Barcaldine to get renewable energy boost

The Queensland Government is providing \$380,000 for a feasibility study into the second stage of a groundbreaking solar, wind and hydrogen project. Should the project proceed, Barcaldine will be home to Queensland's new Renewable Energy Hub and Australia's first commercial-scale use of hydrogen.

The feasibility study will look at producing zero-carbon hydrogen from renewables to produce ammonia and urea for domestic and global markets. This builds on the \$300,000 Stage One feasibility study into a 30-megawatt solar farm with intensive horticulture.

The new Hub has the potential to turbo sharge economic growth in the region, creating 350 local lobs and 600 construction jobs as well as attracting up to \$500 million new investment.





Mount Isa Mines copper smelter backs local jobs

The Queensland Government is securing more than 1,000 resource and manufacturing jobs associated with the Mount Isa Mines copper smelter. 830 jobs in Mount Isa depend on the smelter, with a further 250 jobs in Townsville across Mount Isa Mines' and Incitec Pivot's operations. The smelter supports indirect employment for many hundreds more in those regions who either supply other goods and services to the smelter or refinery, or rely on the outputs.

The initiative is part of the Queensland Government's economic recovery plan that includes maintaining the State's mineral processing capability and supply chains. There will be growing global demand for copper and other new economy minerals needed for wind turbines, generators and batteries and copper for electric cars.

Tax Relief Package

The Government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- Payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium businesses
- A payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- Land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals for eligible taxpayers.


An estimated 80 businesses in Outback Queensland will also benefit in 2020-21 from the higher payroll tax threshold.




This Budget is focused on creating jobs and getting our economy moving sooner. Initiatives include:

- Driving the largest infrastructure program in over a decade - \$14.8 billion in 2020-21, directly supporting 46,000 jobs. Around 58% of the capital program and 28,700 of the jobs supported will be outside the Greater Brisbane area.
- Enhancing frontline services. The Budget will support funding for additional frontline health staff including 5,800 nurses, 1,500 doctors and 1,700 allied health professionals through to 2024
- Backing small businesses to support jobs and communities. More than \$7 billion in COVID-19 stimulus measures have been provided so far, including reducing business costs through payroll tax relief and other tax relief measures, and accelerating projects to unlock development and increase economic activity.
- Increasing investment in manufacturing including \$1 billion to make trains again in Queensland.

- Growing our regions and supporting key industries such as tourism, agriculture and mining. An additional \$200 million will be provided to the Works for Queensland program to support local governments outside South East Queensland.
- Providing more Queenslanders with access to the skills and training they need for rewarding careers. \$100 million has been provided over three years to upgrade TAFE campuses.
- Providing concessions and easing the cost of living, with an estimated \$6.3 billion in 2020-21 in targeted discounts. fee waivers, rebates, and subsidies.
- Protecting the environment. The Great Barrier Reef will benefit from an additional \$40 million worth of support. This includes \$10 million for a Reef Assist Program and \$6 million over four years for the GBR Island Arks project to deliver ecotourism in the region.
- Delivering lower debt than New South Wales and Victoria.







Australian Stockman's Hall of Fame and Outback Heritage Centre

Recommended response

- Opened in 1988, the Australian Stockman's Hall of Fame and Outback Heritage Centre (the Centre) is one of Australia's premier outback heritage attractions.
- In March 2020, the Centre was forced to close their doors and stand down the majority of their staff due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The Centre reopened its doors in April 2021 following a \$15 million redevelopment.
- Enhancements include an immersive, multisensory experience with dynamic new technology including digital projections and ambient sound scapes.
- The Centre continues to be a popular Queensland attraction and is a 2021 Best of Queensland Experience.
- Visitors to the Centre are encouraged to book in advance due to high demand.

Key Facts

- In December 2017, the Australian Government awarded the Centre \$15 million from the Building Better Regions Fund for a variety of redevelopment works to be undertaken including the creation of integrated visitor encounters and upgrading the next stage of the Outback Entertainment Centre.
- In July 2020, the Centre was awarded \$300,000 from the Queensland Tourism Icons Program (QTIP) to pay the cost of expenses including utilities and facilities, operational costs including electricity, servicing and maintenance of air conditioning, staff wages and maintaining the Outback Stockman Show.

Achievements

 Queensland Government support of \$300,000 from the QTIP enabled the Centre to pay the cost of expenses relating to utilities and facilities, operational costs including electricity, servicing and maintenance of air conditioning, staff wages and maintaining the Outback Stockman Show.

- The QTIP grant provided the Centre with the opportunity to retain approximately 18 core staff, with employees remaining in their positions throughout the pandemic.
- The Centre is now positioned to commence the new season with a skilled and ready workforce.
- The Queensland Government funding has also enabled the Centre to grow employment opportunities for when the peak tourism season commences.

Background

- Building construction was completed in 1987 and the Centre was opened by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on 29 April 1988. The construction works were supported by the Queensland and Australian Government, plus an extensive fundraising effort by supporters, commerce and industry.
- The Centre hosts themed galleries displaying the history of some of Australia's explorers, stock workers, pastoralists, and First Nations peoples. The exhibits comprise an eclectic mix of artifacts, images, touch screens, audio visual presentations and open displays, allowing visitors to interpret the outback story in their own way.
- The Centre submitted an Expression of Interest under the 2020 Growing Tourism Infrastructure Fund to construct a new "Wall of Honour" walk dedicated to people who have contributed to the outback. Unfortunately, the application was unsuccessful.
- 2022 Best of Queensland experience outcomes will be published soon.

