The Ross River at Aplin Weir is currently at 2.21 metres (moderate flood) and falling. The Ross River at Aplin Weir is expected to remain below the major flood level (2.90 m) Tuesday morning. Further intense rainfall may cause renewed rises.

Bohle River:

Renewed rises have commenced across the headwaters of the Bohle River during Tuesday morning as further heavy rainfall moves into the catchment associated with severe thunderstorms.

Key Messaging

- Heavy rain continues to fall across large parts of North Queensland, affecting areas from Cardwell to Mackay, and Townsville in particular.
- Areas along the east coast including Charters Towers are expected to receive six hourly rainfall totals between 150 and 200mm.
- The spillway gates at the Ross River Dam were opened on Sunday 3 February and releases are expected to continue, but will be scaled back when water levels have reduced.
- Residents are being urged to evacuate when instructed to do so and take appropriate action to ensure their safety and the safety of their family.



The Townsville Hospital is open and offering all emergency services for those who need care.

General health advice

- If residents are having issues with sewage entering their property, information is available on the Townsville City Council website at www.townsville.qld.gov.au/water-waste-and-environment/waste-water/common-wastewater-questions.
- If you're at risk of being isolated by floodwaters, ensure you have an appropriate first aid kit and enough medication in the event you cannot reach a pharmacy or doctor.
- Apart from the very serious danger of being swept away or drowning, floodwaters also increase the risk of diseases such leptospirosis, melioidosis and gastroenteritis.
- It's very important that residents avoid activities like swimming, diving, surfing, kite surfing and jet skiing until local councils can confirm that water quality is safe again.
- Wear protective clothing like boots and gloves if you're cleaning up in flood-affected areas, and disinfect household surfaces that have come into contact with floodwater.
- Try to avoid contact with mud and dirt, and wash your hands thoroughly before eating and after touching pets that might have come into contact with water or soil.
- If you receive a cut or scrape during the clean-up, treat it with antiseptic and cover with protective dressing immediately. If the skin around cuts becomes red or sore, see your doctor.



Key Messaging

- Mosquitos carrying diseases like dengue fever might be more common after a natural disaster so be sure to cover up with long and loose clothing, and use insect repellent.
- Be Crocwise and if you see a crocodile, please report it as soon as possible to DES on 1300 130 372.
- If you see a snake, don't attempt to catch or remove it. Contact a local licensed snake removalist if you need assistance.
- If you have lost power, the food in your fridges and freezers could have been impacted. Keep fridge and freezer doors closed for as long as possible the food in a closed fridge can be kept for up to four hours and freezer food for up to 24 hours.
- Throw out flood damaged foods. When it comes to food safety, always remember that if in doubt, throw it out.
- During this time, looking after yourself, your family and your friends is essential. You can seek help from Lifeline (13 11 14) or by calling the Mental health access line on 1300 MH CALL (1300 642255) 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Community recovery

- A Townsville Community Recovery Hub will open today (Tuesday 5 February) at the State Government Building, ground floor, 187-209 Stanley Street, Townsville. It will be open from 9am 5pm, seven days per week.
- A pop-up Cooktown Community Recovery Hub will be open at the Bloomfield Library, 24 Third St, Ayton today (Tuesday 5 February) from 9am - 2.30pm.
- Donated items should not be delivered to evacuation centres. GIVIT is working in partnership with the Queensland Government to manage donated funds and all offers of goods and services.
- Around 230 ready reserves are working on community recovery state-wide.
- Agencies will work with those in disaster-affected areas to replace life event certificates or identification lost or destroyed in the flood.

Funding assistance

- We have negotiated with Emergency Management Australia to fast track requests for disaster assistance activations under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA).
- As at 10pm on 4 February, eleven (41) councils have been announced as activated for assistance under the

Electrical safety

- Carbon monoxide poisoning is a real risk for people in the vicinity of a petrol-powered generator or pump if these are used in an enclosed area.
- Make sure generators and pumps are situated in well-ventilated areas, preferably outside.



