Achievements – Central Queensland region

HEALTH

- \$16.26M for the Rockhampton Drug Rehabilitation and Treatment Facility opened in December 2021.
- \$225M for Rockhampton Hospital redevelopment and upgrade of emergency department, central sterilisation services, a new ward block, upgraded kitchen and hotel services, and new theatres. Project completed in Jun-2019
- \$35.6M for 3 upgrade projects to Rockhampton Hospital and completed between 2018 and 2020.
- \$5.7M for upgrades to the North Rockhampton Nursing Centre completed by February 2019.

POLICE AND COURTHOUSES

- \$3.5M Biloela Police Station new station being built to replace older building – Biloela police station moved to a temporary facility in March 2021 and the construction tender was also awarded in March 2021 – project is expected to support 11.55 FTE jobs and be completed in February 2022
- \$12M Rockhampton Courthouse Upgrade addressed water damage to the building, improved disability access and jury facilities, refurbished public entrance and foyer – project supported 39 jobs and was completed February 2020.

- \$7.8M Parkhurst State School new building-with learning spaces completed by Jun-2021
- \$5.1M Yeppoon State High School new building which includes five general learning areas and tuckshop refurbished, all projects completed by June 2020

- \$5.3M Rockhampton Fire and Rescue Station (FRS) and new Regional Communication Centre - renovations and adding a floor to the Rockhampton FRS to house the new Regional Communication Centre - completed August 2019.

CAPITAL INVESTMENT

 \$12.5M over 5 years to establish a permanent aviation base at Rockhampton Airport. The project was announced on 3 May 2019.
 Alliance Airlines has signed a commercial lease for facilities at Rockhampton Airport, recruitment has commenced and planning for the new services is underway. The project is expected to generate up to 58 new jobs.

CORRECTIVE SERVICES

\$241M - Capricornia Correctional Centre expansion project - when fully complete will deliver an additional 348 cells and 396 beds (expanding the facility's capacity to a total of 758 cells and 945 beds) - utilities building opened on 31 October 2019 and two secure units (additional 100 beds) opened in August 2020 - final stage to be completed by 30 June 2021.





New Rookwood Weir bridge completed

The new bridge over the Fitzroy River at Riverslea has officially opened, the third road upgrade delivered as part of the Rookwood Weir project. To date, bridge and road upgrades have created over 100 jobs, while construction of the weir itself will support a further 200 jobs for Queenslanders, with 140 of these jobs going to local workers.

The Queensland and Australian Governments have each committed another \$7.5 million for the Rookwood Weir to unlock 10,000 additional megalitres of water for Central Queensland, bringing the total investment to \$367.2 million. Rookwood Weir will be a transformational piece of water infrastructure that will underpin agricultural growth and supply industrial and urban water to the Rockhampton, Yeppoon and Gladstone communities.

The 86,000 megalitres of water from the weir increases water security and gives local farmers greater opportunities to expand their businesses, creating more jobs and greater resilience in regional communities through drought bushfires, floods and COVID-19.





Powering Queensland's ports and shipping

The Queensland Government is investing \$21 million over four years for a plan to revitalise and strengthen the state's coastal shipping and reinvigorate maritime jobs.

Reinvigorating Queensland's coastal shipping industry builds resilience in the supply chain and helps maintain essential transport links. The investment will make better use of Queensland's 'blue highway' by giving businesses more transport options and creating new regional jobs.

The new Maritime Consultation Group of port representatives, maritime industry and training organisations will work with government to grow the state's maritime capacity. The group will consider the incentives for new and existing operators to establish a new regional coastal shipping service between Brisbane and Townsville, and for existing operators to switch to Queensland crews.

As part of the plan, \$1 million will fund maritime cadetships and training for Queenslanders who want to enter the industry or upskill.

STATEWIDE HIGHLIGHTS

The Queensland Government's Economic Recovery Plan continues to support businesses, workers, families and communities across the state. Our success in managing the health challenges imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic means the state's \$360 billion economy has begun to recover sooner and is stronger than the rest of Australia.

2021-22 Budget highlights include:

Tax relief package

The government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium businesses.
- a payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals for eligible taxpayers.

An estimated 280 employers in Central Queensland will also benefit in 2021-22 from the higher payroll tax threshold.