Cluster Fencing in Western Queensland

Recommended response

- Since 2015, the Government has committed \$19.75M through numerous rounds of the Queensland Feral Pest Initiative (QFPI).
- This funding assists regional communities with the construction of cluster fencing, bringing large numbers of sheep back to the regions.
- Given the success of the cluster fencing program, expressions of interest opened on 25 May 2022 for Round 1 of the \$4M Rural Agricultural Development (sheep and goats) Grants Scheme.
- The grants scheme will help sheep and goat enterprises to double production and to grow and diversify by developing new products, implementing new technologies, upgrading equipment or training.

Key Facts

- The Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD) delivers cluster fence programs in the Longreach and surrounding council areas. RAPAD will receive \$12.32M to deliver cluster fences (over four rounds) and received \$270,000 to deliver wild dog capacity building.
- RAPAD reports that lambing rates have increased from 40 per cent to more than 80 per cent, and sheep numbers have almost doubled in the area, with numbers increasing from 269,000 to nearly 497,000 head.
- Funding through the QFPI will result in protecting more than 400 sheep-producing properties from wild dogs.
- The Not Just a Fence website containing detailed information on cluster fencing in Western Queensland is now live. The website currently only has live data on Rounds 1, 2 and 3, with Round 5 being negotiated.

Background

- Of the total QFPI funding, \$29M was allocated to fencing \$19.75M from the State Government and \$9.2M from the Federal Government.
- The fifth round of the Queensland Feral Pest Initiative funding delivers on a commitment of continuing to work with the regions, by building on actions already implemented and supporting actions taken to sustain and create jobs now and into the future. Successful applicants for Round 5 were announced on 4 May 2021.
- Grant scheme EOIs are open until 1 July 2022 with successful applicants invited to submit a full application by 23 September 2022. Application outcomes will be notified by 28 October 2022.

Drought Status of Longreach Regional Council Area

Recommended response

- As at 12 May 2022, 44.9 per cent of Queensland is drought declared covering 17 full and two part local government areas.
- Longreach remains fully drought declared, since 1 January 2014.
- The Queensland Government has committed to continue to provide current drought assistance measures while this drought lasts and has introduced new drought preparedness measures to help producers plan to manage their drought risk and help them implement these plans with Drought Preparedness Grants and Drought Ready and Recovery Loans.
- A forum to find out about the new drought preparedness package will be held on 1 June 2022 at the Civic and Culture Centre in Longreach.

Key Facts

- A significant rainfall event occurred in the Longreach and Western Queensland region during the Anzac long weekend 2022, which resulted in reports of stock losses (mainly sheep and goats) as well as damage to fencing, levee banks, water storages and roads. Assessment of the impact of this event is still ongoing.
- As of 11 May 2022, a significant rainfall event is also impacting the region. This is a developing event and its impacts are not yet known.

Achievements

- The Queensland Government is now on Round 4 of the \$3.3M Rural Economic Development (RED) Grants in 2021–22. These grants of up to \$200,000 assist rural agricultural businesses fund job creating projects in rural and regional Queensland. Across the previous three rounds, it is estimated that 1897 jobs have been created.
- There has been one Longreach RED Grant recipient: Western Game Processing – awarded \$237,000 (total project amount \$474,000), for the implementation of advanced solar power generation and processing capabilities for kangaroo meat processing.

Background

Local Drought Committees (LDCs) – which consist of local primary producers and Department
of Agriculture and Fisheries staff – met in April 2022 to make a recommendation to the Minister
for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries and Minister for Rural Communities about
the drought status of their region.

- The April rainfall event occurred after the majority of far Western Queensland LDCs had met and, therefore, did not have any influence on their recommendations. However, while not yet prepared to recommend a revocation, a number of Western Queensland LDCs have indicated they will meet again prior to Spring to review conditions.
- The Bureau of Meteorology outlook for Queensland is that rainfall may be above median for May to July 2022. Western and Northern Queensland do not normally experience significant rainfall in the dry season.
- The successful applicants from Round 4 of RED grants will be announced in late June 2022.

Former Longreach Agricultural Training College – future use

Recommended response

- On 6 December 2019, the Queensland Agricultural Training Colleges (QATC) ceased practical operations, in response to recommendations from a review of vocational education, training and skilling in Central and Western Queensland.
- The former QATC assets passed to the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries (DAF) on 1 March 2020. DAF has established lease and licence to occupy agreements with various groups utilising land and/or infrastructure at the Longreach site.
- In 2020, the Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD) submitted a five-year business case to develop a Regional Training and Innovation Precinct (RTIP) at the site.
- RAPAD's request was not supported due to the quantum of funding required from the Queensland Government, as well as the likelihood that the proposal would require orgging government funding.
- RAPAD currently has a right to occupy the administration and accommodation part of the former college. While not currently using the site, RAPAD is sub-leasing parts of the site to tourism operators as overflow accommodation for tour groups. The current agreement ends on 30 October 2022 and RAPAD has indicated it does not have an interest in extending its lease.
- Longreach Regional Council (LRC) was made an offer to purchase the
 entire Longreach property to enable local management and decisions
 to meet community expectations; however, it was not in a position to
 purchase the property and indicated a preference that the property be
 sold to a viable commercial operator to maximise the economic and
 social development opportunities for the region.
- The Queensland Government is still considering options in relation to the land and associated built assets.