Key Messaging

- Only connect a generator to your home through a change-over switch and socket, never through a power-point on any of your existing circuits.
- Customers who have had their switchboard or homes inundated will require inspection by a licenced electrical contractor prior to their individual reconnection, including solar panels. Information can be found at www.masterelectrician.com.au/page/Consumers/Electrical tips/Severe Weather/.
- Make sure you know where to turn off your power, gas and water supply in an emergency.
- If you've lost power, turn off your power points and unplug electrical equipment.
- If flood waters are expected, switch off and unplug electrical equipment, then move it to higher locations.
- Stay away from fallen powerlines. Report any fallen, low or damaged lines to the emergency services or your local electricity supplier.
- Stay clear of electrical signs, street lights, electrical cables, foil insulation or other conductive material that may be lying around your house.
- If you've lost power, contact your local electrical supplier who should be able to advise when power will be reconnected.
- Don't touch a damaged switchboard. Stay away from switchboards if they are damaged by water, fire or lightening and warn others to do the same.

Electrical appliances

- Using water-damaged equipment can result in electric shocks and fires.
- Dispose of or have a licensed electrical contractor repair water affected household electrical items, such as kettles, toasters and televisions.
- Have a licensed electrical contractor check all hard-wired electrical appliances, such as air-conditioning units
 or stoves, intended for re-use. This safety check may be required before the power supply can be reconnected.

Solar PV systems

- Shut down your solar PV system using the safe isolation procedure.
- If your solar PV system has been damaged in a flood, storm or cyclone you need to have an electrical contractor inspect the system and check it is safe.
- Solar panels homeowners should note solar panels will still be generating power even when the power is off. The risk of shock or electrocution remains the same.

Tourist information

- If you are holidaying, or intending to travel to a destination affected by a disaster, contact your holiday accommodation manager or travel provider.
- If you are directly affected, act immediately on advice provided. Have essential items ready to go (important documents, essential medication, battery powered radio/torch, water, first aid kit, small amount of cash).
- Tourists can use Evacuation Centres, which are a last resort and provide basic amenities.

Weather

Overview

- The monsoon trough extends from the Gulf Country across the base of Cape York Peninsula to the east tropical coast near Townsville and should remain stationary or drift slowly to the south over the next day or two.
- A deep tropical low that lies on the monsoon trough over northwest Queensland is slow moving to the east and will continue to move in an easterly direction during the next few days.
- Very heavy falls with possible local flash flooding are likely to continue about parts of the coast and adjacent inland between about Cardwell and Mackay.
- Showers, rain areas and thunderstorms with locally heavy falls are expected elsewhere for areas north of about Boulia to Mackay.





Forecast conditions - Rainfall (as of 2pm Tuesday)





Health

- The Townsville Hospital is open and offering all emergency services for those who need care.
- Allied health clinics, fracture clinics and post-operative orthopaedic clinics will resume on 6 February.
- Paediatric and obstetric outpatient clinics are open and routine endoscopy procedures are continuing.
- Routine surgical clinics remain cancelled; however, priority surgical patients are being contacted by the hospital and asked to attend their appointments
- Mosquitos carrying diseases like dengue fever might be more common after a natural disaster so be sure to cover up with long and loose clothing, and use insect repellent.
- Be Crocwise and if you see a crocodile, please report it as soon as possible to DES on 1300 130 372.
- If you see a snake, don't attempt to catch or remove it. Contact a local licensed snake removalist if you need assistance.
- If you have lost power, the food in your fridges and freezers could have been impacted. Keep fridge and freezer doors closed for as long as possible the food in a closed fridge can be kept for up to four hours and freezer food for up to 24 hours.
- Throw out flood damaged foods. When it comes to food safety, always remember that if in doubt, throw it out. Don't drink flood water or tank water which may have been contaminated by flood water.
- During this time, looking after yourself, your family and your friends is essential. You can seek help from Lifeline (13 11 14) or by calling the Mental health access line on 1300 MH CALL (1300 642255) 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

- If you can't travel safely to your nearest health service provider and you are worried about your health, please call 13 HEALTH (13 43 25 84) to get non-urgent medical advice from a registered nurse 24/7.
- If you are in a life-threatening situation or emergency, please call '000'.

