



Investing in Townsville's economic recovery

To support Townsville's ongoing economic recovery, the Queensland Government is providing \$21.4 million in the North Queensland region across 30 projects to support around 293 iobs

This regional funding forms part of the \$80 million investment in 2021-22 in the \$200 million COVID Works for Queensland program, which is supporting local governments to undertake job-creating new infrastructure, maintenance and minor works projects. The program is also bringing forward planned and budgeted maintenance or capital works that are focused on essential services, economic development and community wellbeing outcomes.

From the available \$200 million investment, \$150 million has been allocated across regional councils outside of South East Queensland. In the Townsville region, five local councils to receive program funding include Townsville City Council, Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council, Charters Towers Regional Council, and Hinchinbrook and Burdekin Shire Councils.

Townsville projects set to benefit from the investment include the construction of an apator at the Ross River Dam, an upgrade of the water main at Cleveland Bay, and the replacement of water pipes across a number of Townsville suburbs.

The Oasis Townsville

The Oasis Townsville is a purpose-built hub in Townsville that will support veterans and defence families through the experience of transition to civilian life. The Oasis Townsville will focus on the needs of veterans, Australian Defence Force (ADF) families and the ex-ADF community in Townsville, offering support for illness and disability, helping to find secure employment, and financial literacy skills.

A Queensland Government election commitment of \$1 million over 4 years to The Oasis Townsville will contribute to the operating costs of the new facility including the employment of staff and will support the free use of the facilities for organisations and associations of the ADF community. In 2021-22, \$150,000 out of the \$1 million total spend will provide support services to veterans and their families, with the \$9.3 million centre opening in June 2021.

Tax relief package

The government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium businesses
- a payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals to eligible taxpayers.

An estimated 300 employers in Townsville will also benefit in 2021-22 from the higher payrol tax threshold.



\$2 billion Queensland Renewable Energy and Hydrogen Jobs Fund


The \$2 billion Queensland Renewable Energy and Hydrogen Jobs Fund will provide cheaper, cleaner energy to power more jobs and industries in Queensland, while helping to deliver on our 50 per cent renewable energy target by 2030.

The Fund will increase investment by government-owned corporations in commercial renewable energy and hydrogen projects, along with supporting infrastructure, including in partnership with the private sector.

Forming part of the new \$3.34 billion Queensland Jobs Fund, this investment will ensure Queensland capitalises on economic development opportunities and creates more jobs and industries through cheaper, cleaner energy.




2021-22 expenses

Natural Disaster Support and Preparedness – Townsville

Recommended response

- The Government is committed to assisting Queenslanders and their communities prepare for and recover from natural disasters.
- Since 2011, approximately \$170M has been approved in disaster recovery and resilience funding for Townsville.
- In response to the 2019 Monsoon Floods:
 - Townsville City Council (TCC) was approved for approximately \$31.3M for response, emergency works and the repair of essential public infrastructure under the jointly State and Federal governments funded Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA); and
 - approximately \$52M in DRFA Category C and D extraordinary assistance was approved to support economic and community recovery in the Townsville region.
- To assist communities to better prepare for natural disasters, the State and Federal governments have invested \$18.7M in various household, community and TCC resilience programs.

Key facts

Household Resilience Grants Program

- Rounds 1 and 2 of the resilience grants for households in cyclone affected areas, such as Townsville, have seen a total of **1,194 projects** approved grants for **a total of \$12.79M** with a total work value of \$20.7M.
- Grants are used for projects such as roof replacements/roof tie downs, window protections, garage doors and external doors

Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements

- Prior to the 2019 Monsoon Floods, TCC was activated for joint State and Federal governments Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements (NDRRA) funding following natural disasters in 2011, 2012, 2014, 2017 and 2018, which included Tropical Cyclones Yasi and Debbie.
- TCC's combined NDRRA-funded restoration programs from these events was approximately \$130M. These works are complete.

- TCC was also activated for DRFA assistance for Tropical Cyclone Imogen, 2-12 January 2021.
- This assistance is for counter disaster operations aimed at immediate clean-up and community safety activities (e.g. removing trees and debris) and the restoration of essential public assets.
- TCC's program of works associated with TC Imogen is estimated at approximately \$7.9M. Works associated with TC Imogen are due for completion by 30 June 2023 and are funded under the DRFA.
- The economic and community support provided by the approximate \$52M approved in DRFA Category C/D funding includes:
 - \$30.4M distributed in personal hardship assistance to more than 60,400 people;
 - \$12M in grants to 964 small businesses;
 - \$1.5M in grants to 119 not-for-profit organisations;
 - \$5.9M in grants to 163 primary producers;
 - \$1.3M distributed in flexible funding grants; and
 - \$950,000 for the small business recovery centre.
- Works associated with the 2019 Monsoon Floods were due for completion by 30 June 2021.