Key Facts

 Repurposing the former QATC property at Longreach is an election commitment.

Background

The review identified the residential-based training model was no longer viable in the
competitive training market and transitioning the facilities at Emerald and Longreach to
alternative uses provided a more sustainable option.

QANTAS Founders Museum

Recommended response

- Queensland Government funding support has enabled significant new tourism infrastructure works to be delivered at the Qantas Founders Museum.
- This museum, along with other key Outback Queensland attractions, is a major drawcard for the region.
- Attractions such as this are important to the Outback as they increase visitation, create jobs, and stimulate the local economy.

Key Facts

- From late-2018 to mid-2021, the Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport provided the Qantas Founders Museum with \$3.336M in funding, comprised of:
 - \$3M from the Growing Tourism Infrastructure Fund to design and construct the 'Luminescent Longreach Light and Sound Show' completed mid-2021.
 - \$336,000 from the Outback Tourism Infrastructure Fund for the new interior design and fit out for the 1950's Super Constellation aircraft completed late 2019.

- In March 2020, due to COVID-19, the Qantas Founders Museum was forced to close their doors and stand down the majority of their 35 staff.
 The closure had a significant impact on Longreach as the Qantas Founders Museum is one of the largest employers in the town.
- In June 2020, the Honourable Annastacia Palaszczuk MP, Premier and then Minister for Trade visited the Qantas Founders Museum to inspect the new infrastructure and watch the Luminescent Longreach Show – generating a surge of visitor enquiries for the Qantas Founders Museum.
- In July 2020, when COVID-19 restrictions started to ease, the Qantas Founders Museum gradually re-opened their doors, however they found it difficult to attract and retain staff.

- In March 2021, the Honourable Stirling Hinchliffe MP, then Minister for Tourism Industry Development and Innovation and Minister for Sport attended the Red and White Gala – 100 Year Celebration of Qantas which was held at the Qantas Founders Museum.
- The 2021 Outback tourism season was one of the best on record due to a dramatic increase in Queenslander's holidaying within the state.
- Visitation typically slowed across the 2021-22 summer.
- Interest in the Outback remains high into 2022 and 2023, however, bookings are not as strong as last year.

Achievements

 Approximately 17,000 additional visitors are expected to visit the Qantas Founders Museum each year following Queensland Government's funding investment, injecting up to \$5.3M into the local economy annually.

Background

- In 2017, the Qantas Founders Museum was awarded \$11.3M from the Australian Government's Building Better Regions Fund to construct its Air Park Roof.
- Under the 2017-18 Australian Government funded Tourism Demand Driver Infrastructure program, the former Queensland Department of Tourism, Major Events, Small Business and the Commonwealth Games granted the Qantas Founders Museum \$300,000 in matched funding for the 'Bring the Super Constellation to Longreach' project.
- This project transported the Super Constellation from Manila to Longreach, as well as funding the external restoration and reassembly of the aircraft at Longreach.

Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD) Recommended response

- Remote Area Planning and Development Board (RAPAD) is one of five Remote Area Boards (RABs) that the Queensland Government supports to undertake economic development projects, services and activities, crucial in Queensland's most remote regions.
- The Queensland Government has approved \$150,000 for two projects in 2021-22 with a further \$150,000 available for projects in 2022-23.

Key Facts

- RAPAD operates as both a regional development organisation and as a regional organisation of councils. It aims to foster, facilitate and promote the sustainable growth and development of the Central Western Queensland (CWQ) region.
- RAPAD covers the seven local councils of CWQ:
 - Barcaldine Regional Council
 - Barcoo Shire Council
 - Blackall-Tambo Regional Council
 - Boulia Shire Council
 - Diamantina Shire Council
 - Longreach Regional Council, and
 - Winton Shire Council.

Funding

- On 3 September 2021, the Deputy Premier announced the extension of the funding for the RAB program.
- In 2021-22, RAPAD is being funded to deliver two projects:
 - Go Far Out a resident attraction/regional promotion and digital campaign project: \$60,000 to develop a digital media campaign to support, extend the reach and impact of www.gofarout.com.au to further demonstrate the advantages of working and living in CWQ.
 - CWQ Brewing Co project: \$90,000 to fund phase two of the project to expand the production of town-centric lagers to include towns from all seven RAPAD local council areas and develop the investment case for the project.

- Projects for which RAPAD has previously received RAB funding include:
 - Investment Prospectus Website project: \$170,000 to develop a website that comprehensively outlines the region and its advantages as a destination to invest and do business.
 - Outback Jobs Website project: \$70,000 to address the issue of jobs in the region remaining vacant, by creating a website that aggregates regional job vacancies and highlights what the region has to offer to prospective employees.
 - Tourism Data Modelling Implementation project: \$60,000 to develop a model to quantify the number of visitors and economic impact of tourism in each of the seven CWQ local government areas.
 - Tourism Data Modelling project: \$150,000 to develop a tourism data model for each of the seven local governments within RAPAD to strengthen the tourism sector and support diversification of the region's economy.