General health advice

- It's very important that residents avoid activities like swimming, diving, surfing, kite surfing and jet skiing until local councils can confirm that water quality is safe again.
- Wear protective clothing like boots and gloves if you're cleaning up in flood-affected areas, and disinfect household surfaces that have come into contact with floodwater.
- Try to avoid contact with mud and dirt, and wash your hands thoroughly before eating and after touching pets that might have come into contact with water or soil.
- If you receive a cut or scrape during the clean-up, treat it with antiseptic and cover with protective dressing immediately. If the skin around cuts becomes red or sore, see your doctor. If you sustain a wound and are unsure when your last tetanus vaccination was, seek medical attention immediately. Vaccination is the best way to protect against tetanus.

Key Messaging

Electrical safety

- Make sure you know where to turn off your power, gas and water supply in an emergency.
- If you've lost power, turn off your power points and unplug electrical equipment.
- If you've lost power, contact your local electrical supplier who should be able to advise when power will be reconnected.
- Don't touch a damaged switchboard. Stay away from switchboards if they are damaged by water, fire or lightening and warn others to do the same.
- Customers who have had their switchboard or homes inundated will require inspection by a licenced electrical
 contractor prior to their individual reconnection, including solar panels. Information can be found at
 https://fswqap.worksafe.qld.gov.au/elis/.
- Stay away from fallen powerlines. Report any fallen, low or damaged lines to the emergency services or your local electricity supplier.
- Stay clear of electrical signs, street lights, electrical cables, foil insulation or other conductive material that may be lying around your house.
- Carbon monoxide poisoning is a real risk for people in the vicinity of a petrol-powered generator or pump if these are used in an enclosed area.
- Make sure generators and pumps are situated in well-ventilated areas, preferably outside.
- Only connect a generator to your home through a change-over switch and socket, never through a PowerPoint on any of your existing circuits.

Electrical appliances

- Using water-damaged equipment can result in electric shocks and fires.
- Dispose of or have a licensed electrical contractor repair water-affected household electrical items, such as kettles, toasters and televisions.
- Have a licensed electrical contractor check all hard-wired electrical appliances, such as air-conditioning units
 or stoves, intended for re-use. This safety check may be required before the power supply can be reconnected.

Solar PV systems

- Shut down your solar PV system using the safe isolation procedure.
- If your solar PV system has been damaged in a flood, storm or cyclone you need to have an electrical contractor inspect the system and check it is safe.

Tourist information

- If you are holidaying or intending to travel to a destination affected by a disaster, contact your holiday accommodation manager or travel provider.
- If you are directly affected, act immediately on advice provided. Have essential items ready to go (important documents, essential medication, battery powered radio/torch, water, first aid kit and small amount of cash).
- Tourists can use Evacuation Centres, which are a last resort and provide basic amenities.







Forecast Scenario - Aplin Weir




Forecast Scenario as @ 0700 hours Thursday 07/02/2019

Most likely rainfail scenario: 25% probability scenario from latest forecasts available in MetEye.

The recession is likely to occur slower than modelled, due to model factors including rating curves, dam releases and model parameters being calibrated for the rising limb. The river lovel at Aplin Weir may remain above the moderate flood level into the weekend.

NB: Modelled peak modelled flows at Aplin Weit matched well with the outflow from the Ross River Dam late Sunday. Attenuation and breakouts of flow between Ross River Dam and Aplin Weir, as well as manual dam operations account for the difference in recorded and modelled flows and this is currently being investigated by Townsville City Council.










Current situation - Satellite/Chart









Forecast conditions – Rainfall (as of 3pm AEST Saturday)