Natural Disaster Resilience Program

• TCC had **\$315,000** approved as part of the joint State-Federal governments 2018 Natural Disaster Resilience Program fund to improve the resilience of the Town Water Supply infrastructure. This project was completed in October 2019.

Queensland Resilience and Risk Reduction Fund

• In September 2020, TCC had **\$67,500** approved under the 2019-20 Queensland Resilience and Risk Reduction Fund to develop and launch a community Flood Information Portal providing in real time recent rainfall and river height reports. This project is due for completion by 30 June 2022.

Get Ready Queensland

- Since 2018, TCC has had \$310,000 approved in Get Ready Queensland funding rounds to improve the community's resilience to disasters.
- Current activities include:

- purchase of an automatic sandbagging machine;
- disaster risk profile project; and
- community engagement/communication activities.

Background

- The eligibility guidelines for reconstruction projects under DRFA are set by the Federal Government. Under the DRFA, any expenditure that does not meet these eligibility requirements cannot be reimbursed.
- The DRFA infrastructure package was fully allocated across the 39 eligible councils.

Water Infrastructure and Supply

Recommended response

- The Government is committed to securing the water supply of the city of Townsville and provided **\$195M in funding for Townsville City Council to progress with Stage Two** of the Haughton Pipeline Project **supporting roughly 500 jobs**.
- Now complete, Stage One saw 1,000 workers engaged with some 200 businesses involved either directly or indirectly.
- We announced we would go it alone with the \$195M investment in stage two of the pipeline to stop the LNP Federal Government from dudding the people of Townsville.
- In addition to the Haughton Pipeline, we are currently assessing an additional three other key water infrastructure projects that will transform North Queensland:
 - Urannah Dam
 - Hells Gate Dam including Big Rocks Weir, and
 - Raising Burdekin Falls Dam.

Key facts

Haughton Pipeline Project

- In August 2020, the State Government announced it would fully fund Stage Two of the Haughton Pipeline Project resolving a long-running dispute with the Federal Government about the possible loss of \$156M in revenue from GST calculations.
- Stage Two of the Haughton Pipeline Project will see the pipeline extended to Clare, allowing water to be drawn directly from the Burdekin River and will include around 33 km of pipe as well as the construction of a new pump station and high voltage power supply infrastructure.
- Work to connect Stage One of the pipeline to Stage Two is ongoing with the tender for the construction of Stage Two to be released soon (in early 2022).
- Townsville City Council (TCC) is funding all costs above the \$195M provided by the State Government and means TCC will need to provide up to \$79M for the project.

• Construction of the pipeline and pump station is expected to be complete by the end of 2024 with testing and commissioning to be finalised by March 2025.

<u>Urannah Dam Project</u>

- In May 2020, the Urannah Dam project was declared a Coordinated Project.
- Urannah Dam is being funded by \$22.65M under National Water Infrastructure Development Fund (NWIDF). The dam is part of the Urannah Water Scheme project which will generate approximately 1,200 jobs during construction, and more than 650 jobs once fully operational.
- Bowen River Utilities (BRU) is undertaking the assessment to deliver the detailed business case (DBC) for the Urannah water scheme and develop the environmental impact statement (EIS) for the Urannah proposal that includes the water scheme, Collinsville irrigation precinct and renewal energy hub (including pumped hydro).
- The DBC was provided to the Federal Government in June 2021.
- BRU is continuing to develop the EIS and undertake several detailed technical assessments to progress the project.
- At the completion of the detailed technical assessments and EIS, BRU will be revising the DBC with consideration of the findings and potential changes to key inputs to provide a revised DBC or addendum to the DBC.
- The detailed technical assessments and submission of the EIS to the Coordinator General is expected to be completed in late 2022.

Hells Gates Darn, including Big Rocks Weir project

- Hells Gate Dam and Big Rocks Weir project is supported by \$24M from the NWIDE.
- Townsville Enterprise Limited (TEL) is undertaking the assessment to deliver the DBC and undertake environmental assessments for the Hells Gates Dam and Big Rocks Weir project.

Big Rocks Weir

• Big Rocks Weir would be located on the Burdekin River and augment urban water supply, support local agriculture, create jobs and improve water security for the region.

