- Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk makes an opening statement, saying her Government's sixth budget will help the State unite and recover from COVID-19. She says the budget builds on the success of Queensland's strong health response, backing more manufacturing and infrastructure. She says \$6 billion in concessions will lower the cost of living for Queenslanders, while more frontline jobs are delivered. She says John Coates from the AOC will address Cabinet in February about Queensland's 2032 Olympic bid.
- State Opposition leader David Crisafulli asks the Premier if she complied with the Ministerial Code of Conduct and signed and dates each staff member's register of interest. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says she understands that has been complied with, but there has been a changeover in staff since the election. Mr Crisafulli asks if any staff members had a conflict of interest with their duties. Premier Palaszczuk says she doesn't have those details at the moment. Mr Crisafulli asks when Jon Pursley joined the staff. Premier Palaszczuk says she would have to find that out. Premier Palaszczuk says she understands Mr Pursley had to take leave from a role while he worked in her office and he is now taking official leave while he completes the tenure of that role. Mr Crisafulli asks the Director-General if he has familiarised himself with any conflicts of interests. Director-General Dave Stewart says he has not been made aware of any conflict of interest involved with Mr Pursley. He says he regularly received advice

from the Integrity Commissioner. Mr Crisafulli says Evan Moorhead and Cameron Milner were involved in the election strategy and asks how they were engaged with the Premier's office. Mr Stewart says he is unaware of how they were engaged, but the Acting DG wrote to Mr Moorhead reminding him of his obligations. Mr Crisafulli asks if they were provided cards to access 1 William St. Mr Stewart says he is not aware of how they were accessing the building. Mr Crisafulli asks if they made a contribution toward consumables and incur expenses. Premier Palaszczuk says the question is deliberately misleading and contains imputations. Mr Crisafulli asks the Director-General if lobbyists were directing Government employees. Premier Palaszczuk says there is an imputation in the question. Director-General Dave Stewart says in the case of Mr Moorhead, he was made very aware of his obligations under legislation. He says they weren't employed by DPC. Mr Crisafulli asks what conflict of interests checks were done. Premier Palaszczuk says they had to comply with the lobbyist code of conduct.

- State Opposition leader David Crisafulli asks the Integrity Commissioner if she oversees lobbyist activities but doesn't have investigative powers. Integrity Commissioner Dr Nikola Stepanov says she would refer matters to the Police and Crime and Corruption Commission. She says in relation to the functions of the Integrity Commissioner, the next strategic review is due next year. Mr Crisafulli asks the Premier if she rules out the practice of lobbyists consulting during an election period. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says there is a code lobbyists must comply with and Queensland's code is the strictest in the country. Premier Palaszczuk says Mr Milner had car park access but no access to other resources. Mr Crisafulli asks if terms of refence for a strategic review of the Integrity Commissioner been considered as yet. Director-General Dave Stewart says they are still working on the terms. Mr Stewart says he would have to find out the value of a car park at 1 William Street. Premier Palaszczuk says visitors can be allocated a car park to come to 1 William Street. Mr Crisafulli asks access logs to be made available. Premier Palaszczuk says she doesn't know if there are access logs. Mr Crisafulli asks if the review will examine the investigative powers of the Integrity Commissioner. Mr Stewart says there are no investigative powers at the moment and the terms of reference for the review have not been concluded.
- State Opposition leader David Crisafulli asks the Premier asks why she hasn't updated integrity standards in the Minister charter letters. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says she doesn't understand the premise of the question. She says charter letters do include mention of integrity. Mr Crisafulli asks the Premier if she will maintain her edict that Ministers should not use private email addresses when dealing with stakeholders. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says changes were made to the Cabinet handbook. She says she would have to go back and check if she received any emails from the mangocube email address.
- Noosa MP Sandy Bolton asks the Premier when an independent review of sessional orders will be
 undertaken for MPs. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says there's a committee of the Legislative
 Assembly and they would look at those specifics.
- **Hervey Bay MP Adrian Tantari** asks the Premier how the Queensland Budget provides resourcing to ensure Queenslanders stay safe from COVID-19.
- McAlister MP Melissa McMahon asks the Premier how jobs are supported in the Queensland Budget.
- **Logan MP Linus Power** asks the Premier what skills initiative are included in the Queensland Budget for economic recovery.
- Hervey Bay MP Adrian Tantari asks the Premier how manufacturing will be supported to create jobs as part of the Government's economic recovery strategy.
- McAlister MP Melissa McMahon asks the Premier what investments are included in the budget to improve Queensland's health capacity.
- Logan MP Linus Power asks the Premier what are some recent outcomes that have been achieved to support jobs in Queensland.
- State Opposition leader David Crisafulli asks the Premier when she first learned who Mike Kaiser was. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says that's an imputation. Premier Palaszczuk says she made a joke in the election campaign that she didn't know who Mr Kaiser was. Mr Crisafulli asks the Director-General when it was decided to appoint Mr Kaiser as Acting DG of the Resources department. Director-General Dave Stewart says Mr Kaiser came to mind as a person with exceptional experience after the election. Mr Crisafulli asked if anyone advocated on Mr Kaiser's behalf. Mr Stewart says he is not aware of anyone advocating on Mr Kaiser's behalf. Mr Crisafulli asks if Integrity Commissioner advice was sought. Mr Stewart says he understands advice was sought by the Premier. Mr Crisafulli asks how he believes

