will work best to support Queensland Jobs.

Females are more likely (44%) than males (33%) to think strengthening Queensland industries and sectors will work best to support jobs. Those Queenslanders surveyed who are 18-34 year old were more likely to think providing skills and training will best support jobs (27%) than those over 65 years old (11%). Older Queenslanders over 65 years old (21%) or males (17%) were more likely to feel creating a competitive regulatory environment by reducing red tape would best support jobs than 18-24 year old (7%) or female (11%) Queenslanders surveyed.

# LEVEL OF GOVERNMENT RESPONSIBLE FOR ECONOMIC RECOVERY

## Half the Queenslanders surveyed (52%) believe the Federal Government has the most responsibility for economic recovery.

Queenslanders 18-34 years old are less likely to believe the Federal Government is responsible (43%) than other age groups. This age group is more likely to consider Local Government responsible (11%) than other age groups. Casual and temporary employees are most likely to think that State Government is responsible (56%).

#### Awareness of how Queensland Government is supporting Queenslanders needs to increase.

Only a third of self employed or small business owners (34%) feel supported by Government and just over a third (39%) Queenslanders surveyed feel Queensland Government is supporting small business. Half feel the Queensland Government are supporting the community (49%) but only one in four (42%) feel there is enough support for mental health and wellbeing. Neutral responses indicate that there is a lack of awareness about what Queensland Government is doing. Older Queenslanders over 65 years old (29%) and Self employed or small business owners (43%) were more likely to say that the Queensland Government is not supporting the small business. Older Queenslanders over 65 years old (24%), Males (20%) and those not aware of the Roadmap for Easing Restrictions (22%) were more likely to say that the QLD Government is not supporting the community. No statistical differences observed for mental health and wellbeing support.

### SECTORS DESERVING UNLIKELY TO BENEFIT

#### Queenslanders are not confident that the industries they think deserve support will be supported.

Whilst most feel that small business deserve support (83%) less than half (48%) believe they are likely to benefit. Two thirds feel Tourism deserves support (76%) but only half (55%) believe they are likely to get it. This is a similar story for Agriculture (76% deserve, 55% benefit), Manufacturing (76% deserve, 55% benefit), housing (69% deserve, 44% benefit) and infrastructure (69% deserve, 48% benefit).

## PRIORITIES IN DECISION MAKING ABOUT BORDERS

#### Half Queenslanders surveyed (51%) believe the highest priority when making decisions is health risk.

One in five Queenslanders surveyed (21%) believe that getting business up and running with no restrictions for Queenslanders first before opening borders is the highest priority, whilst 15% believe the economic risk of border closure should be the priority.

Females are more likely to prioritise health risk (57%) than males (45%).

Males are more likely to priorities economic risk (19%) than females (11%).

Younger Queenslanders 18-34 years old are more likely to prioritise health risk to those travelling to Queensland (13%) than other age groups.

Those that are aware of the Economic Strategy are less likely to prioritise economic risk due to border closure than those unaware of the strategy. 14% aware Vs 19% unaware

#### CONFIDENCE INCREASED FROM MAY TO JUNE ON MANAGING THE EASE OF RESTRICTIONS

#### Health rules and social distancing etiquette important to most Queenslanders.

Two thirds (67%) of Queenslanders surveyed in June are confident that Queensland Government can manage the easing of restrictions which has increased since May (59%).

Most Queenslanders surveyed felt that it was important to be patient and understanding with service staff in hospitality and other service jobs who are complying with social distancing rules (93%), to keep good distance on public transport (87%), leave 1.5 metre space when queuing (86%) and physically distancing from others outside their household (85%).

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# INFORMATION

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## QUEENSLANDERS STAYING INFORMED AND SENTIMENT IMPROVED

Most Queenslanders know how to prevent the spread of coronavirus (91%), what the current levels of restrictions are (78%), and stages of restrictions (71%), but less than a third are aware of how the Queensland economy will recover (31%). In June almost a quarter (73%) of Queenslanders surveyed think Queensland Government is a trustworthy source of information which has increased since May (55%). Similarly, Queenslanders in June feel that Queensland Government has managed better than other states (72%) which has increased since May (53%).

#### AWARENESS OF ROADMAP

#### Fewer people in June were aware of the roadmap (52%) than in May (59%).

Those that are aware of the Roadmap to Easing Restrictions are more likely to feel confident that the Queensland Government is a trustworthy source of information. There were less statistical differences between those that were aware and sentiment questions in June than in May.