- Charters Towers Regional Council (CTRC) estimates the project would have a capital cost of about \$60M and create 172 jobs during construction and one to two operational jobs.
- The Big Rocks Weir DBC was completed in October 2020, as a standalone infrastructure option and provided to the Federal Government.
- CTRC is undertaking pre-construction activities for the Big Rocks Weir proposal which are being supported by \$6M comprising of \$3M for the State Government and \$3M from the Federal Government.
- The State Government committed a further \$27M to support construction subject to the outcomes of the pre-construction work and final investment decision.
- In March 2021, the Big Rocks Weir Project was declared a coordinated project and the final terms of reference for undertaking the environmental impact statement were released in July 2021.
- CTRC is scheduled to complete the pre-construction activities in late-2022.

Hells Gate Dam

- TEL is continuing to develop the DBC and undertaking associated environmental assessments for the Hells Gates Dam option.
- In lieu of a formal environmental impact statement process being undertaken, TEL will be developing an Environmental and Social Impact Report as part of the project.
- The final Hells Gates Dam DBC is expected to be completed towards mid-2022.

Raising Burdekin Falls Dam and safety improvements

- The Coordinator-General declared the raising of Burdekin Falls Dam a Coordinated Project.
- Raising Burdekin Falls Dam is the Government's priority proposal to increase water supply for the Burdekin and surrounding region.
- The dam safety improvement project and raising project is advancing as a combined detailed business case, allowing for a comprehensive assessment of all proposed structural changes and consideration of a combined design solution which could result in significant savings in construction costs.

CTPI Sch 4, Part 3, factor 20

- The budgeted amount for the combined DBC and associated activities, including design and environmental assessment, is \$34M, which will be funded by Sunwater.
- Sunwater's preliminary business case and recent market research show there is sufficient customer interest and future demand from potential agricultural and industrial users to justify more detailed investigation into raising Burdekin Falls Dam.
- Concurrently, the Burdekin Falls Dam Improvement Project is being undertaken to ensure the dam continues to function in line with the latest dam safety guidelines and engineering standards and withstand potential extreme rainfall events.



• An environmental impact statement (EIS) will also be delivered as part of the work that Senwater is undertaking.

 The investment decision on raising the dam needs to be considered within the context of other potential projects in the Burdekin system, such as Urannah Dam, and ongoing negotiations with the Australian Government regarding a broader Burdekin infrastructure study which DOCUMENTS Release Copy RTID 580 Part 1 - 38 of 72 may inform the selection of a preferred upgrade option to carry through the EIS process.

LNP

- The LNP have an unfunded pipedream.
- Their only record on water infrastructure in Townsville is dudding the people of Townsville by not funding Stage Two of the Haughton Pipeline.

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COVID-19 – Economic Support and Recovery

Recommended response

- The Government has been quick to respond to COVID-19 pandemic.
- To support business and families, the Government has invested \$8 billion in a range of assistance initiatives and job creating projects.
- In the Townsville region, we have assisted businesses through:
 - \$10.87M in Small Business support and adaption grants supporting 1,190 businesses in the Townsville area; and
 - \$37.7M from our \$1 billion Jobs Support Loan scheme to 249 businesses in Townsville area supporting 3,131 jobs locally;
 - **\$1.15M in Payroll Tax Relief** to 38 businesses in Townsville area.
- As our State continues to open, we will continue to work with the Federal Government, so businesses and industry get the necessary support.
- Securing game one of the 2021 State of Origin series for Townsville was a fantastic win for Townsville and injected around \$7M into the local economy.



COVID-19 – Tourism Support and Recovery

Recommended response

- The tourism industry was one of the first industries to be directly and significantly impacted by COVID-19 with devastating impacts.
- This is an industry that supported **one in 10 Queensland jobs** before the Coronavirus pandemic.
- For the first time a regional centre hosted a State of Origin match at Townsville's Country Bank Stadium in June 2021.
- The first game of the 2021 State of Origin series on 9 June 2021, was supported by three of Australia's top musical acts which made a fantastic event for everyone.
- The State of Origin injected around \$7M into the local economy, with.
 - airlines providing additional flights;
 - all accommodation booked out;
 - a temporary tent city created to provide more accommodation.
- As part of our \$15M Queensland Domestic Aviation Route Restart Program across the State.
- Funding from the fund was used by Townsville Airport to support Airnorth Darwin-Townsville - additional one service per week to generate \$0.1M in overnight expenditure and support 1 job.
- For the week commencing 17 January 2022, schedules for the Townsville Airport indicates it is operating at 19,000 inbound seats 10% less capacity compared to 2019.
- Through our \$1 billion concessional Jobs Support Loan scheme, tourism businesses in Townsville received \$5.73M supporting 380 local jobs.

• Accommodation occupancy levels saw month on month growth across 2021.

- The Townsville region reported relatively strong last-minute bookings for the 10-16 January 2022 period equivalent to occupancy levels of 8.5 percentage points.
- New bookings for the 17-23 January 2022 period were moderate, increasing by 4.5 percentage points.