conflict of interest matters can be dealt with in that case. Mr Stewart says he needs to stand aside or take a leave of absence from KPMG and get advice. Mr Crisafulli asks if Mr Kaiser provided a declaration of interests before his appointment,. Mr Stewart says his CV was provided and it was made clear he would have to manage conflicts of interest. Mr Crisafulli asks if he is being considered for the role on a permanent basis. Mr Stewart says he imagines he will be a candidate if her applies. Mr Crisafulli asks if Mr Kaiser could maintain a high level of integrity in that role. Premier Palaszczuk says she does not see why not and his temporary appointment has been welcomed by the resources sector.

- Mirani MP Stephen Andrew asks the Premier what will the Government be doing to ensure the
 relationship does not break down with Keswick Island locals as the island is developed. Premier
 Annastacia Palaszczuk says she understands issues have been raised by locals on the island and
 departmental representatives will meet with residents concerned about access. She says it will likely
 happen this week or next week.
- Maroochydore MP Fiona Simpson asks the Premier is she can advise if former Chief of Staff David Barbagallo received a payout benefit after his departure. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says she would have to find out, but understands he received normal entitlements under the contract. Ms Simpson asks if the Premier will rule out employing Mr Barbagallo in committee roles or in the Queensland Government. Premier Palaszczuk says there are no plans. Ms Simpson asks the Premier if the current Chief of Staff Jim Murphy paid back his termination benefit once he joined as Chief of Staff. Premier Palaszczuk says he was paid out in accordance with the contract.
- State Opposition leader David Crisafulli asks the Premier when she first received briefing material from QFES relating to the Fraser Island fire. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says the DG advises her when there are issues around the State and she gets normal updates about activity around the State. She says initially the parks service was comfortable with managing the fire and when they weren't, it was moved to the fire service. Mr Crisafulli asks the Premier if she sought a briefing on that matter. Premier Palaszczuk says she gets regular updates from the DG. Mr Crisafulli asks the Premier if she is satisfied with the response on Fraser Island. Premier Palaszczuk says everyone is concerned about the situation on Fraser Island, with unusually high temperatures and winds. Mr Crisafulli asks if the Premier is satisfied with systems in place. Premier Palaszczuk says more backburning has been done by the parks service this year.
- Noosa MP Sandy Bolton asks the Premier to outline what is being done to address inefficiencies
 experienced by communities and MPs. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says the Housing department
 does look at surplus land to identify for social housing. She says she is happy to seek further
 information.
- State Opposition leader David Crisafulli asks the Premier if QFES had advised her department that they were ready to respond to the Fraser Island fires over a month before they were called on to respond. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says we should not be preempting an inquiry by speculating. She says the parks service worked hard and the fire service is also working hard to save property and life. Mr Crisafulli asks why the water bomber the Premier was photographed with was sitting idly when it was needed. Premier Palaszczuk says she does not make operational decisions on the use of the aircraft. Mr Crisafulli asks the Premier if she is satisfied with the systems in place. Premier Palaszczuk says Mr Crisafulli is asking for opinion. Premier Palaszczuk says an IGEM review is happening around the systems in place.
- McAlister MP Melissa McMahon asks the Premier how the economic recovery plan will lift productivity in schools.
- Hervey Bay MP Adrian Tantari asks the Premier how the Queensland Budget invests in Queensland's regions.
- MicAlister MP Melissa McMahon asks the Premier how funding in the budget will be distributed for veterans.
- Logan MP Linus Power asks the Premier how the Industry Recovery Alliance's input has shaped the economic recovery plan.
- Hervey Bay MP Adrian Tantari asks the Premier how the Queensland Budget supports the tourism sector.
- McAlister MP Melissa McMahon asks the Premier how the Queensland Budget supports small businesses.