Achievements

- RAB funding has provided CWQ with:
 - the www.gofarout.com.au website that promotes the region as a place to work, invest and do business.
 - local council specific baseline tourism data and a model for future collection and analysis.

 - Project concepts were due to the Department of State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning by 16 May 2022.
 - Project agreements finalised by 30 June 2022.

COVID-19 – Economic Recovery

Recommended response

- The Government has been quick to respond to COVID-19 pandemic.
- To support business and families, the Government has invested \$8 billion in a range of assistance initiatives and job creating projects.
- In the Queensland Outback SA4 area we assisted businesses with \$6.62M in payroll tax relief.
- In the Longreach Regional Council area, we have assisted businesses through more than:
 - \$1.24M to 8 small and medium sized businesses through concessional loans, supporting 41 local jobs
 - \$199,477 in grants to small businesses; and
 - \$5.8M with projects under our Works for Qld program supporting almost 470 local jobs since 2016.
- We will also continue to work with the Federal Government, so business and industry get the necessary support.

Tourism industry sentiment

- The Outback performed strongly in 2021, benefiting from huge domestic interest from long haul travellers already in Queensland and Queenslanders unable to travel interstate and overseas.
- While visitation typically slowed across the 2021-22 summer with cancellations over the Christmas and New Year period due to declining traveller confidence around borders and the new Omicron variant, interest in the outback remains high into 2022 and 2023 from consumers and the travel trade.
- Although spirits are high and bookings are progressing well in 2022, tourism operators are reporting business is not as strong as last year.
 Reports from travellers indicate matters such as the Brisbane and Northern New South Wales floods and the Bali reopening may have contributed to performance in early 2022.
- There is a noticeable preference for short breaks and packages. Booking lead times are short.
- Experience and product development, with a focus on bundling and packaging has been a focus across the region to extend length of stay, dispersal and spend:
 - Mitchell Grass Retreat three-night packages sold out in 2021 and demand is high in 2022 and 2023
 - Barcoo and Longreach Councils are in the early stages of a project to promote the 'Channel Country Way', targeting coach, drive and touring groups
 - Scenic Tours have bundled the outback in five departures of their Luxury Cruise and Tour small group series
 - AAT Kings is touring for the first time to Longreach, Quilpie and Roma ex-Brisbane.

Queensland's Fossil Emblem

- Public consultation on the state fossil emblem will run from 11 April to 10 July 2022.
- Twelve fossils have been nominated, following consultation with regional tourism organisations, councils and museum palaeontology experts.
- The government is investing almost \$500,000 in a dinosaur tourism roadmap to bring together Queensland's best prehistoric visitor experiences, which will help tourism operators promote the best Outback dinosaur destinations to visitors to Queensland.

\$10M Outback Tourism Infrastructure Fund

- 3 projects in the Longreach Regional Council area:
 - \$336,000 to QANTAS Foundation Memorial Trust for <u>Super</u> <u>Constellation Interior Construction and Display Area</u> including construction of a display area inside a Qantas Super Constellation aircraft – project completed in November 2019;
 - \$510,000 to for 5 Star Eco Lodges including construction of 15 luxury self-contained permanent tents with common areas for guests to barbecue, swim and enjoy the views project opened early July 2020; and
 - \$1M to Outback Aussie Tours Pty Ltd for <u>Outback Rail Adventure</u> between Emerald and Longreach that includes construction of a workshop/storage shed for the rail train, leased from Queensland Rail (QR), and an undercover storage area – project to be completed by June 2022.

\$25M Outback Tourism Icons Fund

- Funding was distributed during September 2020 and final reporting and acquittal obligations were completed in late March 2021.
- Funding details are commercial-in-confidence

Growing Tourism Infrastructure

 In 2018, \$3M was provided to the QANTAS Foundation Memorial Trust for a Light and Sound Show in Longreach to tell the history of Qantas and Outback Queensland (Luminescent Longreach). The project was completed in November 2020.

LNP

- The last LNP Government
 - took their eye off tourism and conceded market share to the southern states;
 - attracted only six new or increased airline services bringing in just 557,000 seats; (since 2015, my Government has assisted 29 new or additional services bringing in 3.3 million seats); and
 - cut \$188M from the tourism industry funding support and severely limited Tourism and Events Queensland's (TEQ) ability to plan for the long term with no funding certainty to enter into multi-year event partnerships or to secure long-term marketing contracts.
- The LNP's short-sighted vision for tourism put thousands of Queensland jobs at risk.

Health Overview - Central West Hospital and Health Services

Recommended response

All data as at 19 May 2022.

Covid-19 cases

- Across Queensland, 1,123,991 recorded cases of Covid-19, of which 39,950 were active cases and 961 people had died.
- Across the Central West Hospital and Health Service (HHS), there
 were 311 recorded cases of Covid-19, of which there was no active
 cases. No deaths have been recorded in the Central West HHS area.
- Central West HHS was managing:
 - 2 in-patient with Covid-19 (in ICU); and
 - 32 people with Covid-19 at home.
- There have been 69 recorded cases of Covid-19 within the Longreach Regional Council, all of which were recorded since 13 December 2021.

 Central West HHS has administered a total of 20,522 vaccine doses.

Staff impacts

- Central West HHS had:
 - 4 staff registered as being Covid-19 positive;
 - 1 staff was quarantined; and
 - no staff were in the workplace under Critically Essential Worker Provision.