Covid-19 cases

- Across **Queensland**, **298,194 cases** of Covid-19 were recorded, of which **86,036** were **active** cases and 85 people had died.
- Across the **Townsville Hospital and Health Service** (HHS), **5,994 cases** of Covid-19 were recorded, of which **241** were **active** cases. No deaths have been recorded in the Townsville HHS area.
- Townsville HHS was managing:
 - 29 in-patients with Covid-19, including 3 patients in ICU; and
 - 212 people with Covid-19 at home.
- Within the council areas, there were:
 - 141 cases within the Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council area
 - 4,267 cases within in the Townsville City Council area.

Vaccinations

- Across Queensland, 89% of people are fully vaccinated and 91.8% have received at least one dose.
- THHS administered a total of 225,111 vaccine doses. Within the council areas, there were:
- 1,619 doses provided at the Palm Island Outreach facility; and
- 200,010 doses provided at 44 various Townsville City Council locations.

Staff impacts

- Townsville HPS had:
 - 118 staff registered as being Covid-19 positive;
 - 6 staff were quarantined; and
 - no staff were in the workplace under Critically Essential Worker Provision.

<u>Infrastructure</u>

• In September 2020, the Government committed \$1.5M for the preliminary business case for the expansion of the Townsville University Hospital to cater for future demand.

- In addition, by teaming up with the Mater Private Hospital we are delivering state-of-the-art robotic surgery in Townsville in 2021.
- In October 2020, Deputy Premier Steven Miles announced an extra \$25M to deliver more services at Townsville University Hospital towards:
 - a Hybrid Theatre to deliver more surgeries;
 - expansion of the outpatient department; and
 - upgrade of the Persistent Pain Management Services.

Key facts

- The 2021-22 Townsville HHS budget is for **\$1.13 billion in operational funding**, an increase of **\$32M** compared to the previous budget.
- In addition, we've committed millions of dollars in upgrades to Townsville health infrastructure.
- There are more than 5,500 staff in the Townsville HHS making it one of the largest employers in the region.
- Since 2015, in the Townsville region, my Government has hired:
 - 146 more doctors; and
 - 255 more nurses and midwives.

<u>\$10.4M Townsville University Hospital - Medical Outpatients Clinics</u> (Renal and Endoscopy)

 Redeveloped clinical services area to increase capacity and improve patient flows. Project was completed in March 2020 and supported 31 FTEs during construction.

<u>\$1.6M Townsville University Hospital – Emergency Department (ED)</u> <u>Paediatric Redevelopment</u>

• Developed a dedicated paediatric area within ED to streamline younger patients attending ED. The child-friendly designed area has 12 bays and a special waiting room. On 2 June 2021, the paediatric ED redevelopment was officially opened and supported 5 FTEs during construction.

<u>\$10.1M Townsville University Hospital – reconfigure High Dependency</u> <u>Unit, Adult Acute Mental Health Inpatient Unit</u>

• Project will reconfigure the units and is expected to improve patient and staff safety. The project is expected to be completed September 2022 and support 30 FTEs during construction.

<u>\$12.98M Townsville University Hospital – South Block – 33 bed ward</u>

 Project is refurbishing a shell space into a new 33 bed ward – Acute Medical Receiving Unit. Project is expected to be completed October 2022 and is supporting 38 FTEs during construction.

\$40M Kirwan Health Campus - Expansion and Refurbishment

- State funding to refurbish and develop the campus in alignment with Master plan stage 1A (2020 Election Commitment):
 - expand the Kirwan Health Centre to provide women and children's outpatient clinics, and oral health services;
 - refurbish the oral health clinical space with an additional chair and refurbish space for a nearby multipurpose room.
- In February 2021, approval was given to develop a combined Preliminary Business Case (PBC) / Detailed Business Case (DBC). Townsville HIAS is engaging the resources to develop the DBC.

• In October 2020, approval was given for a PBC for the expansion of the hospital.

<u>\$17M Townsville University Hospital – Hybrid Theatre</u>

• In December 2020, approval was given for this project to proceed to deliver a hybrid theatre to Townsville University Hospital within the footprint of the old day surgery unit.

\$4M Townsville University Hospital – Outpatients Department – PBC/DBC

• To expand the outpatient department to reduce waiting times. Construction is expected to occur between April 2023 and February 2024 and is expected to support 11 FTEs during construction.

<u>\$4M Townsville University Hospital – North Queensland Persistent Pain</u> <u>Management Service</u>

• To amalgamate North Queensland's persistent pain management services. Construction is expected to commence in March 2024 and is expected to support 11 FTEs during construction.