- Maroochydore MP Fiona Simpson asks the Director-General if he has been subject to any CCC investigation or assessment in the last two years. Director-General Dave Stewart says yes he has, a vexatious claim was made about him and the claim was not substantiated. He says there is an ongoing matter that he cannot discuss. Ms Simpson asks if he spoke to the Premier about the investigation. Mr Stewart says he did. Ms Simpson asks why he did not stand down. Mr Stewart says it was an anonymous claim and he did not have to stand down.
- Ninderry MP Dan Purdie asks the Premier why the Queensland Government cut 40 doctors during a global pandemic. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says she understands that is not the case but will get some advice on that. Mr Purdie asks why child safety workers have been cut. Premier says figures referred to are vacancies and the numbers in the budget are part of the September quarter report on the public service. Premier Palaszczuk says it took a while for her Government to restore jobs in Queensland after 'savage' cuts from the previous Government.
- Mirani MP Stephen Andrew asks the Premier what would the Government be doing to make legislation
 easier to understand for members of the public. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says committees go
 through legislation and people can put their views through open committee hearings. Premier
 Palaszczuk says Ministers also engage with a range of stakeholders.

Interview with Michaelia Cash, Minister for Employment. Knight reports it's the last week of Federal Parliament for the year and the Federal Government is hoping to bring massive changes to industrial relations laws by simplifying the system. She notes the changes will highlight the definition of casual work and provide more security to casual workers. Cash says the package's goal is to drive jobs growth as they move out of COVID-19. She notes they have around 2.3 million casual workers in Australia but they don't have a definition of casual employment therefore prompting confusions into work arrangements. She states they're planning to insert a definition of casual employment into the Fair Work Act which is being done by the Attorney-General. Cash adds it's also being done with 150 hours of consultation with business groups, unions and employee groups. Knight mentions unions claim the change will entrench casual work. Cash discusses what the changes will be including after 12 months of being employed, casuals will be able to be hired as full-time or part-time employees. She claims the bill will address the double-dipping problem being caused by Rossato decision. She states up to \$39b is needed to backpay employees for both the casual entitlement and anything they may have been entitled to if they have been classified as a part-time or fulltime employee in relation to sick leave and annual leave. Cash notes casual loading being paid in recognition of the fact one is not a permanent employee and doesn't have leave entitlements. Knight adds according to research from the National Skills Commission, health care and social assistance has the highest demand in terms of job creation. Cash says the report will help those identify what sectors will give them job security in the future. Knight mentions aged care is one of the most resilient sectors in terms of jobs despite it having low pay and having flaws in its system. Cash states they're letting people with an entry-level skill set into that sector. She remarks cyber security and IT skill sets are also in demand.

Coates states Japanese Prime Minister [Yoshihide] Suga has confirmed three weeks ago the Games are going ahead on 23 July and arrangements are in place. Interview with Fenny Harrison, Director of Volunteering, Australian Red Cross live from Melbourne. Childs reports a new survey by the Red Cross reveals four in five Australians feel a greater degree of social connection this festive season than last despite the disruption caused by COVID-19. She says one in four worries they feel lonely. Harrison states Australians are remarkably resilient and this can be seen from the past. She says people are reaching out to their local communities. Childs mentions the study has also found that more people are feeling grateful in making additional efforts to connect. Harrison states the survey results from across Australia are all consistent in telling that COVID-19 had made people feel grateful and acts of kindness matter. She says some people are experiencing vulnerability for the first time. She notes people who are unemployed and those who are over the age of 65 are reporting they don't have plans for Christmas and they generally

feel lower levels of connection. Childs mentions the pandemic has sparked many fears in the community. Harrison states some people felt reaching out is being done out of fear while others said this is a good thing to do. She mentions there are reports from several years ago that loneliness could be as bad as obesity or even smoking up to 15 cigarettes a day. She says there are very small things that people can do to tackle isolation and loneliness. Harrison states this can be done by reaching out to others, connecting to local groups, making wellbeing causes, and more. She says 70% of the survey respondents said people should be connecting with others who are more vulnerable.

O'Hare says the first flight, which was from Sri Lanka, has arrived this morning. He notes everything went well. He mentions there are other flights coming from Singapore, Auckland, Doha, and Vietnam. He notes strict caps will still be in place. O'Hare states passengers from Sri Lanka were processed smoothly through the red lane. He says they were required to undergo extra sanitisation and take the normal immigration process before they head into buses which brought them to allocated hotels. O'Hare states the red lane has always been in place. He says a lot of work is being done with ABF, ADF, and Victoria Police for the hotel quarantine scheme. O'Hare states Australian passengers who have [COVID-19]symptoms are being tested. He says staff at the airport and hotels are in PPE. Childs mentions two German travellers managed to avoid quarantining in Sydney following their arrival. O'Hare states he wouldn't describe this as a total failure. He says the NSW/Police has declared they recognised the breakthrough of the system in Sydney

