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\$7M centre puts Mackay on METS map

Mackay's \$7 million Resources Centre of Excellence is ensuring the region remains one of the world's best sources for mining expertise and innovation in the mining equipment, technology and services (METS) sector.

The centre is one-of-a-kind in Queensland and was jointly funded by the Queensland Government through its Jobs and Regional Growth Fund and Mackay Regional Council to drive research and innovation, increase export opportunities, and provide safer and more accelerated training options for students and apprentices.

With Mackay as one of Queensland's major resource industry hubs, the centre will create jobs and skills for the future through providing training and education biomedical research, product innovation and demonstration. It features a simulated underground coal mine for training and research, including emergency response strategies. The construction of the centre created around 22 direct and indirect jobs.



Harrup Park

Tourism boost for Mackay-Whitsunday

A world-class sport, community, entertainment and leisure destination is coming to Mackay-Whitsunday with the development of the Great Barrier Reef Arena at Harrup Park.

The Queensland Government has committed \$10 million for Stage One of the development project, the Australian Government has matched that funding and Harrup Park Country Club is contributing \$4.2 million.

Once built, the arena will become a tourism drawcard as one of Australia's largest regional sporting facilities, including seating for more than 6,000 people, media and broadcast facilities for the AFL and cricket, and corporate and event facilities. It's expected the 18-month construction period will create 90 local jobs and generate \$43.2 million for the region's economy.

Tourism in the Mackay-Whitsunday region is also benefiting from the Queensland Government's Great Barrier Reef Island Resorts Rejuvenation Program, a \$25 million investment to fund a range of projects on the reef focusing on growing, greening and cleaning.

Tax relief package

The government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium/businesses
- a payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals for eligible taxpayers.

An estimated 330 employers in Mackay Whitsunday will also benefit in 2021-22 from the higher payroll tax threshold.

Covid-19 cases

- Across Queensland, 672,275 recorded cases of Covid-19, of which 41,852 were active cases and 685 people had died.
- Across the Mackay Hospital and Health Service (HHS), there were 11,816 recorded cases of Covid-19, of which there were 351 active cases. There have been 10 deaths recorded in the Mackay HHS area.
- Mackay HHS was managing 60 cases of COVID-19:
 - 10 in-patients with Covid-19, including 1 in ICU; and
 - 50 people with Covid-19 at home.
- There have been:
 - within the <u>Whitsunday Regional Council area</u>, 2,193 recorded cases of Covid-19, of which 2,183 cases were recorded since 13 December 2021.

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Policing and Youth Crime

POLICE NUMBERS

- The Mackay-Whitsunday Police District has 371 permanent positions, up 20 since 2015.
- It was fantastic to announce in September 2020, (an additional 2,025 police personal across the state.
- This is a \$624M investment over five years for 2,025 new police personnel. Of those 1,450 will be deployed to the frontline which means at least 150 positions will be located per key region across the state.
- We're also investing in 25 mobile police vans that will take police into the heart of the community.
- There are more than 12,000 police officers in Queensland a record number. Under Labor, there are more police in Queensland than ever before with more on the way.
- And we back police 100% in what they do best keeping communities safe, providing them with the necessary equipment, like body worn cameras, new vehicles and tasers.

CRIME STATS

- For the six months up to 31 December 2021, the overall rate of Total Reported Crime for the Mackay-Whitsunday Police District increased by 509 offences or A per cent compared with the same period the previous year.
- For the 6 months up to 31 December 2021, the rate of Offences Against the Person increased by 351 offences or 43 per cent, Offences Addinst Property increased by 607 offences or 16 per cent and Other Offences decreased by 449 offences or 9 per cent, compared with the same period the previous year.

CAPITAL WORKS

- \$4M Mackay police facility upgrade in 2021-22, \$0.5M budgeted to commence planning works – expected to support 13.2 jobs over the life of the project.
- \$3.5M to replace the Clermont police facility in 2021-22, \$0.5M budgeted to commence planning works - expected to support 11.55 jobs over the life of the project.

RECENT POLICE OPERATIONS

• Between 1 July 2021 and 31 December 2021, Mackay-Whitsunday Police District had 160 unique occurrences related to the drug ice and seized approximately 832 grams of the substance.