Renal Services – Expansion

- <u>\$4.6M</u> provided in 2017-18 to expand the renal dialysis unit, Townsville University Hospital – increasing capacity from 17 to 30 chairs and provides for emergency haemodialysis, the most intensive treatment of people with complex renal failure.
- \$27.8M for 33 renal dialysis treatment spaces at Proserpine, Clermont, <u>Charters Towers</u>, Ingham and Longreach hospitals, the Cooktown Multipurpose Health Service and Kowanyama Primary Health Care Centre (2020 election commitment).
- Townsville HHS has been able to support increased clinical staffing through the \$1.55M North Queensland renal fund for Townsville and Palm Island.
- Townsville HHS has undertaken work to improve the supports for renal dialysis patients through the Advancing Kidney Collaborative.
- Detailed planning for satellite projects in Ingham and Charters Towers has been undertaken.
- In June 2021, the Government announced the North Queensland Kidney Transplant Service would be based in Townsville.

Waiting Lists

Elective Surgery Waitlist

- Between 1 June 2020 and 30 September 2021, 15,164 patients were added to the Elective Surgery Waitlist.
- As at 1 October 2021, the <u>Elective Surgery Ready for Surgery</u> <u>Waitlists</u> showed:
 - ready for surgery waitlist decreased from 4,402 (as at 1 June 2020) to 3,277 a reduction of 1,125; and
 - <u>ready for surgery long waitlist</u> decreased from 584 (as at 1 June 2020) to 31 a reduction of 443.

Specialist Outpatient Department (SOPD) Waitlist

- Between 1 June 2020 and 31 August 2021, 49,189 patients were added to the SOPD Waitlist.
- As at 1 September 2021, the <u>SOPD Ready for Care Waitlists</u> showed:
 - the <u>SOPD ready for care waitlist</u> increased from 8,644 (as at 1 June 2020) to 12,585 a growth of 3,941; and
 - the <u>SOPD ready for care long waitlist</u> increased from 620 (as at 1 June 2020) to 1,569 a growth of 949.

Gastrointestinal Endoscopy Waitlist

- Between 1 June 2020 and 31 August 2021, 7,541 patients were added to the Gastrointestinal Endoscopy (GIE) Procedures Waitlist.
- As at 1 September 2021, the <u>GIE procedures waitlists</u> showed:
 - the <u>GIE procedures waitlist</u> increased from 776 (as at 1 June 2020) to 901 a growth of 125; and
 - the <u>GIE procedures long waitlist</u> increased from 8 (as at 1 June 2020) to 31 a growth of 23.

Achievements

- \$9.3M for The Oasis in Townsville to provide a one stop shop for support services for veterans and their families. (\$5M:\$4.3M Fed:State funding) – 24 FTE construction jobs – completed.
- \$334M Townsville University Hospital expansion completed 2018
- \$6.6M Children's Ward at Townsville University Hospital delivered in May 2018.

- \$16.5M Primary Health Care Centre including at Maternal and Child Health Clinic and Social and Emotional Wellbeing clinic for the Palm Island Community – completed.
- Townsville HHS multidisciplinary Chronic Kidney Disease team delivers successful individualised programmes to prevent kidney failure and manage kidney disease.

LNP

• The LNP when last in Government cut 398 frontline health jobs across Townsville, including 156 nurses.

Background

Renal Services

- As part of phase 1 the renal unit decanted 17 chairs in November 2019.
- The additional chairs were opened in early 2020 taking the total number of chairs to 30.
- The unit treats approximately 48 50 patients each day.

Major Road and Transport Upgrades – Townsville

Recommended response

- Queensland's economic recovery plan is about building the infrastructure we need to create jobs.
- That's why we have committed to <u>\$52.2 billion over 4 years</u> towards job creating infrastructure across the state.
- That plan includes a jointly-funded \$13 billion for the Bruce Highway.
- My Government is delivering **\$1.18 billion** to upgrade North Queensland roads.
- This follows more than **\$790M** in road projects completed over the last four years in North Queensland.

Key facts

- Recent projects completed include:
 - \$514.3M Bruce Highway Haughton River Floodplain upgrade supporting 544 jobs – completed October-2021 with ancillary works expected to continue till late-2022;
 - \$29.17M Bruce Highway safety upgrades, Bambaroo (Hechts Road to Easter Creek) - supporting 49 jobs and completed November-2021;
 - \$5M Flinders Highway intersection upgrade (Woodstock Giru Road
 / Glenn Road) wholly funded by the Queensland Government, supported 9 jobs completed December 2020; and
 - \$44.14M Bruce Highway safety upgrades between Mackenzie Creek and Mailman Road – supported 89 jobs – completed November 2020.
- Projects underway right now include:
 - \$230M Townsville Ring Road Stage 5 between Vickers Bridge and Shaw Road – expected to support 398 jobs – due to be completed early-2023; and
 - \$232M Townsville Channel Upgrade Project is in progress and the channel dredging stage is expected to commence in the second half of 2021 – supporting as 120 jobs, with the whole project expected to be completed in 2023.

