



State backs world-class entertainment precinct

The Wellcamp Entertainment Precinct is a \$175 million jointly funded project which will include a world-class motorsport and driver training facility, catering for amateur and professional drivers

The Queensland Government is providing conditional funding support of up to \$40 million and is seeking additional funding from the Australian Government for the project. The Toowoomba-based Wagner Corporation is committing at least \$95 million.

The Precinct will include a 40,000 person venue, 5,000 on-site camping accommodation, sporting fields, and business tourism and event facilities. It will be used to attract major events across the performing arts, business, tourism, sport and events sectors.

The Wagner Corporation estimates the project will create 130 new full-time jobs during construction and at least 10 direct jobs during operation. Casual employment will be significant with up to 2,500 casual workforse needed for major events.

It is expected that the new Precinct will caralyse investment in the region that may extend from advanced automotive manufacturing to accommodation providers, restaurants, cafes and many small businesses.





Investment prospectus to drive growth in Toowoomba

The Queensland Government has launched a new investment prospectus to drive growth and create jobs in Toowoomba.

Invest Toowoomba – Your regional gateway to business growth aims to attract investment from international and domestic sources by promoting the unique benefits of Toowoomba and highlighting the domestic investment opportunities in the city and surrounding region.

Toowoomba's \$12.2 billion economy has grown strongly over the last decade to 2019. It boasts 2,000 hectares of industrial land and is a transport and logistics hub, connected to major road, rail and air freight routes with capacity to deliver goods to 85% of Australia's population within 24 hours.

Toowoomba is also the gateway to the Darling Downs, the home to major agricultural production areas and resources projects, and enjoys direct supply chain connections to South East Asia through Toowoomba Wellcamp Airport.

The investment prospectus was developed in collaboration with a range of stakeholders including Toowoomba Surat Basin Enterprise, the private sector and key Queensland Government





Queensland Country Women's Association (QCWA) Building, Stanthorpe

Recommended response

- 2022 is the 100th anniversary of The Queensland Country Women's Association (QCWA).
- It is wonderful to see that the organisation that enables the women of Queensland to come together to support communities while celebrating their interests and forging friendships in a respectful and caring environment, has continued for so long.
- The QCWA provides a base for women across Queensland's rural, regional and remote towns as well as cities to band together to share ideas, skills, knowledge and friendship.
- As the QCWA advances towards the 100-year anniversary in 2022, this continuously evolving association prevails as a trusted, iconic and relevant organisation.

Key Facts

- The QCWA building at 5 Victoria Street, Stanthorpe was built in 1920.
- The building is being auctioned on site at 11am on 24 June 2022.
- The Stanthorpe Branch of the QCWA closed on 5 June 2020.
- Currently state-wide, the QCWA has over 220 Branches and over 3500 members state wide.
- Between 2011 and 2019, the QCWA distributed, through its Public Rural Crisis Fund, over \$10.72M approximately, to more than 4,878 families in need, particularly in rural and remote parts of the state.
- Across Queens and, celebrations are planned for the anniversary on 11 August 2022.

Government Assistance

- The Queensland Government has helped support the Country Kitchens Program, which aims to improve health outcomes in regional, rural and remote areas by increasing fruit and vegetable intake through teaching practical cooking skills.
- This continued in 2021-22, with more than \$750,000 provided for this program, and more than \$2.2M committed through to mid-2024.

- The Government has also supported QCWA's efforts to support drought and disaster affected communities, with a recent boost during 2020-21 of more than \$67,000 to support its bushfire disaster response.
- In 2017, Government provided \$1M over two years to help restore the QCWA's heritage halls across the state.

Achievements

 QCWA was inducted into the Queensland Business Leaders Hall of Fame in 2013 and in 2019, received a Queensland Great Award for empowering and inspiring women across the state.

Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery and Library Expansion

Recommended response

- The Stanthorpe Regional Art Gallery (SRAG) is a highly regarded regional gallery that attracts visitors to the area and delivers diverse programs to the local residents.
- I am delighted to hear that the Southern Downs Region Council (SDRC) plans to expand the gallery and library, with support from the Australian Government.
- I understand SDRC is considering options for temporary premises for the library and gallery to continue operating while the expansion works are carried out.

Key Facts

- In 2019, SDRC was unsuccessful in its application to Round 5 of the Building Our Regions Fund (BBRF) for \$2M to transform the gallery's current site into a Cultural Hub.
- In October 2021, SDRC was successful in its application to Round 5 of the Australian Government's Building Better Regions Fund with a \$2M allocation matched by SDRC for a total project budget of \$4M.
- The project will expand the gallery with more workshop, exhibition storage and meeting space and require SRAG and the library to relocate from the existing gallery building.
- On 23 February 2022, SDRC sought additional information in response to requests for additional Council funding towards relocation and temporary premises for SRAG and the library while building works are carried out.
- On 30 March 2022, media reported that the region's galleries, tourism groups and event planners, including the SRAG Director, presented arguments in support of the SDRC 2022–23 budget allocations.
- SDRC is yet to make a decision regarding the request for additional funding to support the costs of relocating to temporary premises.
- SDRC is considering three temporary premise options including the Stanthorpe Showgrounds, Stanthorpe Civic Centre, and the Stanthorpe Council Chambers.
- Arts Queensland does not have a funding program to support the cost of the gallery redevelopment or temporary facilities.

Background

- SRAG, co-located with the library in Weerona Park, is home to a significant regional art collection and key attraction in Stanthorpe.
- The existing SRAG building is challenged with inadequate storage and exhibition facilities to suitably store and display the permanent collection and host touring exhibitions.
- SRAG and its collection are owned by SDRC and operated by the Stanthorpe Art Gallery Society Incorporated, a registered charity and endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient.
- SDRC supports SRAG with an annual operational grant of approximately \$180,000.
- In 2021-22, the Queensland Government invested \$39,500 into SDRC's 2021-22 Regional Arts Development Fund, a partnership between State and Local Governments to invest in quality arts and cultural experiences.

Recommended response

- The Queensland Government is committed to providing support to Queensland families to assist with the cost of transporting students to and from school.
- Approximately \$179M is invested annually to fund the School Transport Assistance Scheme (STAS) which assists around 130,000 school students in Queensland.
- As part of STAS, the Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR) manages 11 bus services operating in the Stanthorpe area.
- A total of 535 STAS-eligible students receive free or subsidised travel on these services.

Key Facts

- The 11 contracted bus services are operated by five delivery partners.
- Collectively, buses travel over 800 kilometres each day to deliver students to school.
- Since January 2022, DTMR has invested \$492,000 in the delivery of STAS Prescribed School Service Contracts in the Stanthorpe area

Achievements

 The Queensland Government continues to provide access to schools for students who may be impeded by distance or financial disadvantage through STAS.

Background

- STAS provides assistance to Queensland school students on rail, bus and ferry services and through the payment of conveyance allowance to parents, as a contribution towards the cost of transporting their children to and from school.
- Mr Owen Jack is one of Queensland's newest bus operators and in May 2022, he purchased service P1558 to the Glen Aplin State School from Mr Dino and Ms Carol Pasin, who operated the service for over 17 years.

Housing – Stanthorpe, Darling Downs Region

Key Facts

- The Queensland Housing Investment Growth Initiative (QHIGI) is a coordinated capital program delivering new social homes across Queensland and establishes new regions and targets.
- Darling Downs is a newly established region that includes the former Toowoomba region which was focused on the Toowoomba Regional Council local government area (LGA).
- In the Darling Downs Region, under the QuickStarts Qld program, we will commence 100 new social homes over four years with a planned investment of \$32.5 million supporting 102 full-time equivalent jobs.
- This is in addition to the **58** new social homes already commenced under the *Queensland Housing Strategy* 2017–2027.
- More broadly, the Queensland Government is increasing Queensland's supply of social and affordable housing by almost 10,000 over the life of the Housing Strategy, including:
 - 6,365 social housing commencements over the next four years;
 - in addition to the 2,480 commencements under the first four years of the Housing Strategy; and
 - 1,034 affordable housing commencements over the life of the Housing Strategy.
- Between 2015-16 to 31 May 2022 in the Darling Downs Region contracts have been awarded, and completed, on 74 dwellings. None of these are in the Southern Downs Regional Council area.