YOUTH CRIME

- In response to community concerns, I announced a <u>\$15.8M</u> Five-Point Action Plan:
 - offenders posing a risk to the community should not get bail;
 - a police blitz on bail, appealing court decisions where appropriate;
 - a 24/7 Police Strike Team;
 - culture-based rehabilitation for Indigenous offenders through new On Country initiatives; and
 - empowering local communities in the war on crime with \$2M for community-based organisations for local solutions.

Youth crime facts

 As at 30 September 2021, in the Mackay area, data shows an 50 per cent decrease in the number of distinct young people offending, and a 31 per cent decrease in offences, compared to the previous year.

Recent youth programs

- In partnership with community agencies, the Mackay Youth Justice Service Centre provides various programs and services to young people that address offending behaviours and responsivity factors.
- In the 12 months to 30 September 2021, 3 restorative justice conferences have been held in Mackay. 77 per cent of offenders either do not reoffend or reduce their offending magnitude in the six months after a conference.

LNP

- In the LNP's Police budget in 2012-13:
 - Townsville Police were told to tighten their belts.
 - Funding for new operational equipment for police fell from \$77.5M to \$53.8M.

- At the time, I am advised Townsville's senior police were warned vital equipment, such as extra cars and computers were not purchased to cater for new recruits.
- The LNP budget for new and upgraded equipment, including vehicles, boats and traffic cameras, was the lowest in 3 years.
- And they planned to sell the Townsville Policy Academy where those recruits did their training.
- The LNP had its chance to stamp out youth crime. It didn't work.
- The LNP voted against our amendments to get tough on bail.

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Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road

Recommended response

- The Queensland Government is delivering a coordinated approach to address flood impacts on the road network in the Whitsunday region.
- By improving Myrtle Creek, Hamilton Plains and Goorganga Plains together, the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) will be able to improve flood resilience in the area.
- The Hamilton Plains flood immunity upgrade project will significantly reduce the impact of road closures for the community.
- This project is currently in detailed design and due to start construction mid-2023.
- Upgrades are also being delivered to Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road between Paluma Road and Tropic Road in Cannonvale.

Key Facts

- Proserpine–Shute Harbour Road is the sole arterial road, which links the Bruce Highway and township of Proserpine to the Whitsunday township of Cannonvale, Airlie Brach, Jubilee Pocket and the Port of Shute Harbour.
- The Hamilton Plains flood plain contributes to the flood immunity issues in the Whitsunday area. It has a one in two-year flood immunity. The duration of flooding varies from one to two days between minor and major events.
- Access to the Proserpine Airport and the local hospital is not possible by road during flood events.
- The airport at Proserpine is the gateway to the Whitsunday Region, and a vital utility for the tourist destinations of Shute Harbour, Airlie Beach and the Whitsunday Islands. Tourism is a key economic driver in the region and the industry relies on a reliable road link to and from the airport.
- Tourism is a key economic driver for the region and the industry relies on a reliable road link to and from the airport.
- The Hamilton Plains flood immunity upgrade project will significantly reduce the impact of road closures for the community.

- Residential and industrial growth in the Whitsunday region has increased traffic along Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road in Cannonvale, with an average of 24,640 vehicles using this section every day.
- By upgrading this section of Proserpine–Shute Harbour Road, TMR will be able to improve safety and road capacity in this location.
- Projects currently programmed for delivery on Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road include:
 - \$21 million Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road, Hamilton Plains flood immunity upgrade
 - jointly-funded by the Australian and Queensland governments (80:20) under the Roads of Strategic Importance (ROSI) program
 - will support an average of 55 jobs over the life of the project
 - currently in detailed design, with construction due to start in mid-2023
 - \$16 million Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road, Paluma Road to Valley Drive, duplicate to four lanes
 - jointly-funded by the Australian and Queensland governments (80:20) under the ROSI program
 - will support an average of 30 jobs over the life of the project
 - currently in detailed design
 - \$13 million to the Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road, Valley Drive to Tropic Road, duplicate to four lanes project
 - fully-funded by the Queensland Government's Infrastructure Economic Stimulus package
 - will support an average of 20 jobs over the life of the project
 - currently in detailed design
 - \$2.6 million Proserpine Shute Harbour Road, Paluma Road to Tropic Road (Cannonvale), construct shared path
 - jointly-funded (50:50) by the Australian and Queensland governments under the Road Safety Program – Tranche 1
 - early works as part of the shared path project commenced in June 2021 and are being delivered by Whitsunday Regional Council.