- Projects being constructed include:
 - \$107.65M Townsville Northern Access Intersection upgrade (Bruce Highway) at Black River – supporting 178 jobs – construction expected to be completed by early-2023;
 - \$95M Riverway Drive Stage 2 this is a priority for my Government estimated to support 140 jobs – construction expected to commence in mid-2022 and be completed by mid-2024;
 - \$8.9M Hervey Range Development Road supporting 14 jobs with construction commencing in March 2021 and expected to be completed by late-2021;
 - \$46.4M Townsville Connection Road Stuart Drive Upgrades a Queensland Government funded project is in the planning phase which is due to be completed by Jun-2022 with construction expected to commence in mid-2023;
 - \$33.39M Flinders Highway (Townsville Charters Towers), Townsville to Mingela Range – overtaking lanes – supporting 76 jobs – construction expected to commence in mid-2022 and be completed by mid-2023; and
 - \$12M Improve truck access to the Lansdown Industrial Precinct wholly funded by the Queensland Government by way of Local Government Grant to the Townsville City Council, with works expected to be completed in mid-2023. This is a 2020 Election Commitment.

LNP

- The LNP cut \$600M from Queensland's road budget
- Sacked 20 per cent Main Roads staff, including 700 RoadTek road builders and cut long-term planning for roads.

Policing and Youth Crime

POLICE NUMBERS

- Townsville Police District has 712 permanent positions, <u>up 106</u> <u>since 2015.</u>
- In early 2020, Paul Taylor was appointed Deputy Commissioner, Regional Queensland (Townsville).
- It was fantastic to announce in September 2020, an additional 2,025 police personal across the state.
- This is a \$624M investment over five years for 2,025 new police personnel. Of those 1,450 will be deployed to the frontline which means at least 150 positions will be located per key region across the state.
- We're also investing in 25 mobile police vans that will take police into the heart of the community.
- There are more than 12,000 police officers in Queensland a record number. <u>Under Labor, there are more police in Queensland than</u> <u>ever before with more on the way.</u>
- And we back police 100% in what they do best keeping communities safe, providing them with the necessary equipment, like body worn cameras, new vehicles and tasers.

CRIME STATS

- From 1 July 2021 to 31 December 2021, the overall rate of **Total Reported Crime** for the Townsville Police District **increased by 2,975 offences or 16 per cent** compared with previous year.
- From 1 July 2021 to 31 December 2021, compared with the previous year, the rate of:
 - Offences Against the Person increased by 1,534 or 82 per cent;
 - Offences Against Property increased by 1,942 or 33 per cent; and
 - Other Offences decreased by 501 offences or 6 per cent.

INFRASTRUCTURE

• \$30M Kirwan replacement police facility which is currently in the design phase.

RECENT POLICE OPERATIONS

Operation Tango Pheasant and Operation Uniform Cygnus

- The operation, which targeted property crime, ran from 1 January to 31 December 2021 and resulted in the arrest of 854 offenders on 3,352 charges.
- Tango-Pheasant has been replaced by Operation Uniform Cygnus, which commenced on 1 January 2022. As at 19 January 2022, there have been 15 arrests on 60 charges.

YOUTH CRIME

- In response to community concerns, I announced a <u>\$15.8M</u> Five-Point Action Plan:
 - Offenders posing a risk to the community should not get bail.
 - A police blitz on bail, appealing court decisions where appropriate.
 - A 24/7 Police Strike Team.
 - Culture-based rehabilitation for Indigenous offenders through new On Country initiatives.
 - Empowering local communities in the war on crime with \$2M for community-based organisations for local solutions.

Youth Crime facts

- As at 19 January, Townsville Justice Service Centres provide supervision to 180 young people.
- For noting, compared to 2019-20, data for 2020-21 indicates increases in the number of proven offences and distinct young people with a proven offence. This is due to the COVID-19 pandemic response, which resulted in delayed court processes and delays in finalising charges (with finalisations occurring in 2020-21).
- As a result, offending data for 2019-20 appears to be lower than usual, while 2020-21 appears to be higher than usual. To provide a more accurate picture of overall trends over time, 2020-21 data should be compared to 2018-19.
- Based on data provide by the courts, comparing 2020-21 to 2018-19 there was:
 - a 45 per cent increase in the number of proven offences committed in Townsville by 10-17-year-olds.