Housing Investment

- This budget's \$2.9 billion total housing investment is the largest concentrated investment in social housing in Queensland's history.
- The Queensland Government launched a bold new housing action plan backed by a \$1.9 billion investment over four years and the establishment of a \$1 billion Housing Investment Fund (HIF) to boost housing supply and increase housing and homelessness support across Queensland.
- This investment, through the Palaszczuk Government's *Queensland Housing and Homelessness Action Plan 2021-2025* (the Action Plan)

strengthens the momentum created since the 10-year *Queensland Housing Strategy* was launched in 2017 and responds to the current housing market conditions we are now facing.

Queensland Housing Investment Growth Initiative

- The QHIGI procurement process launched on 28 October 2021 to invite interest in any one of three initiatives and will deliver accelerated social housing supply of 6,365 social housing commencements through:
 - HIF a \$1 billion investment which will generate an estimated \$40M to deliver 3,600 new social housing dwelling commencements and additional affordable housing between 2021-2025:
 - the EOI for the HIF remains open for proposals to be submitted
 - regional allocation of the 3,600 commencements under the HIF will be determined by demand and opportunities.
 - QuickStarts Qld a capital investment program to commence 2,765 new social housing dwellings over four years, primarily through partnerships with Community Housing Providers (CHPs), for social housing eligible clients:
 - 727 new social housing homes are targeted to commence under QuickStarts Qld by the end of June 2022
 - the Request for Detailed Proposal process for QuickStarts Qld closed on 21 January 2022 and evaluation of proposals are underway, with priority given to spot purchases and 2021-22 commencements.
 - Help to Home (H2H) a \$40M dollar investment to deliver private market outcomes for 1,000 households and additional spot purchase for two years with the first stage engaging Registered Community Housing Providers to manage the properties and deliver services to eligible social housing customers:
 - the EOI for H2H closed on 3 December 2021
 - the program is progressing through two stages
 - the first stage involved procuring the registered housing providers to manage tenancies and is currently being finalised
 - the next stage will focus on sourcing suitable properties from the market, launch to market occurred May 2022; and

most of these homes will be newly built properties that are yet to come onto the rental market, or existing homes that haven't been on the rental market before.

Delivering essential housing and homelessness services to Queenslanders

- The Action Plan supports the Government's continued commitment to deliver essential frontline services and provide enhanced housing and support options for vulnerable people, moving towards ending homelessness. The Action Plan:
 - establishes the QHIGI
 - accelerates the construction, redevelopment and spot purchase of social housing homes
 - tailors housing responses for First Nations peoples and communities, to continue to close the gap
 - provides \$20M for homelessness initiatives, improving services and support to provide accommodation to people in crisis
 - provides \$20M to enhance frontline responses to domestic violence, through a specialist response team and flexible assistance packages
 - provides \$54.9M to fund essential housing and homelessness services established under the Queensland Housing Strategy Action Plan 2017-2020
 - puts in place measures and protections to ensure fairer private rental and retirement living systems
 - supports the creation of new construction jobs in the regions.