Key facts

 The 2021-22 Central West Hospital and Health Service (HHS) budget is nearly \$90M in operational funding. They have a budget of \$2.9M for COVID-19 operational expenditure. As at 31 March 2022, Central West HHS has spent **\$2.5M** in vaccination costs.

- Currently Central West HHS has a staff head count of approximately 458.
- Since 2015, within Central West HHS, my Government has hired:
 - 5.11 FTEs more doctors;
 - 5.26 FTEs more Nurses and Midwives; and
 - 14.66 FTEs more Allied Health Professionals.

Central West HHS Infrastructure projects

- The Queensland Government is working hard to provide infrastructure that facilitates high level healthcare services in the Central West region.
- Since 2017, over \$33.5M has been expended on major infrastructure work completed within Central West HHS, including \$1.77M for the Longreach Hospital generator and switchboard replacement delivered in November 2021; \$20.11M for the Blackall Hospital redevelopment delivered in November 2020; \$4.22M for Aramac Primary Healthcare Centre, delivered in March 2018; \$7.5M for the Boulia refurbishment and mechanical upgrade delivered in July 2020 and; \$0.42M for the Barcaldine Hospital fire indicator panel and emergency light delivered in May 2019.
- Central West HHS also has 10 projects worth over \$24.0M in the delivery phase, including 3 projects in the Longreach Regional Council Area:


Waiting Lists

- Elective Surgery Waiting Lists between 1 June 2020 and 31 March 2022, 498 patients were added to the elective surgery wait list, with:
 - the ready for surgery wait list increasing from 67 to 106 an increase of 39; and
 - the ready for <u>surgery long wait list increasing</u> from 4 to 10.
- GIE Procedures Waiting Lists between 1 June 2020 and 31 March 2022, 554 patients were added to the GIE wait list, with:
 - the ready for GIE care wait list increasing from 51 to 76; and
 - the ready for GIE care long wait list increasing from 2 to 20.

 Central West HHS is not in scope for specialist outpatients department key performance indicators.

Achievements

 The State Government funded \$7.9M for Longreach Hospital's medical imaging and mechanical services upgrade. The project which included a new medical imaging unit for new CT scanner equipment, a new maternity unit and a new day surgery unit and upgrades to the emergency department, nurse call, medical gas and air-conditioning systems with the project completed in November 2018.



Housing – Outback Queensland

Key facts

- In the Outback Queensland Region, under the QuickStarts Qld program, we will commence 98 new social homes by 30 June 2025, with a planned investment of \$45.3M over four years, supporting more than 141 jobs.
- More broadly, the Queensland Government is increasing Queensland's supply of social and affordable housing by almost 10,000 over the life of the Housing Strategy, including:
 - 6,365 social housing commencements over the next four years;
 - in addition to the 2,480 commencements under the first four years of the Housing Strategy; and
 - 1,034 affordable housing commencements over the life of the Housing Strategy.
- Between 2015-16 to 31 December 2021 in the Outback Queensland region, 47 dwellings have been constructed. None are in the Longreach Regional Council area.
- The Outback region is a new region under the Queensland Housing Strategy not previously targeted. One project totalling six new homes is currently undergoing tender assessment and is anticipated to have a contract awarded for commencement in 2021-22 in Longreach.

Housing Investment

- This budget's \$2.9 billion total housing investment is the largest concentrated investment in social housing in Queensland's history.
- The Queensland Government launched a bold new housing action plan backed by a \$1.9 billion investment over four years and the establishment of a \$1 billion Housing Investment Fund (HIF) to boost housing supply and increase housing and homelessness support across Queensland.
- This investment, through the Palaszczuk Government's Queensland Housing and Homelessness Action Plan 2021-2025 (the Action Plan) strengthens the momentum created since the 10-year Queensland Housing Strategy was launched in 2017 and responds to the current housing market conditions we are now facing.

Queensland Housing Investment Growth Initiative

- The Queensland Housing Investment Growth Initiative (QHIGI) procurement process launched on 28 October 2021 to invite interest in any one of three initiatives and will deliver accelerated social housing supply of **6,365 social housing commencements** through:
 - HIF a \$1 billion investment which will generate an estimated \$40M to deliver 3,600 new social housing dwelling commencements and additional affordable housing between 2021-2025:
 - the EOI for the HIF remains open for proposals to be submitted
 - regional allocation of the 3,600 commencements under the HIF will be determined by demand and opportunities;
 - QuickStarts Qld a capital investment program to commence 2,765 new social housing dwellings over four years, primarily through partnerships with Community Housing Providers (CHPs), for social housing eligible clients;
 - 727 new social housing homes are targeted to commence under QuickStarts Qld by the end of June 2022
 - the Request for Detailed Proposal process for QuickStarts Qld closed on 21 January 2022 and evaluation of proposals are underway, with priority given to spot purchases and 2021-22 commencements;
 - Help to Home (H2H) a \$40M dollar investment to deliver private market cutcomes for 1,000 households and additional spot purchase for two years with the first stage being to engage Registered Community Housing Providers to manage the properties and deliver services to eligible social housing customers
 - the EOLfor H2H closed on 3 December 2021
 - the program is progressing through two stages
 - the first stage involved procuring the registered housing providers to manage tenancies and is currently being finalised
 - the next stage will focus on sourcing suitable properties from the market, and this will commence in the coming months.
 - most of these homes will be newly built properties that are yet to come onto the rental market, or existing homes that haven't been on the rental market before.