Interview with Dr Susan Hazel, University of Adelaide's School of Animal and Veterinary Sciences. Oriti reports 14 dogs are being trained at the University of Adelaide and the Australian Border Force facility in Victoria to detect COVID-19. He says early results show the specialised K9 can detect coronavirus even when people are asymptomatic. Hazel confirms dogs can smell the virus. She notes the group that started the work was based in Paris, France. She says it takes a while for the dog to be able to sniff out the virus. Hazel explains the training involves exposing the dogs to positive sweat samples. She states there is a low risk the dogs can contract COVID-19 because the virus is not passed on through sweat. She hopes to deploy the trained dogs in airports with international passengers in early 2021.

Annastacia Palaszczuk has refused to say whether she used her private email account for work purposes after she warned her ministers against it in the wake of Mark Bailey's 'mangocube' saga.

It's today been revealed the Premier had a private account, 'stacia1@bigpond,com', which she said she hasn't used since the Cabinet handbook was amended in 2018.

Mr Bailey, who was energy minister at the time, was cleared of corrupt conduct by the Crime and Corruption Commission in 2017 over the use and temporary deletion of his private account, which was found to contain hundreds of public records.

However the watchdog found the use of private email for ministerial purposes was a breach of both the Queensland Ministerial Handbook and the Ministerial Information Security Policy.

Ms Palaszczuk warned her ministers not to use private accounts for work purposes in the wake of the saga, and in 2017 kept secret which ministers had been using their private emails.

The Cabinet handbook was officially amended in 2018, banning the use of private emails for ministerial purposes.

During Monday's Budget Estimates hearing, Ms Palaszczuk was asked by the Opposition whether she had a Bigpond account.

"I don't recall having a bigpond account, I may have, I would have to check," she said.

Asked whether she had ever had a 'stacia1@bigpond.com' account, the Premier said yes.

The LNP tabled an alleged email between the Premier and Mr Bailey dated April 22, 2015.

The document suggests Mr Bailey's 'mango cube' address had emailed the Premier's private account about a position.

When asked by the Opposition if the document was authentic, Ms Palaszczuk said, "I don't know, it's dark, I would have to check."

When then asked whether she wanted it read to her, the Premier said no.

Ms Palaszczuk told Estimates she had publicly said before that she had used a private account.

Asked whether she had used a private email account for work purposes, Ms Palaszczuk said, "Not since the code has been updated."

The Premier's office on Monday afternoon refused to say whether the purported email from 2015 had been received and whether she had replied to it.

"Unsurprisingly the premier has no recollection of an email from five years ago," a spokesman said.

"The CCC investigated emails from the mangocube account and found no illegality.

"The Cabinet handbook was amended in 2018."

Mr Bailey's office would not say whether the purported email was legitimate, instead referring The Courier-Mail to the statement given by the Premier's office.

Lobbyist Cameron Milner in 1 William St during election campaign

Lobbyist and respected Labor figure Cameron Milner worked next to government staff in 1 William Street during the state election campaign.

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It follows reports last month that lobbyist and former ALP state secretary Evan Moorhead and Mr Milner helped run strategy for Labor's campaign.

But Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk told the Government's Estimates Hearing this morning that neither Mr Moorhead or Mr Milner were "in charge" while in the government building following Opposition questioning about whether they had directed government staff.

Department of Premier and Cabinet Director-General Dave Stewart said he didn't know how the men were engaged when asked whether they were engaged as consultants or contractors.

"In relation to Mr Moorhead, the acting director general last year wrote to Mr Moorhead reminding him very clearly of his obligations and I have done the same," he said.

"I'm aware that both those gentlemen were on our floor but I'm not aware of how they were accessing the building."

It's understood Mr Moorhead did not work out of 1 William Street during the campaign.

It comes after a government spokesman told The Courier-Mail on November 3 that neither Mr Milner or Mr Moorhead were based in the government building.

Asked whether the lobbyists directed government employees, Mr Stewart said: "I can't see their names or their company names anywhere on the contract disclosure that we make," he said.

"So they weren't employed by the department of Premier and Cabinet in relation to any contracting or consulting services."

Ms Palaszczuk said they weren't employed by her office.

"My understanding is they were not paid by the taxpayers at any stage during the election campaign," she said.

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"My understanding ... Cameron Milner was seated next to a couple of staff members," she said.

Mr Milner, who is one of Ms Palaszczuk's former chief strategists and helped guide the Beattie Government to victory in 2001 and 2004, is a director at lobbying firm Next Level Strategic Services.