Specialist Homelessness Services

- For the 2021-22 financial year, the Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy allocated \$182,272 (GST exclusive) in Homelessness Funding to one organisation to deliver a Specialist Homelessness Service (SHS) in the Southern Downs LGA. This SHS delivers temporary supported accommodation and other support services to people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.
- Home Assist Secure (HAS) services are provided in Stanthorpe by the South West Queensland HAS and delivered by Churches of Christ Care. 2021-22 funding is \$755,723.85 (GST incl). HAS provides subsidised home maintenance and minor modifications to eligible households.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Action Plan

- The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Action Plan 2019-2023 (ATSIH Action Plan) funding of \$67.1M over four years from 2019-23 is focussed on improving housing outcomes for First Nations peoples, including an investment of \$24.1M in 2021-22.
- The Government is committed to reframing our relationship with First Nations peoples and will deliver improved housing outcomes through genuine partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders.
- Key actions under the Action Plans include commitments to:
 - develop place-based, community led, local housing plans with communities to identify and respond to local housing challenges and priorities
 - establish the new peak body, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Queensland, to strengthen housing outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, supporting the sustainability of Indigenous housing providers and the community housing sector
 - increase home ownership opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres
 Strait Islander peoples
 - provide culturally responsive housing support through a service offer for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.
- In 2021-22, \$1.6M has been provided towards the recently established Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peak Housing Body as part of a \$5.5M investment over five years – funding will support sector development of indigenous Community Housing Organisations and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Councils.
- The ATSIH Action Plan also provides for the ongoing delivery of the \$75M communities to home ownership in remote and discrete communities – this allocation enabled the transfer of 167 social housing dwellings entitlements into the private ownership of local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families.
- Increased home ownership and access to safe, appropriate and sustainable housing not only provides a foundation to close the gap but reflects our commitment to listening to First Nations Peoples in Queensland about their housing concerns and committing to a better future.

COVID-19 – Economic Support and Recovery

Recommended response

- The Government has been quick to respond to COVID-19 pandemic.
- To support business and families, the Government has invested \$8 billion in a range of assistance initiatives and job creating projects.
- In the region, we have assisted businesses through more than:
 - \$4.54M in payroll tax relief
 - \$6.0M to 45 small and medium sized businesses through concessional loans, supporting 466 local jobs
 - \$1.36M in grants to small businesses; and
 - \$8.9M with projects under our Works for Qld program supporting more than 270 local jobs since 2019.

Tourism industry sentiment

- In general, the SQCT area has continued to experience strong visitation compared to 2019 and 2020 figures. Solid support from the drive market continues for this region.
- Water security will likely be top of mind for the regions of Stanthorpe, Warwick and Texas. While benefitting from good rainfall and flourishing crops now they were previously in a prolonged drought. The most prominent in the memory for community will be the low dam levels and little water available to fight 2019 bushfires.
- The region is also buoyed by the return of Qantas flights from Sydney to Wellcamp Airport.

<u>2019 Southern Queensland Bushfires - Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements</u>

- The \$6.755M Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) Tourism Recovery Program (jointly funded by the Australian and Queensland Governments (50:50)) supported areas of the state that rely heavily on tourism to recover from the devastating effects of the 2019 Southern Queensland Bushfires which impacted the Southern Downs Regional Council region, including Stanthorpe. The DRFA is in its final stages of delivery:
 - Tourism Marketing Campaigns that support recovery of impacted areas through the Regional Tourism Marketing Campaign (as delivered by Tourism and Events Queensland); and the Go Local Marketing Campaign (delivered by the Department of Employment, Small Business and Training (DESBT)).
 - Supporting the Southern Downs Regional Council via establishment of the Tourism Recovery Fund for Local Government and Tourism Recovery Officers (from October 2020 to October 2022), that provide support for the long-term recovery of vulnerable tourism operators.
 - Tourism Wine Recovery Officer (from August 2020 to December 2021) that supported long-term recovery of vulnerable tourism operators working in the wine sectors across the Scenic Rim and Southern Downs regions (in particular Stanthorpe).