- a 15 per cent decrease in the number of distinct 10-17-year-old offenders, with at least one proven offence committed in Townsville.
- 24/7 Youth Co-responder Teams involve police and youth justice workers engaging and diverting repeat offenders from the justice system in five locations, including Townsville. The first Townsville 24/7 team commenced on 1 July 2020 with a second team operating from 24 June 2021.
- From July to 31 December 2021, Townsville 24/7 teams engaged with young people and families on 5,653 occasions.

LNP

- In the LNP's Police budget in 2012-13:
 - Townsville Police were told to tighten their belts.
 - Funding for new operational equipment for police fell from \$77.5M to \$53.8M.
 - At the time, I am advised Townsville's senior police were warned vital equipment, such as extra cars and computers were not purchased to cater for new recruits.
 - The LNP budget for new and upgraded equipment, including vehicles, boats and traffic cameras, was the lowest in 3 years.
 - And they planned to sell the Townsville Policy Academy where those recruits did their training.
- The LNP had its chance to stamp out youth crime. It didn't work.
- The LNP voted against our amendments to get tough on bail.

Schools – Overview

Recommended response

- We are investing **\$1.4 billion in 2021-22 to build, maintain and improve schools across the state**.
- We are building 3 new schools to be opened next year in 2022 and we are planning for a new school in Brisbane's inner west over the coming years and substantially expanding 13 existing schools during 2021-22.
- Since coming to Government in 2015, we have opened <u>26 new</u> <u>schools.</u>
- My Government is also investing \$20M for planning and land acquisitions for a further 16 new schools beyond 2023.
- Queensland is a growing state and we are delivering the infrastructure and educational facilities needed to support this growth.
- Of the 39 facilities within the Townsville City Council and Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council areas:
 - one new school opened in 2018, the \$51.9M North Shore State School;
 - major infrastructure work carried out at 23 schools totalling around \$45M;
 - \$43.6M worth of works at 14 schools is in progress or being planned and includes 2 multi-purpose halls at Pimlico and Thuringowa state high schools;
 - all facilities have air conditioning with air-conditioning replaced at one school under the Cooler Cleaner Schools Program (CCSP); and
 - all school have solar panels, 32 schools had solar panels installed through the Advancing Clean Energy Schools (ACES) program.
- All Queensland state school classrooms, libraries and staff rooms are to be air conditioned by the end of June 2022, delivering more comfortable teaching and learning environments for our students, teachers and school communities.

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Bruce Highway

Recommended response

- Queensland's economic recovery plan is about building the infrastructure we need to create jobs.
- That plan includes a **jointly-funded \$13 billion for the Bruce Highway** to improve flood resilience and safety and increase capacity.
- The Bruce is Queensland's backbone and upgrades are underway or about to start in Cairns, Townsville, Mackay, Rockhampton, Gympie and the Sunshine Coast, supporting thousands of jobs.
- This government has also established a Bruce Highway Trust to take the politics out of the Bruce and lock in a long-term pipeline of jobs and infrastructure upgrades, with members from peak Queensland industry and business bodies.
- In September 2021, the Government also appointed six regional members to the Trust, to make sure the funding was going to where it's needed most.
- Locally we are jointly funding Bruce Highway upgrades including:
 - \$44.14M Mailman Road to Mackenzie Creek (south of Townsville) safety upgrades –completed November 2020;
 - \$514.3M Haughton River Floodplain (Giru) upgrade supported 544 jobs – completed October-2021 with ancillary works expected to continue till late-2022;
 - \$230M Townsville Ring Road Stage 5 between Vickers Bridge and Shaw Road – expected to support 398 jobs – due to be completed early-2023; and
 - \$107.65M Fownsville Northern Access Intersection upgrade (Bruce Highway) at Black River – supporting 178 jobs – construction expected to be completed by early 2023;

LNP Cuts

- Under Newman and Frecklington the LNP cut \$1.6 billion out of the road and transport budget and made a virtue out of it.
- Sacked 20 per cent of Main Roads staff, including 700 road builders.
- LNP cannot be trusted when it comes to committing funds to regional roads.