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An Anacta spokesperson said Anacta was engaged to provide campaign services to the ALP, and provided those services from Anacta's Ann St offices.



Mr Crisafulli asks if they made a contribution toward consumables and incur expenses. Premier Palaszczuk says the question is deliberately misleading and contains imputations. Mr Crisafulli asks the Director-General if lobbyists were directing Government employees. Premier Palaszczuk says there is an imputation in the question. Director-General Dave Stewart says in the case of Mr Moorhead, he was made very aware of his obligations under legislation. He says they weren't employed by DPC. Mr Crisafulli asks what conflict of interests checks were done. Premier Palaszczuk says they had to comply with the lobbyist code of conduct.
- State Opposition leader David Crisafulli asks the Integrity Commissioner if she oversees lobbyist activities but doesn't have investigative powers. Integrity Commissioner Dr Nikola Stepanov says she would refer matters to the Police and Crime and Corruption Commission. She says in relation to the functions of the Integrity Commissioner, the next strategic review is due next year. Queensland opens to South Australia from December 12

Queensland will open its border with South Australia from 1am this Saturday if there is no community transmission this week.

Queensland will open its border to South Australia at 1am Saturday morning if there are no cases of community transmission this week.

Health Minister Yvette D'Ath made the announcement this afternoon following briefing from Chief Health Officer Jeannette Young.

Dr Young said South Australia had not seen any cases in the past week.

She said the large amount of testing South Australia was doing and their rapid response to the outbreak were key factors in her decision to reopen the border on December 12.

She said the decision to reopen the border could change at any moment if more unlinked cases were discovered.

"If there are any unlinked cases, and again we saw a risk from the cluster, then yes that could change," she said

Ms D'Ath praised the "great work" South Australia had done to contain their recent virus outbreak.

"Last week we committed to revisiting the issue of the restrictions on people coming from the 20 local government authorities in Adelaide," she said.

"This afternoon I have been briefed by the Chief Health Officer as has the Premier and subject to no unlinked cases over the next five days we can advise that people will be able to travel from Adelaide into Queensland from 1am on Saturday the 12th of December."

It comes as Queensland records 83 days without community transmission, with all 16 active cases acquired overseas and detected in hotel quarantine.

"Of course our message in opening up the borders to those people coming from Adelaide, and we welcome them arriving in Queensland and to holiday and to visit family and friends, but the message is clear, we must continue to be vigilant."

"We must continue to practice good hygiene to make sure that we are staying home if we're unwell and getting tested if we have any symptoms, and of course we need to make sure that you are registering when you go into venues."

Dr Young said South Australia had not seen any cases in the past week after a total of 33 cases were linked to their Parafield cluster.

"It will on Saturday be 28 days since we saw the first case in that cluster, so we saw that rapid escalation in case number initially and then they very quickly got on top of those cases, quarantined people and managed it," she said.

She said Queensland would no longer require anyone from the region to quarantine if there are no unlinked cases before Saturday.

Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk flagged the announcement earlier today.

Ms Palaszczuk, at a press conference at Parliament on Monday, also announced Queensland would resume high-level talks about the <u>state's 2032 Olympics bid</u>.

The Premier was joined by Australian Olympic Committee President John Coates to restart the talks after COVID-19 swept across the world.

"It is time, for everyone, to reaffirm their commitment to these games," Mr Coates said.

Ms Palaszczuk also revealed she would attempt to spend "five minutes" with Prime Minister Scott Morrison at Friday's National Cabinet meeting to seek his support and financial input for the bid.

Stirling Hinchliffe, as Minister for Sport, will also assist Ms Palaszczuk with the bid.

It comes as Queensland records three new cases of COVID-19 overnight – all acquired overseas and in hotel quarantine.

The new cases take Queensland's total active cases to 16.

Mr Coates says there has not been an official expression of interest from China to host a 2032 games, following a report in the China Daily last month that the cities of Chengdu and Chongqing were teaming up for a joint bid.

"We haven't seen an official expression of interest but we respect all of the competitors," Mr Coates said today.

Meanwhile Mr Coates said the delayed Tokyo games will go ahead in July after being postponed because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The AOC boss was accompanied by IOC president Thomas Bach to Tokyo three weeks ago to meet the new prime minister, who advised the postponed games were going ahead next year.

Mr Bach said Queensland's bid was "very, very strong".

"Most importantly is the support of the three levels of government, good community support and the fact that the timing for us, this is an opportunity to come out of COVID and create jobs and to create growth," he said.

Ms Palaszczuk said she would now send a letter to Mr Bach asking him for an update about the progress of the Tokyo games.