LNP

- The last LNP Government
 - took their eye off tourism and conceded market share to the southern states;
 - attracted only six new or increased airline services bringing in just 557,000 seats; (since 2015, my Government has assisted 29 new or additional services bringing in 3.3 million seats); and
 - cut \$188M from the tourism industry funding support and severely limited Tourism and Events Queensland's (TEQ) ability to plan for the long term with no funding certainty to enter into multi-year event partnerships or to secure long-term marketing contracts.
- The LNP's short-sighted vision for tourism put thousands of Queensland jobs at risk.

Covid-19 cases

- Across Queensland, 1,203,921 recorded cases of Covid-19, of which 23,598 were active cases and 1,087 people had died.
- Across the Darling Downs Hospital and Health Service (HHS), there were 19,890 recorded cases of Covid-19, of which there were 360 active cases and 41 recorded deaths.
- Darling Downs HHS was managing:
 - 14 in-patients with Covid-19 (in ICU); and
 - 13 people with Covid-19 at home.
- There have been 2,007 recorded cases of Covid-19 within the Southern Downs Regional Council, all of which were recorded since 13 December 2021.

• The 2021-22 Darling Downs HHS budget is \$1.1 billion in operational funding. They have a budget of \$43.3M for COVID-19 operational expenditure. As at 30 April 2022, Darling Downs HHS has spent \$11.2M in vaccination costs.

- Currently Darling Downs HHS has a staff head count of approximately 6,316.
- Since 2015, within Darling Downs HHS, my Government has hired:
 - 161.33 FTE more doctors;
 - 535.11 FTE more nurses and midwives; and
 - 195.02 FTE more health professionals

Darling Downs HHS Infrastructure projects

- The Queensland Government is working hard to provide infrastructure that facilitates high level healthcare services in the Darling Downs region.
- Over \$109.5M has been expended on major infrastructure work completed within Darling Downs HHS, including \$1.0M for Stanthorpe and Warwick water security infrastructure works, delivered in November 2020; \$92.5M for the Kingaroy Hospital redevelopment, delivered in November 2021; \$7.32M for Darling Downs HHS cardiac and body protect compliance works, delivered February 2022 and; \$3.78M Goondiwindi and Warwick Hospitals fire protection works, delivered July 2020.
- Darling Downs HHS also has 20 projects worth \$74.9M in the delivery phase, including 2 projects in the Southern Downs Regional Council Area:

Planned Infrastructure Projects

- \$10.0M (State Government funding) for the Toowoomba Hospital Redevelopment (THR) project which includes master planning for the Ballie Henderson Hospital campus and the Detailed Business Case (DBC) for a potential new hospital development on the Ballie Henderson Hospital campus project is on hold awaiting capital funding.
- \$0.50M for the Toowoomba Hospital redevelopment car park detailed business case project on hold awaiting capital funding commitment.
- \$0.15M for Stanthorpe Hospital generator replacement to upgrade generator size to provide 100 per cent essential power supply – project commencement date to be determined.

Waiting Lists

- Elective Surgery Waiting Lists between 1 June 2020 and 30 April 2022, 17,602 patients were added to the elective surgery wait list, with:
 - the <u>ready for surgery wait list decreasing</u> from 2,826 to 2,817 a reduction of 9; and
 - the ready for <u>surgery long wait list increasing</u> from 283 to 478 an increase of 195.
- GIE Procedures Waiting Lists between 1 June 2020 and 30 April 2022, 12,455 patients were added to the GIE wait list, with:
 - the <u>ready for GIE care wait list decreasing</u> from 927 to 811 a reduction of 116; and
 - the ready for <u>GIE care long wait list decreasing</u> from 156 to 119 –
 a reduction of 37.
- Specialist Outpatients Waiting Lists between 1 June 2020 and 30 April 2022, 49,500 referrals were added to the specialist outpatient waitlist, with:
 - the <u>ready for care wait list increasing</u> from 7,365 to 11,888 an increase of 3,253; and
 - the <u>ready for care long wait lists increasing</u> from 1,018 to 3,218 an increase of 2,200.