Great Barrier Reef

- Protecting the Great Barrier Reef and the thousands of jobs that rely on it is vital to the Regions and State's economy.
- The Great Barrier Reef is world heritage listed and contributes \$6 billion to the Australian economy every year, **supporting over 60,000 jobs.**
- The Queensland Government has committed over \$400M towards protecting the Reef since 2015, including:
 - \$270.1M for the Queensland Reef Water Quality Program between 2017-18 and 2021-22;
 - \$29.9M under the Healthy Reef, Healthy Environment, Healthy Economy package, including \$10M for Reef Credits, a \$6M Reef Islands Arks program and funding for a tourism hub and visitor centre in the Daintree National Park;
 - over \$19M per year from 2021-22 increased investment in on-ground marine park management co-delivered by the Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service and the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority; and
 - Reef's park management is being boosted by the new \$9.7M Reef Resilience vessel launched recently.
- We're investing **\$10M in a Reef Assist Program** to deliver 200 nature-based jobs in Reef Catchments as part of our plan for economic recovery.
- As well as supporting voluntary action, the Government is also taking regulatory action to improve Reef water quality. Strengthened Reef regulations which commenced on 1 December 2019 are being rolled out over three years.
- Minimum practice standards that mirror accepted industry practices in the Wet Tropics region are now in place for sugarcane and banana production and due to commence for graziers and horticulture producers on 1 December 2022.
- From 1 June 2021, a permit is required to start new commercial cropping activities on more than five hectares of land excluding existing cropping land.
- Permits will condition farm design standards to minimise nutrient and sediment run-off from the development of land for cropping.

• On 1 June 2021, new standards also commenced for urban and industrial environmentally relevant activities such as mines, aquaculture, and sewage treatment that may result in nutrient or sediment emissions in Reef catchments.

Key facts

- A 2017 Deloitte Access Economics report found the Reef added \$3.9 billion to the State's economy in 2015-16 and supported more than 33,000 full-time Queensland jobs (pre-COVID).
- In 2020, the Government's election commitments included:
 - Continue the Great Barrier Reef Water Quality Program;
 - Maintain reef protection laws and associated measures which are critical to the health of the Great Barrier Reef, and
 - Conduct a review of the Paddock to Reef Program to ensure changes in technology and system knowledge are harnessed.

<u>UNESCO</u>

 In July 2021, the World Heritage Committee (WHC) decided not to list the Great Barrier Reef "in danger" and instead await the outcomes of a joint WHC—International Union of Conservation Reactive Monitoring mission centred around an updated Reef 2050 Plan and accelerated action on water quality and climate change.

Achievements

<u>UNESCO</u>

- The State Government committed over \$700M directly towards protecting the Reef since 2015.
- The latest Reef Water Quality Report Card 2019 showed the most promising results to date.

Reef Regulations

• Between 2009 and 2020, more than \$143M was specifically allocated to support the agricultural industry to improve productivity, profitability and water quality through industry-led *best management practice* programs, science and on ground programs.

Background

• Since 2012, WHC has considered the Great Barrier Reef World Heritage Area possible indanger listing several times.

- In 2015, WHC decided not to inscribe the Reef on the in-danger list due to the Reef 2050 Plan, particularly the water quality targets and the sustainable ports development and sustainable fisheries commitments.
- In 2017, WHC expressed concern of the mass bleaching events in 2016 and 2017, the slow progress in water quality progress and implementation delays in regulatory reforms.
- Strengthening the Reef protection regulations responds directly to the recommendations of the *Great Barrier Reef Water Science Taskforce* on how best to meet the Reef water quality targets for a healthy Reef.
- The Reef 2050 Water Quality Improvement Plan sets 2025 reduction targets of 60% for dissolved inorganic nitrogen loads and 25% for sediment loads.
- The strengthened Reef regulations are expected to achieve an estimated dissolved inorganic nitrogen load reduction of 48.9% towards the 2025 target (i.e. expected to achieve approximately 80% of the target reduction with full compliance) and an estimated fine sediment reduction of 4.2% towards the 2025 target (i.e. expected to achieve approximately 16.8% of the target reduction with full compliance).
- During consultation on the new cropping permit arrangements, agricultural peak bodies publicly re-iterated not supporting the regulatory approach to improving water quality, but AgForce publicly acknowledged the positive consultation process which resulted in changes to the proposed standard and requirements for new cropping.
- In July 2021, the WHC's decision to not list the Great Barrier Reef 'in danger' requires Australia, as the State Party, to provide an updated report on the state of conservation of the property to the WHC by 1 February 2022. The report will be considered at the 45th session of the WHC in Russia in mid-2022.
- The timing and terms of reference for the reactive monitoring mission are yet to be finalised in consultation with the WHC.
- Queensland is eager to assist in the monitoring mission and is keen to work closely with the Australian Government on this.
- The Reef 2050 Long-Term Sustainability Plan is a strong framework for coordinated action in partnership between governments, Traditional Owners and stakeholders.
- Queensland is responding to the impact on businesses, particularly those in the tourism and hospitality sectors, by delivering a \$47.75M Tourism and Hospitality Sector COVID-19 Lockdown Support Package to assist businesses impacted by COVID-19 lockdowns.