\$2 billion Queensland Renewable Energy and Hydrogen Jobs Fund


The Fund will increase investment by government-owned corporations in commercial renewable energy and hydrogen projects, along with supporting infrastructure, including in partnership with the private sector.






2021-22 expenses

Schools - Overview

Recommended response

- In 2021-22 more than \$50M is being invested in schools to maintain, improve and upgrade schools in the Central Queensland region:
- We are investing \$1.4 billion in 2021-22 to build, maintain and improve schools across the state.
- Since coming to Government in 2015, we have opened <u>29 new schools.</u>
- We are planning for a new school in Brisbane's inner west over the coming years and substantially expanding 13 existing schools during 2021-22.
- My Government is also investing \$20M for planning and land acquisitions for a further 16 new schools beyond 2023.
- Queensland is a growing state and we are delivering the infrastructure and educational facilities needed to support this growth.
- Of the 40 schools in the Rockhampton Regional Council (RRC) and Livingstone Shire Council (LSC) areas:
 - almost \$43M worth of major infrastructure work carried out at 22 schools;
 - almost \$44M worth of works at 18 schools are in progress including 2020 election commitments;
 - all schools have air conditioning installed; and
 - 38 schools have solar panels installed, 24 through the Advancing Clean Energy Schools (ACES) program.
- All Queensland state school classrooms, libraries and staff rooms are to be air conditioned by the end of June 2022, delivering more comfortable teaching and learning environments for our students, teachers and school communities.

Rockhampton Railyard Purchase and Redevelopment

Recommended response

- In December 2021, the Government signed a contract with Aurizon Holdings to buy-back of the 17.32ha Rockhampton Railyard site.
- The Rockhampton Railyard redevelopment will transform the site, with opportunities for local industry across multiple labour markets.
- The Department of Transport and Main Roads (DTMR) is investigating redevelopment opportunities of the site such as tostering rollingstock supply chain capabilities including manufacturing, stabling, education and community amenity.

Key facts

- DTMR expects a contract to be unconditional before mid-2022 and will complete a strategic assessment and identify viable ways to establish Rockhampton as a rail manufacturing supply chain hub.
- The property comprises two adjoining lots. Linfox owns 50 per cent of the site (the southern half) and operates an intermodal freight terminal.
- The site features a rollingstock depot, workshop facility and other rail infrastructure with heritage listed areas from the early 1900s, including one of only two remaining full circle roundhouses in Australia.
- In early 2021, Rockhampton Regional Council (RRC) approved a development application for a variation to the planning scheme, to develop the site for educational, community, retail and industrial uses.
- DTMR is working with RRC to determine uses for the site that support the region's growth strategies, existing industries and appropriately manage and maintain the site's heritage areas.

Background

- Part of the site is on the Queensland State Heritage Register, which will need to be considered with respect to future use.
- In mid-2021, DTMR undertook a Registration of Interest process with local industry to gather details of potential uses for the site and understand capabilities of local businesses and suppliers that would like to be involved in the development or future use of the site. Through this process, DTMR received 20 responses and a range of offers from service providers.
- DTMR plans to undertake further engagement with key stakeholders and local industry in earl- 2022 to discuss redevelopment opportunities and gather ideas for consideration.
- DTMR engaged with the Department of State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning and the Department of Regional Development, Manufacturing and Water in developing opportunities for the site.

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COVID-19 – Economic Support and Recovery

Recommended response

- The Government has been quick to respond to COVID-19 pandemic.
- To support business and families, the Government has invested \$8 billion in a range of assistance initiatives and job creating projects.
- In the Rockhampton and Livingstone areas, we have assisted businesses through:
 - \$3.7M in Small Business support and adaption grants supporting 422 businesses; and
 - \$13.3M from our \$1 billion Jobs Support Loan scheme to
 93 businesses supporting 1,328 jobs locally.
- \$10.98M in Payroll Tax Relief to 363 businesses in Central Queensland area.
- As our State continues to open, we will continue to work with the Federal Government, so businesses and industry get the necessary support.

- Through our Growing Indigenous Tourism program, we provided \$50,000 for the:
 - Dreamtime Cultural Centre / Dreamtime Cultural Centre site master plan; and
 - Darumbal People Aboriginal Corporation RNTBC/ Yadaba Nunthi Nurrim for its native foods cafe and cultural tours.