Delivering essential housing and homelessness services to Queenslanders

 The Action Plan supports the Queensland Government's continued commitment to deliver essential frontline services and provide enhanced housing and support options for vulnerable people, moving towards ending homelessness.

The Action Plan:

- establishes the QHIGI
- accelerates the construction, redevelopment and spot purchase of social housing homes
- tailors housing responses for First Nations peoples and communities, to continue to close the gap
- provides \$20M for homelessness initiatives, improving services and support to provide accommodation to people in crisis
- provides \$20M to enhance frontline responses to domestic violence, through a specialist response team and flexible assistance packages
- provides \$54.9M to fund essential housing and homelessness services established under the Queensland Housing Strategy Action Plan 2017-2020
- puts in place measures and protections to ensure fairer private rental and retirement living systems
- supports the creation of new construction jobs in the regions.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Action Plan

- The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Action Plan 2019-2023 (ATSIH Action Plan) funding of \$67.1M over four years from 2019-2023 is focussed on improving housing outcomes for First Nations peoples, including an investment of \$24.1M in 2021-22.
- The Government is committed to reframing our relationship with First Nations peoples and will deliver improved housing outcomes through genuine partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders.

- Key actions under the Action Plans include commitments to:
 - develop place-based, community led, local housing plans with communities to identify and respond to local housing challenges and priorities
 - establish the new peak body, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Queensland, to strengthen housing outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, supporting the sustainability of Indigenous housing providers and the community housing sector
 - increase home ownership opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres
 Strait Islander peoples
 - provide culturally responsive housing support through a service offer for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.
- In 2021-22, \$1.6M has been provided towards the recently established Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peak Housing Body as part of a \$5.5M investment over five years – funding will support sector development of Indigenous Community Housing Organisations and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Councils.
- The ATSIH Action Plan also provides for the ongoing delivery of the \$75M commitment to home ownership in remote and discrete communities – this allocation enabled the transfer of 167 social housing dwellings entitlements into the private ownership of local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families.
- Increased home ownership and access to safe, appropriate and sustainable housing not only provides a foundation to close the gap but reflects our commitment to listening to First Nations Peoples in Queensland about their housing concerns and committing to a better future.

Natural disaster support and preparedness

Recommended response

- The Government is committed to ensuring the recovery of all communities impacted by natural disasters.
- Since the establishment of the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) in 2011, approximately \$72.8M has been approved in disaster recovery and resilience funding for Longreach.

Key Facts

- In the 2021-22 disaster season, Longreach Regional Council (LRC) has been activated for joint State-Commonwealth Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) assistance for the following events:
 - Northern and Central Queensiand Rainfall and Flooding,
 21 28 April 2022
 - Western Queensland Low Pressure Trough, 19 January –
 4 February 2022
 - Central, Southern and Western Queensland Rainfall and Flooding,
 10 November 3 December 2021.
- QRA is working closely with LRC to determine an early estimate of the reconstruction program in response to these events. Works will be due for completion by 30 June 2024.

Active DRFA-funded Program

- LRC has a currently active DRFA-funded reconstruction delivery program estimated at approximately \$22M in response to the following events:
 - Western Queensland Thunderstorms, 21 30 December 2020
 - Queensland Monsoonal Flooding, 23 January 3 February 2020
- Works associated with the February 2020 event are due for completion by 30 June 2022, while completion of works for the December 2020 event is scheduled for May 2023.

Completed DRFA-funded restoration works

- In addition, LRC has recently completed approximately \$13.8M in DRFA-funded restoration works in response to the following events:
 - Severe Tropical Cyclone Trevor and associated low pressure system, 19-27 March 2019

 North and Far North Queensland Monsoon Trough, 25 January-14 February 2019

Achievements

Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements

- Prior to the introduction of the DRFA in November 2018, LRC was activated for NDRRA assistance following natural disasters in 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2016 and 2018, with the combined estimate of public infrastructure damage from these events approximately \$31.5M.
- These works are complete and were jointly funded by the Commonwealth and State under the NDRRA.

Get Ready Queensland

 Since 2017, LRC has had approximately \$45,000 allocated in Get Ready Queensland funding rounds, including \$9,700 allocated for the 2021-22 financial year, to conduct preparedness activities that assist the community in better preparing for responding to and recovering from disasters.

Queensland Disaster Resilience Fund

- LRC had approximately \$55,000 approved under the 2019 Queensland Disaster Resilience Fund for two projects to upgrade the Ilfracombe evacuation centre:
 - \$49,000 for the purchase, installation and commission of new QAS80 Generator back-up power supply, increasing the community's safety and resilience to disasters
 - \$6,400 for the installation of several power points to allow for multiple workstations and installation of multiple wall plugs to support more iP telephony usage at the centre.
- This project was completed in February 2021.

Background

 The eligibility guidelines for reconstruction projects under DRFA and NDRRA are set by the Commonwealth and administered by the QRA.