Mr Coates will address Queensland Cabinet in early February.

1st Story: Dozens of residents and tourists of Fraser Island's Happy Valley are being advised to leave now as bushfires continue to threaten the community. NSW has sent in a second air tanker to complement Queensland's. 24 aircraft are now working in conjunction with backburning efforts. The fire has been burning for six weeks and has scorched half of the island. Criticisms of the fire management has resulted in the State Government ordering an Inspector-General report to assess the response. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says "as we've said very clearly the Parks have done more work over the last year than they have in previous years".

2nd **Story:** Wild storms have swept across the southeast this afternoon. Caboolture, Sandstone Point and Banksia Beach were among the areas smashed by hail, rain and heavy winds. Thousands have been left without power.

3rd Story: Jarryd Hayne is facing a retrial after the jury was unable to reach a verdict in his sexual assault trial.

4th Story: Two Extinction Rebellion protesters were this morning taken down from a truck after attaching themselves to it during peak hour causing mass destruction. Serial protester Eric Herbert and another man were taken to the watchhouse and charged.

5th Story: The Federal Government has unveiled an overhaul to industrial relations laws with a shake-up for casual staff. The proposed changes require businesses to offer casual staff a part time or permanent job after 12 months of employment unless they have a good reason. Unions argue casuals will be worse off.

6th Story: Brisbane's bid for the 2032 Olympic Games is officially back on track after IOC vice president John Coates visited the state confirming Queensland's pitch is firming up as the favourite. The Premier today confirmed the Olympic bid planning has recommenced following a break during COVID. Ms Palaszczuk says "we were able to discuss getting our Olympics Taskforce, the working group, back together in the new year". John Coates says "it's time for everyone to reaffirm their commitment to these Games". BCC's civic cabinet have also been given an Olympic bid briefing. John Coates says the Tokyo Olympics is definitely going ahead next year.

Others:

- The **Premier** has faced a barrage of Opposition questions during a fiery start to Budget Estimates. Annastacia Palaszczuk was questioned over the use of a private email account and the work of two lobbyists during the election. Opposition Leader David Crisafulli questioned whether the lobbyists, which were hired by the party during the campaign, incurred expenses from the taxpayer. Ms Palaszczuk responded saying it was an imputation, and that to her knowledge they weren't given access to government resources. The Premier later confirmed one of the two Cameron Milner had access to a carpark. The Premier denied having a Bigpond email account before confirming that she did, with the Opposition tabling an email questioning whether the account was used for ministerial purposes to avoid scrutiny. Ms Palaszczuk says it hadn't been used "since the code had been updated". The Premier was also questioned on the Government's response to the Fraser Island fire and whether water bombing aircraft was deployed too late.
- The first doses of the Pfizer vaccine have begun arriving in the UK's hospitals after the country approved the vaccine last week.

7 News (Brisbane) 6:00pm (Seven Network)

1st Story: Over 20,000 households are tonight without electricity after a fierce line of storms that stretched from the Sunshine Coast down to Caboolture and Redcliffe. Power lines came down, trees were felled, and even shipping containers were tossed around. Bribie Island bore the brunt of the supercells.

2nd Story: The storms followed sweltering conditions in the southeast, with record-breaking heat being experienced in only the first seven days of Summer. Another line of storms in the southern inland which are on-track to reach Brisbane tonight.

3rd Story: Firefighters and residents on Fraser Island are tonight desperately fighting to defend their homes. Reinforcements have arrived, with a 737 water bomber flying in from New South Wales to assist. The blaze has been burning across the heritage-listed island for seven weeks. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says "This is a very serjous situation on Fraser Island - you only have to look at the horrendous temperatures that we're experiencing over there."

4th Story: Two Extinction Rebellion protestors chained themselves on top of a truck in Edward Street, causing mass disruption in Brisbane this morning. Another protest is planned for Post Office Square on Thursday afternoon.

5th Story: Queensland will reopen to Adelaide on 12 December. The State Government says it will only happen if there continues to be no new cases of community transmission. Health Minister Yvette D'Ath says "This has been able to occur because of the great work that South Australia has been doing, and that we have seen no unlinked cases." It has been almost a week since Queensland recently opened to Victoria and Greater Sydney.

6th Story: Casual workers will earn the right to become full-time employees in 12 months under new workplaces laws proposed by the Federal Government. It also includes big fines for companies and jail time for bosses caught stealing from workers. Attorney-General Christian Porter stated it is the strongest ever move to convert employees from casual to permanent.

9 News (Brisbane) 6:00pm (Nine Network)

1st Story: Destructive storms are sweeping through the south east with the Moreton Bay region hardest hit. Thousands of houses are without power.