Tourism industry sentiment

Overall assessment for the Southern Great barrier Reef tourism region

- In the year ending September 2021, total overnight expenditure decreased by 1.2% to \$1.3 billion compared with the pre-COVID year ending December 2019 reflecting a 14.1% reduction in total visitation to 2.1 million.
- In the September quarter 2021, visitation was down 13.9% compared to the September quarter 2019 and visitor nights were down 26.3%.
- The larger decrease in nights than visitation may be due to the lack of international travel, since international visitors stay for longer on average than domestic visitors
- This data for September 2021, reflects a 19.4% increase in spend per night to \$158 per night. The increase in spend per night is due to an increase in spending on both accommodation and food and drink.
- In the year ending September 2021, compared to 2019:
 - visits to friends and relatives decreased 14.1% to 595,000;
 - business visits were down 30.8% to 518,000; and
 - holiday visitation grew by 15.3% to a record 848,000.

LNP

 - 147 people with Covid-19 at home,

Elective Surgery Waitlist

- Between 1 June 2020 and 31 December 2021, 9,720 patients were added to the Elective Surgery Waitlist,
- As at 1 January 2022, the <u>Elective Surgery Ready for Surgery</u> Waitlists showed:
 - ready for surgery waitlist increased from 1,964 (as at 1 June 2020)
 to 2,120 a growth of 156; and
 - ready for surgery long waitlist decreased from 75 (as at 1 June 2020) to 13 – a reduction of 62.

Specialist Outpatient Department (SOPD) Waitlist

- Between 1 June 2020 and 30 October 2021, an estimated 39,700 patients were added to the SOPD Waitlist.
- As at 1 September 2021, the <u>SOPD Ready for Care Waitlists</u> showed:
 - the <u>SOPD ready</u> for care waitlist increased from 8,424 (as at 1 June 2020) to 11,202 a growth of 2,778; and
 - the <u>SOPD ready for care long waitlist</u> **increased** from 2,127 (as at 1 June 2020) to 4,518 a growth of 2,391.

Gastrointestinal Endoscopy Waitlist

- Between 1 June 2020 and 30 October 2021, 7,077 patients were added to the Gastrointestinal Endoscopy (GIE) Procedures Waitlist.
- As at 1 January 2022, the <u>GIE procedures waitlists</u> showed:
 - the <u>GIE procedures waitlist</u> increased from 714 (as at 1 June 2020) to 743 – a growth of 29; and
 - the GIE procedures long waitlist increased from 5 (as at 1 June 2020) to 26 – a growth of 21.

- Rockhampton Railyard Purchase and Redevelopment in December 2021, the Government signed a contract with Aurizon Holdings to buy-back the 17.32ha Rockhampton Railyard site with a rollingstock depot, workshop facility and other rail infrastructure with heritage listed areas from the early 1900s and redevelop the site to offer opportunities for local industry and across multiple labour markets, such as manufacturing, stabling, education and community amenity.
- Regional Refresh Program throughout 2022, changes will be made to the TransLink and queenstation of the Government's \$371M Smart Ticketing system to provide more affordable public transport and greater convenience.

Recent road projects completed

- \$194M Bruce Highway Rockhampton Northern Access upgrade (\$158M) and Safety upgrades at Terranova Drive intersection (\$36M) – jointly funded by the State and Federal governments – supporting 260 jobs – completed August 2021.
- \$74.99M Capricorn Highway duplication from Rockhampton to Gracemere – jointly funded by the State and Federal governments – supporting 187 jobs – completed July 2021.
- **\$8.3M** replaced Valentine Creek Bridge on the Capricorn Highway, between Rockhampton and Westwood jointly funded by the State and Federal governments completed December 2019.
- 19M Capricorn Highway six overtaking lanes between Emerald and Rockhampton – jointly funded by the State and Federal governments – supported 61 jobs – completed December 2020.
- \$10M Stage 1 Rockhampton-Yeppoon Road intersections upgrades (Moores Creek Road/Musgrave Street; and Queen Elizabeth Drive/Lakes Creek Road) – <u>State Government funded</u> – completed in February 2017.
- \$20M Rockhampton-Emu Park Road Type 1 road train access to Rockhampton Abattoirs resafety and capacity upgrades including

replacing Frenchmans Creek Bridge – <u>Federal Government funded</u> – completed February 2021.