Achievements

- A total of \$37 million has been allocated to upgrades on Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road under the jointly-funded ROSI program on an 80:20 basis.
- The Queensland Government has also committed \$13 million to the Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road, Valley Drive to Tropic Road, duplicate to four lanes project.
- The Hamilton Plains flood immunity upgrade project will significantly reduce the impact of road closures for the community.
- Upgrades to the section of Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road in Cannonvale will improve safety and road capacity in this location.

Background

Proserpine Shute Harbour Road (Cannonvale)

- The Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road duplication project in Cannonvale is made up of three projects including:
 - \$16 million Proserpine Shute Harbour Road, Paluma Road to Valley Drive (Cannonvale), duplicate to four lanes, jointly funded (80:20) by the Australian and Queensland governments as part of the ROSI program
 - \$13 million Proserpine Shute Harbour Road, Valley Drive to Tropic Road (Cannonvale), duplicate to four lanes, wholly funded by the Queensland Government as part of the Queensland Government Economic Stimulus
 - \$2.6 million Proserpine Shute Harbour Road, Paluma Road to Tropic Road (Cannonvale), construct shared path, jointly funded (50:50) by the Australian and Queensland governments as part of the Queensland Road Safety Program – Tranche 1.
- Detailed design for this project is being finalised. Future key milestones are impacted due to delay in procurement of public utility plant (PUP) materials and redesign to accommodate PUP A review of project scope and funding requirements is underway.
- TMR has received multiple stakeholder enquiries related to concerns about the protection of trees adjacent to the Proserpine – Shute Harbour Road, Paluma Road to Tropic Road duplication project.
- The majority of this correspondence has been issued on behalf of various members of local advecacy groups – Residents Traffic Action group and Whitsunday Conservation Council (WCC).
- Some vegetation has been removed as part of the early works for this project. This includes a total of 12 trees, undertaken by the contractor, as part of PUP service relocations in late 2021. This was required as the vegetation was growing over the top of service cables.
- Guardrails were installed to protect existing mature blue gum trees adjacent to Waite Creek.

- While every effort has been made to retain established trees, some trees need to be removed in cases where engineering solutions cannot be included.
- Concerns from the wider community about the matter of tree protection is considered to be limited as TMR has not received any additional correspondence from stakeholders outside of the WCC or its call to action.
- These groups have also been vocal about the proposed traffic signal treatment for this project.
- Engagement with key stakeholders has been ongoing for the duration of the project and overall, the design concept and project scope has been met with positive feedback by all stakeholders.

Hamilton Plains

- A total of \$37 million has been allocated to upgrades on Proserpine-Shute Harbour Road under the jointly-funded ROSI program on an 80:20 basis.
- Of this, \$21 million has been allocated to the Proservine Shute Harbour Road, Hamilton Plains Immunity Upgrade project.
- Detailed design is due to be completed in late 2022.
- Construction is due to start in mid-2023 and be completed in early 2024.
- Ms Amanda Camm MP, Member for Whitsunday has been very vocal about the issues being experienced by residents due to the flooding in the Hamilton Plains and Goorganga Plains on the Bruce Highway near Proserpine and the status of these flood projects.
- Mr George Christensen MP, Member for Dawson has also been vocal in the media, on social media and in Parliament about this location, claiming the Queensland Government was stalling on the projects that would fix flooding issues at Hamilton Plains and Goorganga Plains. Mr Christensen has said the Australian Government's contribution for the projects had been available since 2019 and 2018 respectively.

WBHO Infrastructure Pty Ltd voluntary administration

Recommended response

- WBHO was the main construction contractor for three safety upgrade projects currently being delivered on the Bruce Highway between Proserpine and Ayr.
- Construction activity has ceased and the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) is working to ensure the project sites are maintained in a safe condition until project delivery can continue.
- TMR is assessing the quantum of remaining works and developing a strategy to ensure delivery of the projects can be achieved.