2nd Story: Conditions are worsening on Fraser Island as bushfires continue to burn. Residents at Yidney Rocks have been advised to leave immediately. A determined group of Happy Valley residents have stayed to protect their properties from the fire. Locals fear the damage is so bad the island may never recover.

3rd Story: Climate protesters are planning new disruptions later this week following an incident at peak hour this morning where two men stood on a truck and used a locking device. The men were arrested and charged. A magistrate released them on bail. Extinction Rebellion have warned of further protests on Thursday at Post Office Square.

4th Story: Queensland is preparing to reopen its border to travellers from Adelaide. The border will reopen to all of South Australia from 1am on Saturday given there are no unlinked cases between now and then. Chief Health

Officer Dr Young says "I've very confident of the large amount of testing that has been done and the large amount of people that were placed into quarantine". There were three new cases in Queensland, all from hotel quarantine. Queensland will no longer be offering hotel quarantine residents fresh air sessions.

5th Story: A driver has been charged after smashing into a home with his car.

6th **Story:** Jarryd Hayne will likely face a retrial after the jury was unable to make a majority decision in his sexual assault trial.

Others:

- People from New South Wales and Victoria will be allowed to enter Western Australia without quarantining from tomorrow.
- Queensland is pressing forward with its bid to host the 2032 Olympic Games which was paused during the pandemic. **Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk** met with AOC president John Coates this morning. **Ms Palaszczuk** said Queensland became the home of sport earlier in the pandemic. AOC president John Coates says "we are in what's called continuous dialogue, but so are four or five other cities". Mr Coates will meet with the International Olympics Committee virtually tonight. The winner isn't expected to be announced until after the Tokyo Olympics next year.

- Maroochydore MP Fiona Simpson asks the Premier if she can advise if information from taxpayer-paid COVID-19 polling was shared with the Labor Party for their election campaign. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says the question contains imputation. Ms Simpson asks if the Government provided information from taxpayer-paid polling to the ALP. Premier Palaszczuk says IPSOS was engaged by the State Government to look at public info and behavioural change around COVID-19. She says sentiment testing is nothing new. She says polling guided the Government's roadmaps.
- Coomera MP Michael Crandon asks the Premier why planning for a hospital in the Coomera area is not a line item in the budget. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says there are business cases for projects announced as part of the budget, so she is happy to have a look at that. Mr Crandon asks the Premier how long into the future we can expect to see funding for the planning of the Coomera Hospital to be expended. Premier Palaszczuk says \$3 million has been allocated and the planning will happen.
- Logan MP Linus Power asks the Premier how local governments are supported to create jobs in the Queensland Budget.
- McAlister MP Melissa McMahon asks the Rremier how the Queensland Budget backs frontline services.
- Hervey Bay MP Adrian Tantari asks the Premier how the Queensland Budget invests in regional roads.
- Logan MP Linus Power asks the Premier how the Queensland Budget invests in protecting Queensland's environment, including the Great Barrier Reef.
- McAlister MP Melissa McMahon asks the Premier what previous trade outcomes have been secured in the past 12 months.
- Maroochydore MP Fiona Simpson asks the Premier if she will confirm she conducted ministerial
 correspondence using a private email address. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says she rejects the
 question outright. Ms Simpson asks the Premier if she accepts that it is the law that emails are kept, well
 prior to the code of conduct changes. Premier Palaszczuk says the code is very clear that using private
 email addresses is prohibited.
- Mermaid Beach MP Ray Stevens asks the Premier why there is no funding in the Queensland Budget for the Global Tourism Hub. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says due to COVID-19, the demand for new global tourism hubs was not there. She says when there is an uptick in growth in the Gold Coast market, her Government is not opposed to any further expansion that could happen there.
- Maroochydore MP Fiona Simpson asks the Premier if she was aware of her responsibilities in relation to keeping ministerial correspondence, even if it was on a private email account. Premier Annastacia
 Palaszczuk says perhaps Opposition MPs should talk to their federal counterparts about communication happening on WhatsApp.
- Maiwar MP Michael Berkman asks the Premier if a COVID-19 oversight inquiry will be established in the new term of Parliament. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says the economics and health committees can both look at COVID-19 and there is adequate scope. Mr Berkman asks if the Premier's answers to 'dorothy dixers' could be placed online in future Estimates hearings, rather than read aloud. Premier Palaszczuk says Government MPs have the right to ask questions about their electorates.