Recent completed cycleway upgrades

- \$6.6M Bruce Highway bicycle on and off-road paths jointly funded by the State and Federal governments – completed December 2021.
- \$3.3M Bruce Highway (Rockhampton-St Lawrence). Cariton Street to Yeppoon Road jointly funded by the State and Federal governments completed December 2021.

LNP

- The LNP cut \$600M from Queensland's road budget
- Sacked 20 per cent Main Roads staff, including 700 RoadTek road builders and cut long-term planning for roads.

Policing and Youth Crime

POLICE NUMBERS

- Capricornia Police District has 605 permanent positions, <u>up 74</u> since 2015.
- It was fantastic to announce late last year an additional 2,025 police personal across the state.
- This is a \$624M investment over five years for 2,025 new police personnel. Of those 1,450 will be deployed to the frontline which means at least 150 positions will be located per key region across the State.
- We're also investing in 25 mobile police vans that will take police into the heart of the community.
- There are more than 12,000 police officers in Queensland a record number. <u>Under Labor, there are more police in Queensland than</u> <u>ever before with more on the way.</u>
- And we back police 100% in what they do best keeping communities safe, providing them with the necessary equipment, like body worn cameras, new vehicles and tasers

INCREASE TO CAPRICORNIA DISTRICT

- The Queensland Police Service's Service Delivery Redesign project looked at demand and resource allocation and reviewed all police districts.
- As a result of the project, from 1 July 2021, multiple police divisions were reallocated from the Darling Downs and South West police districts to the Capricornia Police District.

CRIME STATS

- From 1 July to 31 December 2021, the overall rate of Total Reported Crime for the Capricornia Police District increased by 2,581 offences or 19 per cent compared with previous year.
- From 1 July to 31 December 2021, compared with the previous year, the rate of:
 - Offences Against the Person increased by 899 offences or 69 per cent;

- Offences Against Property increased by 903 offences or 21 per cent; and
- Other Offences increased by 779 offences or 9 per cent.

<u>INFRASTRUCTURE</u>

 \$4.95M <u>Biloela replacement police facility</u> – construction is expected to be completed in February 2022 and expected to support around 16.3 FTE jobs.

YOUTH CRIME

- In response to community concerns, I announced a \$15.8M Five-Point Action Plan:
 - offenders posing a risk to the community should not get bail;
 - a police blitz on bail, appealing court decisions where appropriate;
 - a 24/7 Police Strike Team;
 - culture-based rehabilitation for Indigenous offenders through new On Country initiatives; and
 - empowering local communities in the war on crime with \$2M for community-based organisations for local solutions.
- The Government is targeting hardcore youth criminals who repeatedly offend and put the community at risk with legislation in 2021:
 - providing the Courts with more powers allowing them to -
 - require fitting of GPS trackers as a condition of bail for recidivist high risk offenders aged 16 and 17
 - create a presumption against bail for youth offenders arrested for further serious indictable offences (such as breaking and entering) while on bail
 - seek assurances from parents/guardians that bail conditions will be complied with before an offender is released;
 - strengthening bail laws to further guide the courts;
 - including the common law principle that offending whilst on bail is an aggravating circumstance; and
 - including crime prevention amendments such as strengthened antihooning laws to hold the registered owner of a vehicle responsible except where the vehicle is stolen or the owner can identify another driver.

- Assistant Police Commissioner Cheryl Scanlon is leading a Youth Crime Taskforce to implement the new measures and former Police Commissioner Bob Atkinson will report on the efficacy of the measures in six months.
- In October 2021, the Youth Crime Taskforce released the multi-agency action plan phase.

Youth Crime facts

- As at 8 February 2022, Rockhampton Youth Justice Service Centre provides supervision to 66 young people.
- For noting, compared to 2019-20, data for 2020-21 indicates increases in the number of proven offences and distinct young people with a proven offence. This is due to the COVID-19 pandemic response, which resulted in delayed court processes and delays in finalising charges (with finalisations occurring in 2020-21).
- As a result, offending data for 2019-20 appears to be lower than usual, while 2020-21 appears to be higher than usual. To provide a more accurate picture of overall trends over time, 2020-21 data should be compared to 2018-19.
- Based on data provide by the courts, comparing 2020-21 to 2018-19 there was:
 - a 2 per cent decrease in the number of proven offences committed in Rockhampton by 10-17-year-olds.
 - a 13 per cent decrease in the number of distinct 10-17-year-old offenders, with at least one proven offence committed in Rockhampton.