Achievements

- The State Government has funded infrastructure upgrades at the Stanthorpe and Warwick hospitals in recent years, including \$1.0M for water security infrastructure works (Stanthorpe and Warwick hospitals)
 - completed November 2020.

Natural Disaster Relief Arrangements – Southern Downs Regional Council area

Recommended response

- The Government is committed to ensuring the recovery of all communities impacted by natural disasters.
- Since the establishment of the Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) in 2011, approximately \$95.0M has been approved in disaster recovery and resilience funding for the Southern Downs.

Key Facts

- Southern Downs Regional Council (SDRC) has been activated for joint State-Commonwealth Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) assistance for the following events that are currently in delivery:
 - Southern Queensland flooding, 6 20 May 2022
 - South East Queensland rainfall and flooding, 22 February 5 April 2022
 - Central, Southern and Western Queensland rainfall and flooding,
 10 November 3 December 2021
 - Southern Queensland severe weather, 20 24 March 2021; and
 - Southern Queensland heavy rainfall and flooding, 8 14 February 2020.
- SDRC's combined DRFA-funded reconstruction program for these events is approximately \$30.5M, including more than \$10.0M associated with the 2022 events.
- DRFA Category C/D Special Disaster Assistance (Clean-up and Recovery Grants) of up to \$75,000 for primary producers and up to \$50,000 for small businesses and not-for-profit organisations have been made available in the Southern Downs region following the late 2021 and early 2022 rainfall and flooding events.
- To date, 64 primary producers in SDRC area have accessed grants totalling more than \$950,000, eight small business grants totalling \$113,300 have been approved, and three not-for-profits have had grants totalling more than \$24,000 approved.

Achievements

- Prior to the introduction of the DRFA in November 2018, SDRC was activated for NDRRA assistance following natural disasters in 2011, 2013 and 2017. These works are complete and were jointly funded by the Commonwealth and State under the NDRRA.
- Following the 2019 Bushfires, SDRC completed approximately \$135,000 in DRFA counter disaster operations aimed at community safety.
- \$1.3M DRFA Exceptional Assistance Package was approved for SDRC to provide immediate support to the community.
- Tourism operators in the Southern Downs were also supported through a \$20M Tourism and Community Recovery Package under Category C of the DRFA to address the long-term mental health, economic, tourism, environmental and industry impacts from the 2019 Bushfires.
- Since 2017, Queensland Reconstruction Authority (QRA) has approved more than \$4.7M in resilience funding for SDRC projects through programs including Get Ready Queensland, Local Economic Recovery Package, the 2018 Natural Disaster Resilience Program, the 2018-19 Queensland Disaster Resilience Fund, the 2019-20 and 2020-21 rounds of the Queensland Resilience and Risk Reduction Fund, and the Betterment Fund.

Background

 The eligibility guidelines for reconstruction projects under DRFA and NDRRA are set by the Commonwealth and administered by the QRA.

Policing and Youth Crime – Darling Downs

POLICE NUMBERS

- Darling Downs Police District has 540 permanent positions, <u>up 19</u> since 2015.
- It was fantastic to announce late last year an additional 2,025 police personnel across the state.
- This is a \$624M investment over five years for 2,025 new police personnel. Of those 1,450 will be deployed to the frontline which means at least 150 positions will be located per key region across the state.
- We're also investing in 25 mobile police vans that will take police into the heart of the community.
- There are more than 12,000 police officers in Queensland a record number. <u>Under Labor, there are more police in Queensland than</u> ever before with more on the way.
- And we back police 100% in what they do best keeping communities safe, providing them with the necessary equipment, like body worn cameras, new vehicles and tasers.

CRIME STATS

- From 1 July 2021 to 31 March 2022:
 - the overall rate of Total Reported Crime for the Darling Downs
 Police District increased by 993 offences or 4 per cent
 compared with the same time period the previous year;
 - the rate of Offences Against the Person increased by 56 percent or 1,019 offences;
 - the rate of Offences Against Property increased by 28 per cent
 or 2,169; and
 - the rate of Other Offences decreased by 17 per cent or 2,195 offences.