TIQ CEO Paul Martyn says a TIQ officer was sentenced to two and a half years in prison. Mr Janetzki asks about attempts to recover misappropriated funds. Mr

Martyn says the former employee has returned two thirds of the embezzled funds and TIQ does not believe it would be value for money to pursue the remaining third through the courts. Mr Janetzki asks if there is another TIQ matter currently under investigation. Mr Martyn says the other matter is in another location and related to a work credit card being misused. Mr Martyn says if he tells the committee further information, it would likely reveal which staff member is involved. Mr Martyn says the officer has been subject to disciplinary proceedings. Mr Martyn says TIQ office financial matters have been centralised. Mr Janetzki asks what misappropriated funds were spent on. Mr Martyn says the sum total was around \$1,000 and funds were used at a bar and various restaurants. Mr Janetzki asks what the difference between the International Investment Attraction Unit and Queensland Treasury's investment unit. Mr Martyn says TIQ's focus is very much on international investment attraction and they regularly coordinate with Queensland Treasury.

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

Mr Crisafulli asks the Premier if she rules out the practice of lobbyists consulting during an election period. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says there is a code lobbyists must comply with and Queensland's code is the strictest in the country. Premier Palaszczuk says Mr Milner had car park access but no access to other resources. Mr Crisafulli asks if terms of refence for a strategic review of the Integrity Commissioner been considered as yet. Director-General Dave Stewart says they are still working on the terms. Mr Stewart says he would have to find out the value of a car park at 1 William Street. Premier Palaszczuk says visitors can be allocated a car park to come to 1 William Street. Mr Crisafulli asks access logs to be made available. Premier Palaszczuk says she doesn't know if there are access logs. Mr Crisafulli asks if the review will examine the investigative powers of the Integrity Commissioner. Mr Stewart says there are no investigative powers at the moment and the terms of reference for the review have not been concluded.

Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says she doesn't understand the premise of the question. She says charter letters do include mention of integrity. Mr Crisafulli asks the Premier if she will maintain her edict that Ministers should not use private email addresses when dealing with stakeholders. Director-General Dave Stewart says Mr Kaiser came to mind as a person with exceptional experience after the election. Mr Crisafulli asked if anyone advocated on Mr Kaiser's behalf. Mr Stewart says he is not aware of anyone advocating on Mr Kaiser's behalf. Mr Crisafulli asks if Integrity Commissioner advice was sought. Mr Stewart says he understands advice was sought by the Premier. Mr Crisafulli asks how he believes

conflict of interest matters can be dealt with in that case. Mr Stewart says he needs to stand aside or take a leave of absence from KPMG and get advice. Mr Crisafulli asks if Mr Kaiser provided a declaration of interests before his appointment,. Mr Stewart says his CV was provided and it was made clear he would have to manage conflicts of interest. Mr Crisafulli asks if he is being considered for the role on a permanent basis. Mr Stewart says he imagines he will be a candidate if her applies. Mr Crisafulli asks if Mr Kaiser could maintain a high level of integrity in that role. Premier Palaszczuk says she does not see why not and his temporary appointment has been welcomed by the resources sector.

- Mirani MP Stephen Andrew asks the Premier what will the Government be doing to ensure the
 relationship does not break down with Keswick Island locals as the island is developed. Premier
 Annastacia Palaszczuk says she understands issues have been raised by locals on the island and
 departmental representatives will meet with residents concerned about access. She says it will likely
 happen this week or next week.
- Maroochydore MP Fiona Simpson asks the Premier is she can advise if former Chief of Staff David Barbagallo received a payout benefit after his departure. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says she would have to find out, but understands he received normal entitlements under the contract. Ms Simpson asks if the Premier will rule out employing Mr Barbagallo in committee roles or in the Queensland Government. Premier Palaszczuk says there are no plans. Ms Simpson asks the Premier if the current Chief of Staff Jim Murphy paid back his termination benefit once he joined as Chief of Staff. Premier Palaszczuk says he was paid out in accordance with the contract.
- State Opposition leader David Crisafulli asks the Premier when she first received briefing material from QFES relating to the Fraser Island fire. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk says the DG advises her when there are issues around the State and she gets normal updates about activity around the State. She says initially the parks service was comfortable with managing the fire and when they weren't, it was moved to the fire service. Mr Crisafulli asks why the water bomber the Premier was photographed with was sitting idly when it was needed. Premier Palaszczuk says she does not make operational decisions on the use of the aircraft. Mr Crisafulli asks the Premier if she is satisfied with the systems in place. Premier Palaszczuk says Mr Crisafulli is asking for opinion. Premier Palaszczuk says an IGEM review is happening around the systems in place.
- McAliste MP Melissa McMahon asks the Premier how the economic recovery plan will lift productivity in schools.
- Hervey Bay MP Adrian Tantari asks the Premier how the Queensland Budget invests in Queensland's regions.