### THE ROADMAP SOURCES OF INFORMATION

Queenslanders surveyed aware of the Roadmap, sourced it from Television news or other media (65%), from the Premier's announcements (40%), Facebook (35%), the Chief Health Officer (24%) or the Queensland Government Coronavirus website (25%).

While no difference is seen between South East Queenslanders and the Rest of Queensland in their way to source roadmap information, other channel differences observed:

- Males are more likely to have seen or heard of the Roadmap on TV News (73%), Newspapers (25%) or YouTube (9%).
- 18-39 year old Queenslanders are more likely to have seen or heard of the Roadmap on Facebook (50%), YouTube (13%) or Instagram (7%), rather than TV (51%) or through announcements from the Premier (30%).
- 65 years and older are less likely see or hear about the Roadmap on Facebook (19%).
- Carers are more likely to have seen or heard of the Roadmap through Facebook (42%), as are people working in Retail Trade (65%).
- Retail Trade workers also tend to be informed through the QLD Department of small businesses (16%), so are people working in Media / Communication, who are also more likely to use the Australian Government website (50%).

### **KEEPING BORDERS CLOSED**

The current health advice from the Chief Health Officer is to keep some borders between states closed until there are no hot spots of positive coronavirus cases in other states. Do you support this position?

Three quarters (74%) of Australians are happy with some border closures to keep safe.

Eight out of ten Queenslanders (82%) agree to keep some borders closed until there are no hot spots of positive coronavirus cases in other states. Brisbane were less likely to agree (78%) than rest of Queensland (86%).

Tasmanians (91%) and Western Australians (89%) are most likely to agree, whilst New South Wales (60%) and ACT (70%) are less likely to agree.

#### APPROPRIATE PROCESS

## The Chief Health Officer reviews the restriction regarding border closure at the end of each month. Do you think this is appropriate procedure and timing?

Half (55%) of Australians believe the current procedure for reviewing border closure is appropriate and 38% feel it is an appropriate procedure but should be reviewed more often.

Six out of ten Queenslanders (60%) believe the current procedure for reviewing border closure is appropriate and 36% feel it is an appropriate procedure but should be reviewed more often. Brisbane are more likely to say that the procedure is appropriate but there needs to be a review more often (47%) than the rest of Queensland (26%).

ACT (81%) most likely to agree with the procedure and timing, with the NT (note: small sample size) most likely to want more frequent reviews (50%).

### REASONS FOR TIMING AND PROCEDURE ACCEPTANCE

#### Procedure and timing appropriate

For those that think the procedure and timing is appropriate most said that it would cover the overlap of a 14 day incubation and there was enough time to see an outbreak occur, others heed caution to take it slowly, be smart and stay safe. The cold snap and a reminder that winter is coming had some survey respondents concerned for a second wave of the virus.

#### Procedure appropriate but timing more often

For those that think the procedure is appropriate but that the time it is reviewed should occur more frequently, most felt that it is a rapidly evolving situation. Some answered that they felt if a breakout occurred they would not like to wait a month for a review. A few seemed to disagree with border closure in the first place and were in a hurry to lift them. A common theme was the need to review regularly because the economy is suffering and opening the borders is seen to enable the recovery.

"The curve has flattened on the COVID - 19 and our economy requires immediate kick start."

"Matter may change within the period of a fortnight. This period would be a better review period."

"Most, if not all hot spots relate to prior overseas travel & therefore the mandatory requirements of isolation apply. This is not reflective of the situation with the overall population, but the current restrictions are now doing more harm than good."

"All borders should be open, we are one country."

## **GLOBAL STUDY RESULTS FOR AUSTRALIA** Additional data from another tracker

#### About the Study

These are the results from Ipsos Essentials, a weekly global syndicated study examining the opinions and behaviours as countries move through the pandemic. These results were collected May 21st to 24th, 2020 using an online methodology 16,000 adults aged 18-74 years in Canada and the United States and 16-74 years in Australia, Brazil, China, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, India, Japan, Mexico, Russia, South Africa, South Korea and the United Kingdom.

The sample for this study consists of approximately 1,000 individuals in each country. The samples in Australia, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, Japan, South Korea, the U.K. and the U.S. can be taken as representative of these countries' general adult population over age 16 or 18 (as above) and under the age of 75. The sample in Brazil, China, India, Mexico, Russia, and South Africa is more urban, more educated and/or more affluent than the general population and should be viewed as reflecting the views of the more "connected" segment of the population. The data is weighted so that each market's sample composition best reflects the demographic profile of the adult population according to the most recent census data.