YOUTH CRIME

- In response to community concerns, I announced in 2020 a \$15.8M Five-Point Action Plan:
 - offenders posing a risk to the community should not get bail;
 - a police blitz on bail, appealing court decisions where appropriate;

- a 24/7 Police Strike Team;
- culture-based rehabilitation for Indigenous offenders through new On Country initiatives; and
- empowering local communities in the war on crime with \$2M for community-based organisations for local solutions.
- Building on these measures, the Government is targeting hardcore youth criminals who repeatedly offend and put the community at risk.
- For noting, compared to 2019, data for 2020 indicates increases in the number of proven offences and distinct young people with a proven offence. This is due to the COVID-19 pandemic response, which resulted in delayed court processes and delays in finalising charges (with finalisations occurring in 2020-21).
- Within the <u>Southern Downs Regional Council</u> (SDRC) area, comparing December 2021 to December 2019 data there has been:
 - a decrease of 77 per cent in the number of proven offences committed by 10-17-year-olds; and
 - a decrease of 54 per cent in the number of distinct 10-17-yearold offenders, with at least one proven offence committed in the SDRC area.
- Eight restorative youth justice conferences have been held in the SDRC area in the 12 months to 31 December 2021. Victims have the opportunity to come face-to-face with offenders and come to an agreement on how the offender can make amends.

INFRASTRUCTURE

• \$15M total project budget has been allocated to upgrade the Warwick police facility, supporting 49.5 jobs. The project is in the planning stage, with \$500,000 allocated to commence planning and design works.

LNP

- A total police budget increase of 2.8%. Given the rate of inflation, that's a cut to police funding in real terms.
- Sacked 110 senior police and cut a further 212 police positions
- Cut police training, reduced firearms training, forced police to pay for their own body worn video cameras
- Slashed the auto theft squad from 18 to 3

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- Axed funding to the National Motor Vehicle Theft Reduction Council we reinstated it.
- Wasted millions of dollars on a failed boot camp experiment to breed fitter, faster criminals.
- Failed to fund the roll out of automatic number plate recognition technology that helps police track stolen vehicles.
- The LNP had its chance to stamp out youth crime. It didn't work.
- The LNP voted against our amendments to get tough on bail.



Schools - Overview

Recommended response

- We are investing \$1.4 billion in 2021-22 to build, maintain and improve schools across the state.
- We opened 3 new schools this year (2022) and are planning for a new school in Brisbane's inner west over the coming years and substantially expanding 13 existing schools by the end of June 2022.
- Since coming to Government in 2015, we have opened <u>21 new</u> schools.
- My Government is also investing \$20M for planning and land acquisitions for a further 16 new schools beyond 2023.
- Queensland is a growing state and we are delivering the infrastructure and educational facilities needed to support this growth.
- Of the 28 schools in the Southern Downs Regional Council (SDRC) area:
 - all fall within the Queensland state electorate of Southern Downs;
 - major infrastructure work being carried out at 12 schools totalling almost \$17M;
 - Over \$7M worth of works at 2 schools announced in the 2020
 General State Election including nearly \$6M for a new multipurpose hall at warwick State High School;
 - all schools have air conditioning and solar panels installed.
- All Queensland state school classrooms, libraries and staff rooms are now air conditioned, delivering more comfortable teaching and learning environments for our students, teachers and school communities.

Air conditioning and solar panels

 On 27 February 2020, the Government announced the CCSP which will provide more than \$477M over 4 years to air condition state schools and expand the existing ACES program. On 19 April 2022, the Government announced the CCSP has been fully delivered, providing all Queensland state school classrooms, libraries and staff rooms with air conditioning. Installations were completed over two months ahead of schedule to ensure airconditioned spaces were available from the start of Term 2, 2022.

• The CCSP replaced the Government's former Cooler Schools Program.