LNP

- A total police budget increase of 2.8%. Given the rate of inflation, that's a cut to police funding in real terms
- Sacked 110 senior police and cut a further 212 police positions.
- Cut police training, reduced firearms training, forced police to pay for their own body worn video cameras
- Slashed the auto theft squad from 18 to 3
- Axed funding to the National Motor Vehicle Theft Reduction Council we reinstated it

- Wasted millions of dollars on a failed boot camp experiment to breed fitter, faster criminals
- Failed to fund the roll out of automatic number plate recognition technology that helps police track stolen vehicles



Bruce Highway

Recommended response

- Queensland's economic recovery plan is about building the infrastructure we need to create jobs.
- That plan includes a **jointly-funded \$13 billion for the Bruce Highway** to improve flood resilience and safety and increase capacity.
- The Bruce is Queensland's backbone and upgrades are underway or about to start in Cairns, Townsville, Mackay, Rockhampton, Gympie and the Sunshine Coast, supporting thousands of jobs.
- This government has also established a Bruce Highway Trust to take the politics out of the Bruce and lock in a long-term pipeline of jobs and infrastructure upgrades, with members from peak Queensland industry and business bodies.
- In September 2021, the Government also appointed six regional members to the Trust, to make sure the funding was going to where it's needed most.

- \$194M Rockhampton Northern Access and safety upgrades 261
 jobs completed August 2021;
- \$1.065 billion Rockhampton Ring Road plan, preserve and construct – supporting 783 jobs – construction expected to commence in 2022 and be completed mid-2026; and

- Under Newman and Frecklington the LNP cut \$1.6 billion out of the road and transport budget and made a virtue out of it.
- Sacked 20 per cent of Main Roads staff, including 700 road builders.
- LNP cannot be trusted when it comes to committing funds to regional roads.

Background

- Currently \$13 billion in joint-funding locked in for the Bruce Highway helping to build major job creating, congestion busting projects like:
 - \$163.3M Deception Bay Road Interchange construction due to be completed early-2023;

- <u>\$662.5M</u> Caboolture to Steve Irwin Way upgrade 664 jobs (for the entire project) construction due to be completed late-2023;
- <u>\$932M</u> Caloundra Road to the Sunshine Motorway 680 jobs completed in July 2021;
- <u>\$1 billion</u> Cooroy to Curra Section D (Gympie Bypass) 576 jobs construction due to be completed mid-2024;
- <u>\$14M</u> Wide Bay Highway intersection (Gympie) upgrade between Meadows Lane and the Wide Bay Highway – completed September 2021;
- \$336M Tiaro Bypass (Gympie to Maryborough) improve flood immunity project is in the planning phase;
- \$103M new Saltwater Creek Bridge between Maryborough and Torbanlea (Gin Gin) expected to support 286 jobs due to be completed late-2023;
- <u>\$20.3M</u> Maryborough to Apple Tree Creek (Gin Gin) safety upgrades supporting 50 jobs completed August 2021;
- \$43.4M Gin Gin to Benaraby safety improvements due to be completed December 2022;
- <u>\$21M</u> Calliope River to Mount Larcom intersection and safety upgrades 55 jobs completed May-2021;
- <u>\$26.66M</u> Gentle Annie Road, Ambrose to St Arnauds Creek, Raglan safety upgrades –
 71 jobs completed August 2021;
- <u>\$194M</u> Rockhampton Northern Access and safety upgrades 261 jobs completed August 2021;
- \$1.065 billion Rockhampton Ring Road plan, preserve and construct supporting 783 jobs – construction expected to commence in 2022 and be completed mid-2026;
- <u>\$32.25M</u> Neilsen Avenue, Rockhampton to Plentiful Creek, St Lawrence 3 safety upgrade packages supporting 24 jobs –due to be completed mid-2022;
- <u>\$10.93M</u> Plentiful Creek St Lawrence overtaking lanes 24 jobs completed January 2021;
- \$497.3M Mackay Ring Road supported 534 jobs opened to traffic in September 2020;
- \$120.35M Mackay Northern Access Upgrade project (from the Ron Camm Bridge to Bald Hill Road) – supporting 154 jobs – due to be completed August 2022;
- \$39.13M The Leap to Careys Creek (between Mackay and Proserpine) safety upgrades
 supporting 94 jobs completed January 2022;