Policing and Youth Crime

POLICE NUMBERS

- Capricornia Police District has 606 permanent positions, <u>up</u> 24 since 2015.
- It was fantastic to announce in September 2020, an additional 2,025 police personnel across the state.
- This is a \$624M investment over five years for 2,025 new police personnel. Of those 1,450 will be deployed to the frontline which means at least 150 positions will be located per key region across the state.
- We're also investing in 25 mobile police vans that will take police into the heart of the community.
- There are more than 12,000 police officers in Queensland a record number. <u>Under Labor, there are more police in Queensland than</u> ever before with more on the way.
- And we back police 100% in what they do best keeping communities safe, providing them with the necessary equipment, like body worn cameras, new vehicles and tasers.

CRIME STATS

- From 1 July 2021 to 31 March 2022, the overall rate of Total Reported Crime for the Capricornia Police District increased by 3,423 offences or 16 per cent compared with the same time period the previous year.
- From 1 July 2021 16 31 March 2022, compared with the previous year, the rate of:
 - Offences Against the Person increased by 1,328 or 65 per cent;
 - Offences Against Property increased by 1,636 or 24 per cent; and
 - Other Offences increased by 459 offences or 3 per cent.

YOUTH CRIME

- In response to community concerns, I announced a \$15.8M Five-Point Action Plan:
 - offenders posing a risk to the community should not get bail;
 - a police blitz on bail, appealing court decisions where appropriate;
 - a 24/7 Police Strike Team;

- culture-based rehabilitation for Indigenous offenders through new On Country initiatives; and
- empowering local communities in the war on crime with \$2M for community-based organisations for local solutions.
- For noting, compared to 2019, data for 2020 indicates increases in the number of proven offences and distinct young people with a proven offence. This is due to the COVID-19 pandemic response, which resulted in delayed court processes and delays in finalising charges (with finalisations occurring in 2020-21).
- For the year ending 31 December 2021 compared to the year ending 31 December 2019, there has been:
 - a 47 per cent decrease in the number of proven offences committed in Longreach by 10-17-year-olds; and
 - a 29 per cent decrease in the number of distinct 10-17-year old offenders, with at least one proven offence committed in Longreach.
- Caution should be exercised with these numbers, as small numbers are involved which exaggerates the percentage difference.
- For the year ending 31 December 2021, there were 2 restorative justice conferences held in Longreach.

<u>INFRASTRUCTURE</u>

 Negotiations continue with Barcaldine Regional Council to purchase the existing Council chambers for use as a replacement police facility in Barcaldine.

LNP

- A total police budget increase of 2.8%. Given the rate of inflation, that's a cut to police funding in real terms.
- Sacked 110 senior police and cut a further 212 police positions.
- Cut police training, reduced firearms training, forced police to pay for their own body worn video cameras.
- Slashed the auto theft squad from 18 to 3.
- Axed funding to the National Motor Vehicle Theft Reduction Council we reinstated it.

- Wasted millions of dollars on a failed boot camp experiment to breed fitter, faster criminals.
 - Failed to fund the roll out of automatic number plate recognition technology that helps police track stolen vehicles.
- The LNP had its chance to stamp out youth crime. It didn't work.
- The LNP voted <u>against our amendments to get tough on bail.</u>

Background

- As of 1 July 2021, the Capricornia Police District had the following increase due to the Service Realignment Program:
 - The Longreach Patrol Group comprises of the Divisions of; Longreach, Winton, Muttaburra, Aramac, Barcaldine, Blackall, Isisford, Ilfracombe, Yaraka, Jundah, Alpha, Jericho and Windorah inclusive of Tambo Division from Charleville Patrol Group and was realigned into Capricornia District from South West District.

Queensland Electric Super Highway (QESH) Phase 3

Recommended response

 Installation of a new electric vehicle fast charger in Longreach is planned as part of Phase 3 of the Queensland Electric Super Highway (QESH).

Key Facts

- Patronage of the QESH is at all time high and is delivering on the Queensland Government's commitment to reduce emissions.
- In June 2021, the State Government announced a further \$2.75M investment to deliver 18 new QESH sites in regional Queensland, as part of Phase 3, connecting locations including Longreach, Miles, Mount Isa, Roma, Stanthorpe, Esk, Goondiwindi, Hughenden, Julia Creek, Winton, Emerald, Roma, Dingo, Cloncurry, Charters Towers, Charleville, Blackall, and Barcaldine.
- On 25 May 2022, the State Government announced a further \$1.08M investment to deliver six more charging stations at Richmond, Kynuna, Injune, Rolleston, St George and Cunnamulla.
- Phase 3 is an important network connector, linking regional and rural areas of the State to generate greater tourism and economic development opportunities.
- Once finalised, the QESH will provide a fast-charging infrastructure network at 55 locations across Queensland.
- Construction is expected to commence on Phase 3 from June 2022, with all 24 sites expected to become progressively operational by mid-2023.

Achievements

 QESH includes 31 fast charging locations connecting Electric Vehicle drivers from Coolangatta to Port Douglas and Brisbane to Toowoomba.

Background

- The current QESH network consists of 31 fast charging locations. Yurika, a subsidiary of Energy Queensland Limited (EQL), delivered QESH Phases 1 and 2. Phase 1 cost \$2.8M (\$2.5M from EQL and \$300,000 from the Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR)) for 18 charging sites, and Phase 2 cost \$2.5M (funded by DTMR) for 13 charging sites.
- Since it commenced, QESH use has saved between 1053 to 1236 tonnes of CO2 emissions (using the National Greenhouse Accounts Factors) compared to similar light petrol or diesel

vehicles, respectively. This is the equivalent of removing 359 petrol/diesel vehicles from Queensland roads.