Key Facts

- WBHO Infrastructure is the principal construction contractor for three safety projects currently being delivered in the Central Queensland region under the Bruce Highway Upgrade Program.
- The three projects include:
 - \$38.82 million Bruce Highway (Proserpine Bowen), Emu Creek to Drays Road, various locations, widen formation
 - jointly funded by the Australian (\$31.06 million) and Queensland (\$7.76 million) governments under the Bruce Highway Safety Upgrade Program (BHSUP)
 - an average of 62 jobs are expected to be supported over the life of this project
 - \$22 million Bruce Highway (Bowen Ayr) Bowen Connection Road to Champion Street intersection, widen pavement
 - jointly funded by the Australian (\$17.6 million) and Queensland (\$4.4 million) governments under the BHSUP
 - an average of 35 jobs are expected to be supported over the life of this project
 - \$8.03 million Bruce Highway (Proserpine Bowen) Bowen Connection Road, improve intersection
 - jointly funded by the Australian (\$6.424 million) and Queensland (\$1.606 million) governments under the BHSUP
- The three projects were due to be completed in December 2022.

- TMR's routine maintenance performance contractor, Whitsunday Regional Council, has been mobilised to ensure the sites are maintained in a safe condition until construction activity resumes.
- TMR is continuing to work towards a resolution to ensure project delivery continues and subcontractor obligations are met.

- WBHO Infrastructure Pty Ltd is the principal construction contractor for three safety projects under two contracts currently being delivered in the Central Queensland region under the Bruce Highway Upgrade Program.
- The projects include:
 - \$38.82 million Bruce Highway (Proserpine Bowen), Emu Creek to Drays Road, various locations, widen formation (ID: 295492)
 - contract awarded to WBHO Infrastructure Pty Ltd on 15 September 2020
 - construction started in October 2020 and was expected to be complete by December 2022
 - \$22 million Bruce Highway (Bowen Ayr) Bowen Connection Road to Champion Street intersection, widen pavement (ID: 12269)
 - contract awarded to WBHO in February 2021
 - construction started in March 2021 and was expected be complete December 2022
 - \$8.03 million Bruce Highway (Proscriptine Bowen) Bowen Connection Road, improve intersection (ID: 721425)
 - contract awarded to WBHO in February 2021
 - construction started in March 2021 and was expected be complete December 2022.
- TMR received verbal advice from WBHO about this matter on Thursday 24 February 2022, followed by written advice on Monday 7 March 2022.
- The appointed administrator is Deloitte.
- On Friday 11 March 2022, TMR issued Notices of Breach to WBHO regarding works to be taken out of the hands of the contractor (Pursuant to Clause 44.4 of the General Conditions of Contract, relating to a Substantial Breach of the Contract).
- Both contracts rely heavily on local suppliers and resources in the Bowen and Proserpine regions.
- TMR awarded the tenders for construction to WBHO following a detailed contractor pre-qualification and tender evaluation process.
- This procurement process included a detailed assessment of the contractor's financial and other information to ensure the contractor was deemed to have suitable resources and capacity to deliver the projects and meet its obligations.
- 'Emergent' works need to be undertaken in order to make the projects sites safe until a replacement contractor is in place and construction activity can resume.
- These works will be undertaken under TMR's existing Routine Maintenance Performance Contract (RMPC) with Whitsunday Regional Council (WRC).

- This contract gives WRC possession of site at these locations and allows the maintenance contractor to work as soon as the sites are handed back to TMR.
- Under the RMPC, WRC has the necessary plans in place to maintain safety of the sites and open them to traffic.
- TMR is currently working with WRC to address rough pavement issues on sections of the Emu Creek to Drays Road project
- The impact of WBHO's voluntary administration on the three Bruce Highway projects has received some media attention since 24 February 2022. This includes local media coverage by *The Daily Mercury*, *Mackay and Whitsunday Life* and *Seven News*.
- This coverage addressed the impact of the voluntary administration on completion of the projects; the remaining reduced speed limits despite works ceasing; subcontractor claims; and comments made by Member for Burdekin, Mr Dale Last MP about the impact of the project on local subcontractors.
- The voluntary administration of WBHO and the actions of its South Africa-based parent company has also received national media coverage.