- \$11M Dallachy Road, near Tully improve flood immunity project is in the planning phase;

- \$123.7M Cairns Southern Access Stage 4 between Kate and Aumuller streets 130 jobs
 completed July 2021; and
- <u>\$225M</u> Cairns Southern Access Stage 5 Foster Road intersection upgrade (Cairns) project is in the planning phase.
- Based on 80:20 funding arrangements, the rolling five year action plans will identify upgrades
 to the Bruce Highway which are most important to Queenslanders, for future federal and state
 government funding consideration.
- There are also some Bruce Highway upgrade projects the Federal Government is funding 100 per cent.

Reef Protection Regulations and Health Status

Recommended response

- We applaud the producers that have invested effort into improving practices to improve water quality flowing to the Great Barrier Reef (Reef).
- We need all producers to implement improved practices for a healthy Reef that supports tens of thousands of Queensland lobs.
- Faster progress towards the Reef water quality targets is also a priority for keeping the Reef off the world heritage in-danger listing, which is due for consideration by the World Heritage Committee mid-2022.
- Minimum practice agricultural standards commenced 1 December 2021 for graziers and will commence 1 December 2022 for sugarcane and banana producers in the region.
- A permit is also required to start commercial cropping and horticulture activities on more than five hectares of land without a cropping history.
- Public consultation closed on 20 January 2022 on small administrative updates proposed to the minimum standards to make the requirements easier to understand and comply with.
- Minimum practice agricultural standards for grains and horticulture are proposed to commence from 1 December 2024 giving these industries an additional two years to improve their practices voluntarily.
- New standards also commenced on 1 June 2021, for urban and industrial environmentally relevant activities such as mines, aquaculture, and sewage treatment that may result in nutrient or sediment emissions in Reef catchments.
- The region's catchments flow into the Southern Reef where the coral condition had an overall improvement in the 2020-21 reporting period.

Key facts

- The State Government allocated a further \$270M over five years from 2021-22 to continue the successful Reef Water Quality Improvement program from the Far North Queensland to Wide Bay.
- In February 2022, the Federal Government provided the State Party Report on the state of conservation for Australia's Great Barrier Reef in response to the World Heritage Committee's Decision 44 in 2021.

- In June 2022, the World Heritage Committee will consider the report.
- The Report:
 - provides an update on measures, actions and condition of the Reef since Outlook 2019 was released;
 - confirms that Outstanding Universal Value of the Reef is intact; and
 - that the corrective measures outlined in the Reef 2050 Plan is working to protect the health and resilience of the Reef.

Reef health

- Overall, offshore reefs in the Southern Reef increased their coral cover (an indicator of coral condition) from 29% to 39% in the past two years.
- There was minor coral loss due to the 2020 bleaching event and ongoing active outbreaks of crown-of-thorns starfish in this region.
- Inshore reefs in the region are slowly recovering from multiple disturbances in 2012 - 2014 with recovery limited by continued high presence of algae.
- Seagrass meadows in the region remain in poor condition with little evidence of recovery following weather-related impacts in 2011-12.
- Surveys indicate there was only minor coral loss on inshore reefs due to the widespread coral bleaching event in 2020.

Reef protection regulations

- On 1 December 2019, strengthened Reef protection regulations commenced roll out over three years as part of a mix of tools to improve Reef water quality based on water quality priorities.
- Due to low uptake, the future of the \$10.1M for the Farming in Reef Catchments repate scheme is being considered as part of the review of the Queensland Reef Water Quality Program.

Achievements

- Between 2009 and 2021, more than \$156M was allocated to support the agricultural industry to improve productivity, profitability and water quality through industry-led Best Management Practice programs, extension support and science and on-ground programs.
- The Grazing Resilience and Sustainable Solutions program supported 123 grazing businesses put in place tailored management plans to manage poor or degraded land, with 47 of these businesses receiving grants to undertake on ground projects worth \$1.2M.