• Most energy for QESH sites is sourced through green credits and offsets.



Major Road Upgrades

Recommended response

- Queensland's economic recovery plan is about building the infrastructure we need to create jobs.
- That's why we have committed to \$52.2 billion over 4 years towards job creating infrastructure across the state.
- That plan includes a jointly-funded \$13 billion of works over 15 years for the Bruce Highway to improve flood resilience and safety and increase capacity.
- My Government is delivering \$324 million to upgrade Central West District roads and transport, supporting an average of 400 direct jobs over the life of the program.

Key facts

Major road upgrades underway in Longreach Regional Council area:

- Over \$9.5M to fully seal the Cramsie-Muttaburra Road, delivering a fully sealed link between Longreach and Muttaburra for the first time:
 - \$5M to seal nine kilometres of the road funded by the Queensland Government as part of Queensland's COVID-19 Economic Recovery Plan. Construction started in October 2020;
 - \$2.34M to seal four kilometres of the road jointly funded by AG (\$1.872M) and QG (\$468,000) under the Regional Economic Enabling Fund. Construction started in March 2021; and
 - \$2.2M to pave and seal remaining four kilometres of the road fully funded by the QG TIDS. Construction started in early 2022.
- All three projects are expected to be complete by mid-2022.
- In addition to these projects, the 2022-23 Federal Budget (delivered March 2022) committed a further \$112.5M to the 'Outback Way – Queensland Future Priorities'. This funding is in addition to the \$33.5M identified in the current Queensland Transport and Roads Investment Program.

Achievements

 Two new heavy vehicle rest areas have been established on the Landsborough Highway within five kilometres to the north-west of Longreach.

- The closure of the roadhouse in Longreach in early 2021 resulted in limited facilities being available for truck drivers. To assist, The Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR) identified the opportunity to upgrade existing hardstands nearby to help meet their needs.
- Works were completed on the first new facility in November 2021, with the second in operation from April 2022, delivering new toilets, shaded shelters, lighting, and vehicle bays for both light and heavy vehicles.
- An additional benefit has flowed on to local businesses based in Longreach who are offering free delivery of coffee and food to truck drivers at the rest areas.
- These projects were funded under the Australian Government's Road Safety Program as part of a broader initiative to upgrade rest areas across the State. Under the program, \$15.83M (\$12.66M AG; \$3.17M QG) was committed to upgrade various rest areas within Queensland with a further \$3.17M (\$2.536M AG; \$634,000 QG) targeting upgrades to seven rest areas in the Central West.
- The new rest areas are providing road users with a safe place to stop and manage fatigue while travelling in Outback Queensland.

LNP

- The LNP cut \$600M from Queensland's road budget.
- Sacked 20 per cent Main Roads staff, including 700 RoadTek road builders and cut long-term planning for roads.

Background

- Works are expected to start in mid-2022 on a \$3 million project (fully funded by the Queensland Government) to rehabilitate more than 8.4 kilometres of the Jundah–Longreach Road pavement, with an additional \$1.4 million for replacement of minor culverts.
- DTMR has determined that, as part of these works, the road seal will be widened from four metres to eights metres on an eight-metre formation.
- Local road crews from Longreach Regional Council (LRC) will deliver the project with completion in early 2023.
- On 1 April 2022, the Longreach Leader reported that at a recent LRC meeting, it had been decided to lobby DTMR for further funding to widen the Jundah–Longreach Road from four to six metres.

Schools - Overview

Recommended response

- Since 2017, more than **\$28M** has been invested in the Outback Queensland region to maintain, improve and upgrade schools.
- In 2021-22 we are investing **around \$87.6M** in the Outback Queensland region.
- We are investing \$1.4 billion in 2021-22 to build, maintain and improve schools across the state.
- Since coming to Government in 2015, we have opened 29 new schools including 3 new schools in 2022.
- We are planning for a new school in Brisbane's inner west over the coming years and substantially expanding 13 existing schools during 2021-22.
- My Government is also investing \$20M for planning and land acquisitions for a further 16 new schools beyond 2023.
- Queensland is a growing state and we are delivering the infrastructure and educational facilities needed to support this growth.
- Of the 5 schools in the Longreach Regional Council (LRC) area:
 - major infrastructure work has been carried out at 3 schools totalling almost \$2M;
 - \$3.7M worth of works planned/underway at 3 schools;
 - all schools have air conditioning provided under the former Cooler Schools Program (CSP); and
 - all schools have solar panels.
- On 19 April 2022, the Government announced that all Queensland state school classrooms, libraries and staff rooms are now air conditioned, delivering more comfortable teaching and learning environments for our students, teachers and school communities.

Air conditioning and solar panels

- On 27 February 2020, the Government announced the Cooler Cleaner Schools Program (CCSP) which will provide more than \$477M over 4 years to air condition state schools and expand the existing ACES program.
- On 19 April 2022, the Government announced the CCSP has been fully delivered, providing all Queensland state school classrooms, libraries and staff rooms with air conditioning. Installations were completed over two months ahead of schedule to ensure airconditioned spaces were available from the start of Term 2, 2022.
- The CCSP replaced the Government's former CSP.