Background

- A 2017 Deloitte Access Economics report found the Great Barrier Reef (GBR) added \$3.9B to the Queensland economy in 2015-16 and supported more than 33,000 full-time jobs.
- Strengthening the Reef protection regulations responds to the GBR Water Science Taskforce recommendations on how best to meet the Reef water quality targets for a healthy Reef.
- The Reef 2050 Water Quality Improvement Plan sets water quality reduction targets of 60% for dissolved inorganic nitrogen loads and 25% for sediment loads.
- Everyone meeting regulated minimum practice standards (MPSs) across the main commodity types is modelled to achieve around 80% of the target for reducing dissolved inorganic nitrogen and 16% of the target for reducing sediment pollution.
- Agricultural peak bodies, including CANEGROWERS, continue to publicly re-iterate their position of not supporting the regulatory approach to improving water quality.
- Under the MPSs, records of fertilisers and chemicals applied must be kept. Graziers in the region now must comply with MPSs to keep grazing land in at least fair condition.
- The permit requirements for new cropping and horticulture do not duplicate the MPSs for sugarcane and bananas. The permit focuses on the design and set-up of a farm prior to cropping and the minimum practice standards on the ongoing farm operation.

World heritage matters

- In June 2021, the World Heritage Centre, the advisory body to the UNESCO World Heritage Committee (WHC), released its draft decision about the state of conservation of the Reef, recommending the Committee list the Reef as "in danger" at its July meeting.
- Key considerations underpinning the draft decision included the long-term outlook for the Reef
 ecosystem in the face of climate change, and insufficient progress towards the water quality
 and land management targets.
- However, in July 2021, the WHC decided not to list the Reef as world heritage "in danger" and instead await the outcomes of a joint World Heritage Centre-International Union of the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Reactive Monitoring mission centred around an updated Reef 2050 Plan and accelerated action. The Federal Government invited the World Heritage Centre and the IUCN to conduct a reactive monitoring mission to the Reef in early 2022.
- The decision required Australia to provide an updated report on the state of conservation of the property to the World Heritage Centre by 1 February 2022. The report will be considered at the next session of the WHC in Russia in June 2022.
- Queensland Government supported the Federal Government in preparing the report and in facilitating the reactive monitoring mission.

Reef health monitoring

- In the region, offshore coral reefs are monitored biannually through the Australian Institute of Marine Science (AIMS) Long-Term Monitoring Program (LTMP) and inshore coral reefs and seagrass meadows are monitored annually through the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority Marine Monitoring Program (MMP).
- Since the 2020 mass bleaching event on the Reef, the LTMP has released coral monitoring results from August 2020 and MMP has released survey results from May 2020 for the region.

Private members bill

On 20 October 2021, the Health and Environment Parliamentary Committee recommended a
private member's bill to repeal the Reef protection laws not be passed. This will commence
debate in the first sitting week for 2022 (22-24 February).

Central Queensland – Housing

Key facts

- In the Central Queensland Region, under the QuickStarts Qld program, we will commence 113 new social homes over four years with a planned investment of \$39.9M supporting 125 jobs.
- This is in addition to the 48 new social homes already commenced in the Central Queensland Region under the Queensland Housing Strategy 2017-2027 (Housing Strategy) since 2017, including:
 - 28 in the Rockhampton Regional Council (RC) area; and
 - 16 through Works for Tradies:
 - 4 of these are in the Gladstone RC area
 - 12 of these are in the Rockhampton RC area.
- More broadly, the Queensland Government is increasing Queensland's supply of social and affordable housing by almost 10,000 over the life of the Housing Strategy, including:
 - 6,365 social housing commencements over the next four years;
 - in addition to the 2,480 commencements under the first four years of the Housing Strategy; and
 - 1,034 affordable housing commencements over the life of the Housing Strategy.
- Between 2015-16 to 31 January 2022:
 - in the Rockhampton RC area contracts awarded for the commencement of 51 dwellings, of which 45 dwellings have been completed, and
 - in the Gladstone RC area contracts awarded for the commencement of 4 dwellings.

Housing Investment

- This budget's \$2.9 billion total housing investment is the largest concentrated investment in social housing in Queensland's history.
- The Queensland Government launched a bold new housing action plan backed by a \$1.9 billion investment over four years and the establishment of a \$1 billion Housing Investment Fund (HIF) to boost housing supply and increase housing and homelessness support across Queensland.

• This investment, through the Palaszczuk Government's *Queensland Housing and Homelessness Action Plan 2021-2025* (the Action Plan) strengthens the momentum created since the 10-year *Queensland Housing Strategy* was launched in 2017 and responds to the current housing market conditions we are now facing.

Queensland Housing Investment Growth Initiative

- The Queensland Housing Investment Growth Initiative (QHIGI) procurement process launched on 28 October 2021 to invite interest in any one of three initiatives and will deliver accelerated social housing supply of **6,365 social housing commencements** through:
 - HIF a \$1 billion investment which will generate an estimated \$40M to deliver 3,600 new social housing dwelling commencements and additional affordable housing between 2021-2025:
 - the EOI for the HIF remains open for proposals to be submitted
 - regional allocation of the 3,600 commencements under the HIF will be determined by demand and opportunities;
 - QuickStarts Qld a capital investment program to commence 2,765 new social housing dwellings over four years, primarily through partnerships with Community Housing Providers (CHPs), for social housing eligible clients;
 - 727 new social housing homes are targeted to commence under QuickStarts Qld by the end of June 2022
 - the Request for Detailed Proposal process for QuickStarts Qld closed on 21 January 2022 and evaluation of proposals are underway, with priority given to spot purchases and 2021-22 commencements;
 - Help to Home (H2H) a \$40M dollar investment to deliver private market outcomes for 1,000 households and additional spot purchase for two years with the first stage being to engage Registered Community Housing Providers to manage the properties and deliver services to eligible social housing customers
 - the EOI for H2H closed on 3 December 2021
 - the program is progressing through two stages
 - the first stage involved procuring the registered housing providers to manage tenancies and is currently being finalised
 - the next stage will focus on sourcing suitable properties from the market, and this will commence in the coming months.

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most of these homes will be newly built properties that are yet to come onto the rental market, or existing homes that haven't been on the rental market before.

Delivering essential housing and homelessness services to Queenslanders

 The Action Plan supports the Queensland Government's continued commitment to deliver essential frontline services and provide enhanced housing and support options for vulnerable people, moving towards ending homelessness.

• The Action Plan:

- establishes the QHIGI
- accelerates the construction, redevelopment and spot purchase of social housing homes
- tailors housing responses for First Nations peoples and communities, to continue to close the gap
- provides \$20M for homelessness initiatives, improving services and support to provide accommodation to people in crisis
- provides \$20M to enhance frontline responses to domestic violence, through a specialist response team and flexible assistance packages
- provides \$54.9M to fund essential housing and homelessness services established under the Queensland Housing Strategy Action Plan 2017-2020
- puts in place measures and protections to ensure fairer private rental and retirement living systems
- supports the creation of new construction jobs in the regions.

Aboriginal and Forres Strait Islander Housing Action Plan

- The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Action Plan 2019-2023 funding of \$67.1M over four years from 2019-2023 is focussed on improving housing outcomes for First Nations peoples, including an investment of \$24.1M in 2021-22.
- The Government is committed to reframing our relationship with First Nations peoples and will deliver improved housing outcomes through genuine partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Queenslanders.

- Key actions under the Action Plans include commitments to:
 - develop place-based, community led, local housing plans with communities to identify and respond to local housing challenges and priorities
 - establish the new peak body, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Housing Queensland, to strengthen housing outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, supporting the sustainability of Indigenous housing providers and the community housing sector
 - increase home ownership opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres
 Strait Islander peoples
 - provide culturally responsive housing support through a service offer for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.
- In 2021-22, \$1.6M provided towards the recently established Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peak Housing Body as part of a \$5.5M investment over five years – funding will support sector development of Indigenous Community Housing Organisations and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Councils.
- The Action Plan also provides for the ongoing delivery of the \$75M commitment to home ownership in remote and discrete communities this allocation enabled the transfer of 167 social housing dwellings entitlements into the private ownership of local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families.
- Increased home ownership and access to safe, appropriate and sustainable housing not only provides a foundation to close the gap but reflects our commitment to listening to First Nations Peoples in Queensland about their housing concerns and committing to a better future.

Specialist Homelessness Services

- In 2021-22, the Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy allocated:
 - \$828,913 in homelessness funding to 2 organisations to deliver 2 specialist homelessness services (SHS) in the Gladstone Regional Council area see below; and
 - \$5,649,929 in homelessness funding to 6 organisations to deliver
 7 SHS in the Rockhampton Regional Council area.
